

Lost Scout Alive, Safe

MCKENZIE BRIDGE RANGER STATION, May 27 (AP) — James Nelson, 13, a Corvallis Boy Scout, was found alive and safe today after being lost overnight in the high, rugged Cascade Mountains. A sleeping bag and a small bonfire apparently kept him fairly warm during the night in a 4,000-foot high area of the Willamette National Forest still dotted with snow. Rangers found him today making his way along a trail in a hilly, heavily-wooded area near the Mount Washington Wildlife Refuge. Rangers said the trail would have led him to a road about 3 1/2 miles away. Nelson became separated from a scouting party yesterday afternoon. He had gone ahead of the group, and it was not until the party reached the road he was discovered missing.

Seaton Advice Ignored in Tax-Writeoff

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP) — Director Gordon Gray of the Office of Defense Mobilization said today he ignored the opposition of Secretary of the Interior Seaton in granting a rapid tax write-off to the Idaho Power Co. Gray said Seaton did not deal with the firm's compliance with regulations for obtaining the write-off certificates, but with whether it needed them to build two dams in the Hells Canyon area between Oregon and Idaho. Testifying before a Senate subcommittee, Gray said Idaho Power had met all requirements and when an applicant did this he could "see no reason" why he should be turned down. Gray said the question of financial need was not one for administrative decision and he could recall no case based on such a determination. The subcommittee headed by Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) is looking into the granting of the certificates permitting Idaho Power Co. to write off part of the project's cost against income taxes in five years, instead of the normal 20 or more.

Burning Victim Has 'Good Day' at Salem Hospital

Mrs. Marguerite Opland, 65, of 1172 Park Ave., whose clothes caught fire at home Saturday, "had a good day" Monday at Salem Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Opland was saved by a brother, who put out the flames with water and his bare hands. She suffered first and second degree burns on her body, arm and chin.

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Mirror of God Yields Lawbreakers--Graham

NEW YORK, May 27 (AP)—Look in God's mirror, Billy Graham suggested tonight, and here's what you'll see. "A lawbreaker," he said. The looking glass that Graham held up for 16,500 people consisted of the 10 Commandments, and he said: "There's not one person in this audience that has kept all the Commandments. Not a single person. And I'm further persuaded that there's not one person that has kept any one of the Commandments." He said God gave the 10 moral laws as "an expression of his holiness and will," knowing that man could not keep them, but to serve as a "mirror that makes us see how far short we come of what the living God requires." Graham held his hands in front of his face, as if looking in a mirror, and declared: "I see myself laid naked and bare before God. I see myself as a lawbreaker. I admit I'm a sinner, and when that happens, you begin looking for forgiveness, and it drives us to the Cross of Christ." Graham said the Bible explained that breaking the Commandments didn't mean only "outward, overt acts," but by the "intent, thoughts and motives of the heart."

Morse Asks 'Idolatry' of Ike Destroyed

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) called on Democrats today to destroy the "political idolatry" he said now surrounds President Eisenhower. Morse told a Women's National Democratic Club luncheon that if Democratic leaders will "take the issues to the Eisenhower administration," they can accomplish this objective. "I do not believe in idolatry—political or religious," Morse said. "Yet it is interesting that we have reached a point where criticism of a president may lead to discussion of a senator." The Oregon senator was recently taken to task by Senate Republicans for comparing Eisenhower with Dave Beck and for accusing the GOP administration of "political immorality."

Pulp Men Veto Offer

TACOMA, May 27 (AP) — The International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Workers and the United Papermakers and Paper Workers AFL-CIO turned down a 3 1/2 per cent wage offer from mill employers here today. Some 20,000 employees in Washington, Oregon and California belong to the unions. John Sherman, Pulp and Sulphite vice president, said about 12,000 workers voted 6 to 5 to turn the offer down. The unions had asked for a seven per cent wage increase and changes in holiday and vacation scheduling. Sherman said the unions would ask management for another session of bargaining. The contracts with some 45 mills expire May 31 but would carry over if the bargaining continues after that date, Sherman said. No strike vote was immediately contemplated, Sherman said.

Man Charged In Beating Of Policeman

LAKEVIEW, May 27 (AP) — An assault and battery charge stemming from the beating of a state policeman yesterday was filed today against Kenneth John Ducat, 31, of Lakeview. Lake County Dist. Atty. Julian Herndon said the charge was filed against Kenneth John Ducat. Bail was set at \$5,000. Herndon said state policeman Nick Barry took Ducat to the sheriff's office here after stopping a car carrying the Klamath Falls man and three other persons. In the office, Herndon said, Ducat hit Barry with his fists. He was subdued, Herndon said, when another state policeman, Don Woodruff, hit him over the head with his gun butt. Herndon later said an examination disclosed that Barry suffered several cracked ribs in the fight.

Boys Saved From Lake

EUGENE, May 27 (AP) — Four teen-age boys were pulled from icy Hidden Lake in the McKenzie River region yesterday after their rubber life raft exploded and sank. One boy, Floyd McCutcheon, 12, Tillamook, Ore., was kept afloat by his brother, Jesse, 16, until fishermen pulled them from the water. Also pulled from the water was another McCutcheon brother, Newton, and James Smith of Eugene. Crosby Wins New Hearing

PORTLAND, May 27 (AP) — An indictment charging Clyde C. Crosby, head of the Teamsters Union in Oregon, with false swearing today was ordered set aside and the case is to be submitted again to a grand jury. Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding ruled the indictment was out of order because it did not carry the names of all witnesses who testified before the grand jury. The indictment was returned March 17. It accused Crosby of lying about his relationship with Joe McLaughlin, Seattle cardroom operator, when Crosby was a member of the Exposition-Recreation Commission. Judge Impeached By Florida House

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 27 (AP) — The Florida House of Representatives today impeached Circuit Judge George E. Holt, charging the 54-year-old Miami man with bringing his court into "scandal and disrepute." The vote on impeachment, equivalent to a grand jury indictment, was 65-25. Date for Holt's trial by the State Senate was not at once set but Senate President W. A. Shands said that in fairness to Holt he would recommend that it begin soon. The judge cannot serve until he is acquitted, Gov. Leroy Collins said he would name a temporary replacement for Holt tomorrow. The action followed many months of probing into Holt's official conduct by two Dade County (Miami) grand juries, the Florida bar, and by a special committee of the Legislature. Administration of estates under jurisdiction of Holt's court was the principal point under inquiry. Holt got word of his impeachment as he was hearing testimony in a case at Miami. He adjourned court immediately, declining comment.

Oldest Active Educator Dies

NEW YORK, May 27 (AP) — Dr. Maurice J. Lewi, 99, believed to be the oldest active educator and physician in the nation, died today.

Despite a recent fall Dr. Lewi, founder and president of the New York College of Podiatry, had continued to run the college's affairs from his hotel suite. He is credited with coining the word podiatry—study of the feet. He had explained only last year why he would not consider retirement: "Who ever heard about any one retiring at 99? It's too late for that."

Even in his later years, Dr. Lewi continued staying up late, attending the theater and often playing poker until long after midnight. He smoked 12 to 14 cigars a day until a few years ago when a doctor persuaded him to cut it down to 8. He was born in Albany, N. Y., and was a graduate of Albany Medical College.
