

Woman Fails in Attempt To Rob New York Bank

RICHMONDVILLE, N. Y., May 20 (AP)—A woman armed only with a scribbled note and a paper bag attempted to hold up the only bank in this rural upstate village today. She was arrested moments later and her alleged accomplice committed suicide as police closed in.

About two hours later, state police said, 45-year-old Floyd Miller, an ex-convict, killed himself with a shotgun as troopers converged on his farm at nearby Clapper Hollow.

The troopers said Mrs. Williams, mother of 11 children, was extremely hard of hearing and at first they could communicate with her only by notes. Later, after learning of Miller's death, she told them that Miller had planned the holdup.

TV Deadlock Broken, Pays \$73,500 Sum

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—Hank Bloomgarden finally broke his deadlock with Jim Snodgrass tonight on NBC's television quiz program, "Twenty One," and the victory paid off to the tune of \$73,500.

Bloomgarden, a 28-year-old medical research consultant, had tied with Snodgrass, an artist, six times previously. Each time the stakes went up. Tonight's victory brought Bloomgarden's total winnings to \$128,000.

Snodgrass, 34, stumbled on a biology question—the last one of the night. He was asked to name the five groups of bones in the spine and was ruled out when he said "sacrum" instead of "sacra" or the sacral group.

Shortly after the program ended, however, telephone calls came from physicians, saying that Snodgrass' answer was correct. The question is being studied, program officials said, and a further ruling will be made.

The other bone groups are lumbar, thoracic, cervical and occipital. Bloomgarden got them all right. Bloomgarden has two weeks to make up his mind whether he will try for more money, or settle for the \$128,000.

Roy Rogers Big News To Eskimos

BARROW, Alaska, May 20 (AP)—Life on the farthest north news beat in the world, as reported by Guy Okakak, Eskimo correspondent for the Fairbanks News-Miner.

"Tonight is big night for Barrow village. Instead of having late show in native store theater they put up a native dance."

"Reason for this is that cowboy Roy Rogers (sic) could see the native dance. Men even women who want to come in would say, 'Say, which is Roy Rogers (sic)?' Of course several whites from camp was in the room too."

"Finally after Roy Rogers seen the dance he stood up before the audience and told the people that he himself always wanted to come up to Barrow, finally he made it."

"Man who stand along side of men said, say is that him? I thought he is older than he looks. That is why we called a big night."

Rogers, cowboy film star, was at this Arctic Ocean outpost last week to hunt polar bear. He met numerous Eskimos and signed autographs for youngsters.

S. B. Hoage, 72, Succumbs

Steven B. Hoage, 72, a carpenter of Salem Rl. 2, Box 613, died Monday at his home. He suffered from a heart condition.

Hoage was born in Michigan Sept. 6, 1884, and came to Oregon about 1918, settling at Silverton. He worked at logging in Michigan and in Oregon for about 20 years. Haiti General Defies Ouster

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, May 20 (AP)—Haiti's ruffing council ordered Brig Gen Leon Cantave ousted as army chief today but he defied the order. The army backed him up and an army takeover of the government was predicted.

Cantave announced last week he recognized the governing authority of the 7-man Emergency Council. But he refused to accept its order to turn his job over to Col. Pierre Armand, who has been chief of police.

The army numbers 2,500 men with reserves of 3,000. The newspaper Le Jour announced "the army supports Gen. Cantave and controls the situation." It predicted a proclamation would emerge saying the army is taking over the government.

Ex-Tax Collector To Serve Term Despite Illness

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—A federal judge today ordered former top tax collector Joseph D. Numan Jr. to serve a prison term despite his lawyer's plea that Numan was so ill he might die in jail.

Numan's attorney had argued that on the basis of doctor's affidavits on Numan's illness, his five-year prison term for income tax evasion should be suspended.

Silverton, Tex., To Be Aided by Silverton, Ore.

SILVERTON, May 20—Silverton, Tex., will be receiving aid for its recent flood disaster from Silverton, Ore., proving that there might be something in a name after all.

William Duncan, vice president of the Silverton (Ore.) Chamber of Commerce, announced Monday that the organization had wired Mayor Spencer Long of Silverton (Tex.) to find out what might be done to assist in the recent disaster at the latter Silverton.

Mayor Long wired back that money was most desperately needed but that clothing and bed linens would also be welcome. The Silverton, Ore. group is busy this week collecting what it can of the three items, and these will be sent to the Texas city Thursday.

Receiving stations have been set up here at H. L. Staff Furniture store, the First National Bank and J. C. Penney Store.

Graham's Message Lingers

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—After Billy Graham finished his sermon tonight, the preaching to New Yorkers went on.

It goes on into the wee hours of the morning, in various ways, after the regular services end at Madison Square Garden.

About 16,000 heard him there tonight—on what he termed a "rainy, washday night"—and the figure pressed the total attendance in six days of his crusade to the 100,000 mark.

But after the final benediction, the work kept going. It went on in a Manhattan office where 16 counselors were taking telephone calls from "troubled people."

It went on in a basement of Madison Square Garden, where other advisers were conferring with some 370 more individuals who last night answered Graham's calls to "make decisions for Christ."

