Chamber Leader Sees No Chance of Woodburn Base

Stanley Grove, manager of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, reported Monday there is no possibility that plans for a \$40 million Air Force Base at Woodburn will be revived.

Grove made the statement on his return to Salem Monday morning after a month-long tour in the East during which he conferred with a number of air force and navy officials in Washington, D.C.

He also attended the annual meeting of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in the capital and visited some 30 industrial firms in Ohio, New York and Illinois in an attempt to interest them in the Northwest as a location for expanded manufacturing.

Any local hope that the jet fighter base would be constructed at Woodburn had generally died out when protests from Portland and from Willamette Valley civic leaders failed to change announced plans to cancel all proposed new bases.

Military economy and the success of guided missiles were generally attributed as reasons for the cancellation. Current plans are to expand facilities at Portland International Airport.

Grove also reported several of the company spokesmen which he interviewed seemed interested in Salem locations for future industrial development. However, most interviews were of such a tentative nature that no announcements could be made at this time, he said.

Most representatives were particularly interested in recreational facilities of the area. Grove said many industrialists felt that low population of the state would handicap plans for Oregon industrial sites, he added.

Salem also received commendation from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce on its fire-safety program for 1956. Grove said. Although Salem did not rank first for cities of its size, the local chamber received a certificate of merit in the inter-chamber competition.

Shooting Spree Just For Fun

Was he shot at or wasn't he shot at?

That was the question that was bothering Frank McElroy, Oregon City, Monday after the Marion County sheriff's office investigated his complaint that someone had taken a potshot at his car as he was driving between Detroit and Mehama Sunday night.

He did hear several shots and thought something struck his car, McElroy reported to county authorities.

But the sheriff's office marked the case closed when four men located in the area of the reported shots denied aiming any in McElroy's direction.

McElroy had passed a car in which the four men were sitting just before he heard the shots. He had started to stop when he saw one signaling for assistance, thought better of it, and continued on his way.

After the shots, McElroy called the sheriff's office from the Slayton police station and officers found a mark on his car which could have been caused by a bullet.

The four men had been target shooting while waiting for aid from Salem to repair a flat tire. The bullet might have just ricocheted off a rock, deputy James Warren concluded in marking the incident closed.

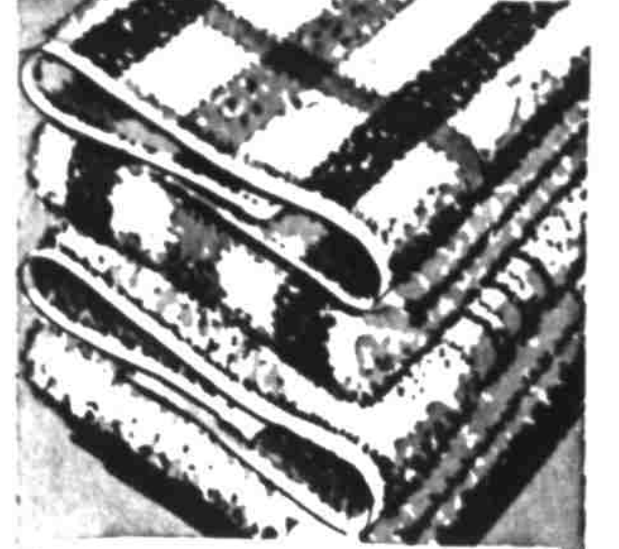
