The Kupers have been in charge of work parties at Camp Kilowan all spring and will continue each Sunday through June. The work parties are held to prepare Camp Kilowan for the opening of summer camp sessions beginning July 1. Dozens of fathers, mothers and children attend these work parties and enjoy picnic lunches at the same time.

Mr. Kuper helps other Camp Fire Girl fathers do such things as repair rickety tables, make new benches, screen windows, patch roofs, install new faucets, paint, run more electric wire, put in outlets, fix shutters, etc.

All of the work done at Camp Kilowan is done by volunteer labor. At the present time, the camp accommodates about 90 girls. The rustic looking camp is located among the evergreens up out of Falls City. Dreams for the future include the building of many more units so that more girls can enjoy the Camp Fire camp.

Camp Fire Girls is a family hobby for the Kupers. They feel that working together as a family unit is the best way to build a stable future.
