

200,000 Children to Be Affected In Nuclear Fall-Out, Scientist Says

LOS ANGELES, June 3 (AP)—Dr. Linus Pauling, Nobel Prize-winning chemist, said today that fallout from nuclear tests will cause 200,000 children in each of the next 20 generations to be mentally or physically defective.

In a renewed plea for an international agreement to abandon such tests, Dr. Pauling also predicted that a million persons throughout the world will lose five to ten years of life expectancy each if the tests are not stopped.

16 Dead in Washington Accidents

Washington's holiday death toll rose to 16 Sunday night. Five were traffic, eight were drownings and three were listed as "miscellaneous."

Latest traffic victim—the first in two days—was Ronald A. Graham, 26, an employee of the Boeing Airplane Co. in Seattle. Graham died Sunday in Harrison Memorial Hospital at Bremerton in injuries received when his car went out of control and hit an embankment eight miles north of Bremerton Saturday night.

The three were killed when a tree fell on their car in Mount Rainier National Park.

Infant Survives

Killed in the unusual accident near Chinook Pass were Stephen Flood, 26, and his wife, Ida, 24, of Yakima and Mrs. Claudette Blime, 26, of Seattle. Mrs. Blime's 10-month-old daughter was injured and taken to Enochclaw Memorial Hospital.

The State Highway Patrol said roots of the tree had been loosened by high waters of the White River. The tree crashed on the front of the car driven by Flood, killing the three adults, and cutting and bruising the baby.

National Park Service foresters used power saws to cut the tree up so it could be removed from the crushed auto. It took about two hours to clear the highway. The tree was about 24 inches in diameter.

Boy, 19, Drowns

The three deaths were the first highway fatalities in two days, the four other traffic deaths occurring the first two days of the four-day Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Robert L. Lage, 19, of Spokane, an employee of the Great Northern Railway, drowned while wading in Liberty Lake near Spokane Sunday afternoon. He and his wife, Sharon, were wading in the lake although neither of them could swim. Bystanders rushed to the pair when Mrs. Lage shouted for help. They rescued her, but were unable to locate her husband, the sheriff's office said.

Mrs. Smith's Rites Planned On Tuesday

Mrs. Madrasah E. Smith of Salem, who died Sunday, celebrated her 99th birthday on Sunday, July 8, 1956.

She observed the day with a small family party at the Gilmore Nursing Home. With sharp memory, she looked back with pleasure at the landmarks of her long life, and those of her son, grandchildren, and great-grandchild.

She recalled the day in 1889 when at the age of 12, she came to Salem with her parents and became a charter member of the First Presbyterian Church.

Close to Church

The life of Mrs. Smith and her family were close to the church since its founding. Her son was clerk of session 26 years and still serves as an elder, and her grandchildren and great-grandchildren have also belonged to the church.

She lived in Salem only a few months the year the First Presbyterian Church was organized, returning to Brownsville where her father worked.

Mrs. Smith was a Salem resident continuously since her marriage to Hamlin Smith in Salem in 1872, except for 1½ years in Vancouver, Wash., and Portland in 1907 to 1909, where her husband was engaged in business.

She lived at 749 N. Liberty St. from 1900 until moving to the rest home in 1952.

Beautiful Alphas

Until recent years she spent a large part of her time knitting and crocheting and was known for the beautiful alphas she made for relatives and friends. She had to give up those activities because of failing vision.

But despite her poor eyesight and arthritis she continued to the end to read regularly in her Bible—one printed in huge black type. She is survived by a son (Mr. F. Smith, Salem), three granddaughters Mrs. Robert F. Brown, Oswego; Mrs. Bruce A. Erickson, Hood River; Mrs. Shirley A. Smith, Palo Alto, Calif.; grandson, Ralph V. Smith, Los Altos, Calif.; six great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Services will be Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. in the Cough-Barrick Chapel with the Rev. Paul Newton Pelling officiating. Interment will be at Pioneer Cemetery in Salem.

each if the tests are not stopped.

The scientist, interviewed on ABC's "Medical Horizons," a nationwide television program, estimated that a single roentgen of penetrating radiation entering the body can cause a decrease of two weeks in life expectancy. Scientists have said that .15 of a roentgen is the normal lifetime absorption from animals and the death rate among survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in the years since the first atom bombs were dropped there.