And it will go on tomorrow morning when Graham will conduct his 10 a.m. week-day "Morning Bible Hour" in midtown Manhattan for footloose city dwellers.

These are just a few of the facets of the Graham crusade as it nears the end of its first week in the big city.

So far 3,946 persons have made "decisions for Christ."

Salem Naval Air Unit Best In U.S. Again

Salem's Naval Air Unit 881 has been named the outstanding Naval Air Reserve Training Command auxiliary unit in the United States for the second time in three years.

Lt. Cmdr. John Neal Bryant, officer in charge of the Salem Naval Air Reserve facility, announced Monday.

Based on efficiency, the unit won out over 72 other auxiliary air units in last summer's inspections. He said. The Salem unit, one of three based at McNary Field, received the trophy first in 1955.

Its classification as an auxiliary unit means that it is not a special-ized squadron with only one type of aircraft. Commander is Lt. Cmdr. W. S. Wright.

Presentation of the trophy will be made at the annual inspection this summer which has been set for June 1. Commander Bryant said.

Auto Crash Kills 2; 3rd Man Missing

GRANTS PASS, May 20 (AP)—Two men were killed outright and a third is believed missing in an automobile smashup which occurred today on a stretch of highway 18 miles south of here.

Police identified the dead as Frederick Nathan Robertson, 38, Grants Pass, and Floyd Maurice Reese, 42, Cave Junction. The car they were riding in ran out of control and smashed into a tree along side the Redwood Highway.

The car is registered to Ted Madden of Kirby. Police said they feared he might have been injured in the crash and wandered away into the thick wood bordering the road.

They said they found footprints leading from the wreck to a nearby stream. And a passing motorist reported that he had seen three men in the car before the crash.

A search was launched for the missing man. All three were employees of the Clark Logging Co.

Blast Occurs On Midget Sub

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 20 (AP)—An explosion occurred today aboard the Navy's experimental midget submarine X-1 tied up at the naval shipyard here. The Navy said no one was hurt.

Capt. Robert L. Moore, shipyard commander, said part of the sub's bow section was destroyed.

RENO, Nev., May 20 (AP)—Two women got divorces today so they could trade husbands.

The trade went off without a hitch, with Mrs. Betty Brooks, 35, wedding eye surgeon Frank E. Schwartz, 38, and Mrs. Betty Jean Schwartz, 33, marrying garden store manager J. Martin Brooks, 35.

All live in Millbrae, Calif., 10 miles south of San Francisco. Six children are involved—the Schwartz' two and the Brooks' four—but "they're just getting an extra father and mother," said Dr. Schwartz. "They're already like brothers and sisters."

Both women sued for divorce on the routine Nevada grounds of extreme cruelty.

Police Chief Raps Cohen's Political Opportunist Claim

LOS ANGELES, May 20 (AP)—Police Chief William Parker fought back today at former gambler Mickey Cohen's blast at him, nationally televised from New York.

Cohen said on the TV program that Chief Parker had tried to get convictions— including Cohen's— to further his own political ambitions. Cohen added that Parker is "trying to become mayor of Los Angeles."

The chief instructed an aide to seek an action for slander from the New York district attorney's office and to lodge a protest with the Federal Communications Commission. Possible action by the Los Angeles County grand jury also was indicated.

A tape recording of Cohen's interview last night on Mike Wallace's New York ABC TV show, "Night Beat," will be played tonight for the criminal complaints committee of the county grand jury.

Committee to Decide
Dep. Dist. Atty. William L. Ritz said the committee will decide whether Cohen's attack should be heard by the jury as a whole. The recording was taken to Ritz, grand jury adviser, by two members of the police department's intelligence unit.

Meanwhile, Parker instructed that the unit's chief, Capt. James Hamilton, confer with the New York district attorney on the possibility of filing a slander complaint. Hamilton was in New York vacationing, Parker said.

Accused by Cohen's tirade on television, Parker demanded: "Are there no restraints on this new medium?"

If action for slander is deemed inadvisable, the police chief said, he has instructed Hamilton to go to Federal Communications Commission headquarters in Washington, D. C., and file a complaint.

Irresponsible Character
Parker said he declined an ABC offer of equal time to answer Cohen because "I do not intend to debate with an irresponsible character like Cohen."

Late tonight, ABC issued a statement emphasizing that Cohen's remarks "in no way express the attitudes or beliefs of ABC or Mike Wallace." ABC also offered its sincere apologies for any personal distress resulting from the broadcast.

Cons Break Their Legs

BUFORD, Ga., May 20 (AP)—Six more inmates of Georgia's Rock Quarry Prison for incorrigibles tried today to break their legs with 16-pound sledge hammers and three succeeded. All six are white.

Corrections Director Jack Forrester reported he heard no complaint from the convicts of ill treatment such as had been voiced in earlier leg-breaking.

Two of the three who were successful in shattering bones in their legs in the latest outbreak were repeaters.

They were among some 50 who tried a similar device last year to avoid hard labor in the hot sun at the quarry.

Northwest Death Toll Reaches 11
