

Catholic Role in School Bus Row Draws Baptists' Fire

CHICAGO, May 31 (U.P.)—The role of the Roman Catholic Church in obtaining public transportation for parochial school children in the state drew fire today at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien of Hartford was named in an attack by Glenn L. Archer of Washington.

Queen Said Studying U.S. Invitation

LONDON, May 31 (U.P.)—Queen Elizabeth II is studying the invitation from Prime Minister Harold Macmillan to visit the United States, a source said today.

The Queen is expected to leave for the States but whether she accepts was up to her.

Canadian Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent also has invited the Queen. He asked that she open the 1957 session of the Canadian Parliament in Ottawa if she crossed the Atlantic this year.

Aside from the political implications of an American visit, British newspapers want her to help restore the British-American amity of pre-Suez days—there is the question of the physical demands of such a visit.

She already has made three formal state visits out of the country this year, each full of exhausting ceremony. She has gone thus far to Portugal, France and Denmark.

She returned to Buckingham Palace only yesterday after the state visit to Denmark.

Ike Urges Flag Day Observance

WASHINGTON, May 31 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower today urged wide observance of Flag Day on June 14—the 180th anniversary of adoption of the flag by the Continental Congress.

In a proclamation, Eisenhower called the Stars and Stripes "the symbol of our freedom and unity as a nation, our way of life as a people, and the principles which have guided us throughout our history."

The President called on the American public "to display our colors at their homes and other suitable places" on Flag Day.

BPA to Get Power From Cougar Dam

WASHINGTON, May 31 (U.P.)—An order under which electric energy from Cougar Dam will be marketed through the Bonneville Power Administration now is being prepared by the Department of Interior, Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) said today.

He said he had been so advised in response to his inquiry as to how BPA planned to dispose of power from the McKenzie River dam.

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Baptists Vote To Eliminate Segregation

PHILADELPHIA, May 31 (U.P.)—The American Baptist Convention voted today to choose ministers and accept membership in its 1,000 churches "without regard to racial background or origin."

The proposal was made in the big Northern Baptist group at its annual meeting by the ABC's General Council.

The resolution, adopted unanimously, says that "Each Baptist church shall choose its minister on the basis of character and ability without regard to racial background."

Each church shall work to assure equality for all people in education, employment, housing and political activity.

Members of our churches shall have their fellowship with others on individual merit without regard to racial origin.

"We shall not align ourselves with any organized group or movement that works to retain segregation in any form."

Each Baptist organization shall follow practices that are consistent with clear policies of racial nondiscrimination.

Archer said Archbishop O'Brien had threatened to close Catholic schools of Hartford if public transportation is not provided for their pupils.

If Roman Catholic priests resort to political action to enforce their demands for subsidies, as they did last week in Connecticut, it will mean serious consequences," Archer said.

OLYMPIA, May 31 (U.P.)—A runaway automobile carrying two infants rolled down an incline at Licks Lake near here, narrowly missing a sunbather, bounced down a flight of concrete steps and came to halt in about three feet of water.

The children, one-year-old Kathleen Kenaston and her two-year-old brother, Roy, were not injured. Deputy Sheriff Jim Land said the vehicle apparently slipped its brake after having been parked in the incline by the children's father, Robert M. Kenaston.

Ghana Throng Boos Chiefs

ACCRA, Ghana, May 31 (U.P.)—A crowd of more than 3,000 booted and jostled ministers and other members of the Ghanaian government after a party rally Thursday night.

Steel-helmeted police had to escort ministers to their cars.

The rally was organized by Prime Minister Nkrumah's government to explain party policy. Finance Minister K. A. Gbedemah was booed by the crowd when he admitted the government had made mistakes and should be given time to rectify them.

He told the rally that since Ghana achieved independence from Britain 11 weeks ago, strenuous efforts have been made to solve the housing and unemployment problems. But we are not magicians who can achieve wonders overnight," Gbedemah declared.

Israel Invites Poles

JERUSALEM, May 31 (U.P.)—Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion has invited Poland to send farm youths to Israel for study at collective farms. He suggested to a visiting Polish delegation that the first contingent should be about 30 youngsters.
