Morrow Upset by White in Century

COMPTON, Calif., May 31 (AP) — Mervyn Lincoln of Australia won the featured international mile to night in the disappointing time of 4:04.8. But it was a high hurdler, Bill Campbell, the ex-Indiana decathlon star, now in the Navy, and little Max Truex of the University of Southern California in the 5,000 meter run who made the outstanding mark in the Compton Invitational Track and Field Meet.

Campbell led off the evening program with a time of 13.4 for the 120-yard high hurdles, equaling the official world mark held by Jack Davis, formerly of the USC Trojans. Elias Gilbert of Winston-Salem College, who was second, was also clocked in 13.4.

Truex wound up the card with a blistering 14:04.2 in the 5,000 meters, bettering his own pending American record of 14:14.5 set at Fresno earlier this spring.

Talk showman Willie White, a new 15-year-old sprinter shown from nearby Junior College, contributed a major upset in defeating Bobby Morrow in the 100-yard dash.

World record holder Bob Gutowski of Occidental won the pole vault at 15 feet 4 inches. The bar was raised to 15-8 in an effort to break his new record of 15-8 1/2, but he failed.

Pittsburgh's Arnie Sowell, well beaten in the 800 by Courtney a week ago, toyed with tonight's field and won in 1:43.3.

Morrow came back to win the 200-yard dash handily in 30.8.

Charlie Dumas won the high jump at 6'10 1/2" and Parry O'Brian the discus with a throw of 137' 7 1/2". Fortune Gordien was third at 118' 7" in the discus.

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Keegan's Shutout Gives Chicago 4-Game Lead

Chicago's last-stepping White Sox pushed to a four-game lead — their largest of the season — in the American League with some second division help last night as veteran Bob Keegan four-hit Detroit for a 6-0 victory in his first shutout in three years and first complete game since last August.

The White Sox, winning on a grand-slam home run by Walt Dropo and a two-run homer by Sherm Lollar, breezed in as Baltimore's seventh place Orioles smashed the New York Yankees 3-1 and the sixth place Kansas City Athletics trounced Cleveland 3-1.

In the National League, the leading Cincinnati Redlegs were edged by rain but gained a two-game lead over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Pepperdine, batting as home team, nearly caught the Portlanders in the ninth inning. The visitors pushed over one run and had the bases loaded with one out before Portland called on relief pitcher Dick Marshall. He fanned one batter. NY Hopes Dimming for Keeping Giants, Bums

NEW YORK, May 31 (AP) — New York City's hopes of keeping the Dodgers and Giants from moving to California grew dimmer today.

A survey by the New York Post showed that members of the Board of Estimate, who will have to pass on any financial measures to build stadiums, are overwhelmingly opposed to granting subsidies to keep the two clubs.

The board members mostly would follow the policy of Mayor Robert Wagner, and he too, doesn't appear to be inclined to make an exception for two of the big town's three major league clubs.

"If we began to subsidize baseball teams," the mayor said in an interview with the Post, "all sorts of business enterprises would demand the same things. Our feeling is that professional ball clubs class as private enterprise. They have to carry their own weight."

The mayor has invited Walter O'Malley, Dodgers president, and George Stoneham, Giants president, to talk things over with him on Tuesday. This is liable to be a showdown session, although both Stoneham and O'Malley have said "We have all summer to think about it."

Both clubs received a green light from the National League Tuesday to make the move to Los Angeles (Dodgers) and San Francisco (Giants).

Wagner already has gone on record as saying the city "will not allow itself to be 'blackjacked' into helping the two clubs financially. The clubs are asked at the five per cent admissions tax and would like city help in building new stadiums with ample parking facilities to replace antiquated Ebbets Field and the Polo Grounds."

Mayor Norris Paulson of Los Angeles, who visited here to woo the Dodgers first hand, said his city planned to spend \$3,500,000 to promote and house the Dodgers. And there would be no admissions tax.

If there were any development today in the ball club officials weren't talking.

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Hanks Earns Record Sum For 500 Win

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31 (AP) — The Indianapolis Motor Speedway and automotive accessory companies tonight paid a record \$200,235 purse for yesterday's 500-mile race of which winner Sam Hanks and his car owner received another record \$103,844.

The previous records were the \$282,052 total purse last year and winner Pat Flaherty's \$93,819 share of that total.

Hanks, a 42-year-old veteran from Pacific Palisades, Calif., reportedly will get 45 per cent of the first place money. The car was entered by George Salih of Los Angeles and sponsored by Sandy Belond of Los Angeles.

Declines Monza Race

Hanks also won the Mercury convertible pace car and numerous other prizes, including a \$1,000 wardrobe and a midsize race car.

Hanks tonight declined to drive in the American-Italian races at Monza, Italy, June 29.

He and nine other veteran American drivers were to compete against Italian drivers in a 500-mile race at the Monza Auto-drome.

A replacement for Hanks was not chosen immediately.