Dr. Pauling, head of the division of chemistry and chemical engineering at the California Institute of Technology, was an atomic scientist during World War II. He received the Medal of Merit, highest U.S. award to a civilian, for his wartime services.

"It is known," he said, "that radiation in relatively small amounts can cause cancer and leukemia. It can also cause an increased susceptibility to infectious diseases."

He said his contact with Russian chemists and biochemists at scientific meetings had led him to believe they also are well aware of the dangers from fall-out due to nuclear weapon testing.

Asked if the tests are necessary to maintain a free world, Dr. Pauling replied: "The best way to avert a great world war, a superbomb war... is to control nuclear weapons and to stop testing them."

"I consider myself to be a humanitarian," he concluded. "I believe no human beings should be sacrificed for projecting a program of destruction."

Red China Trade by U.S. Backed

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Sen. Ellender (D-La.) said today the United States should consider lifting its total embargo on trade between this country and Red China.

Ellender said in an ABC-TV interview—"Celebrity Parade"—that the United States should make a "thorough study" if its position in view of Britain's announced intention to broaden her existing trade with the Chinese Reds.

If European countries are going to expand their trade with the Chinese mainland, he said, "it strikes me we might look into the feasibility of selling some of our nonstrategic materials" to the Chinese Reds.

Sens. Sparkman (D-Ala.) and Cooper (R-Ky.), in a separate joint interview, told a reporter they believe Japan soon will follow Britain's lead in broadening commercial trade with the Reds.

They agreed, however, that the United States should continue its trade embargo.

Ellender said he "wouldn't be averse" to Japan stepping up trade with the Chinese mainland.

Decision Placed

HONG KONG, June 2 (AP)—Red China today played up Britain's decision to ease the China trade embargo as a blow at the United States "policy of aggression."

Radio Peiping broadcast comment of the official Communist People's Daily and other state-controlled newspapers applauding the British move last Thursday.

"The Washington bosses were already fearing a chain reaction among other countries which would follow suit and no longer trail behind the United States," the People's Daily said.

Gunmen Haul Off \$7,000

CHICAGO, June 2 (AP)—Three determined gunmen held seven bakery employees at bay today while they employed various tools and finally a truck to crash a cement wall and carry off a safe containing \$7,000.

Officials of Service Baker, Inc., in suburban Tinley Park, who estimated the loss, estimated damage to building and equipment at \$11,000.

Donald Barr, 34, a bakery employee, told police the pre-dawn destruction began when the robbers started looking for the keys to the safe.

He said this was what happened: The gunmen refused to believe keys for safe in custody of Tinley Park Police Department.

Instead they searched the bakery office, learning up furniture in their quest for the keys.

Radioactivity In Air Jumps After A-Test

SALT LAKE CITY, June 2 (AP)—A sharp rise in the radioactive contamination of air was recorded here today, but a State Health Department official says he doesn't know whether an atomic test in Nevada earlier in the day is responsible.

Lynn M. Thatcher, who operates a radiation measuring device in the state capitol, said Beta contamination today jumped to 266 micro micro curies, compared to the average of 17 over past weeks.

Thatcher says wind currents and other factors will have to be checked to determine if the contamination increase is due to the Nevada test blast.

Thatcher says the safe maximum is considered to be 1,000 micro micro curies. He added an atomic test last week in Nevada caused no rise in readings.

Papers in Soviet Woo Yugoslavs

MOSCOW, June 2 (AP)—The Soviet press, with one voice, urged today that the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia kiss and make up again.

The occasion was the second anniversary of the Soviet-Yugoslav declaration signed in Belgrade in 1955, when Nikita Khrushchev went there to put an end to seven years of bitter hostility initiated by the late Joseph Stalin. The Khrushchev-Tito rapprochement lasted only until October 1956, when events in Poland and Hungary resulted in a period of bickering.

Every official paper in Moscow marked the day with lengthy articles calling for closer Soviet-Yugoslav relations.

Knowland Says Defense Funds To Be Restored

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Senate Republican Leader Knowland of California said today he expects the Senate to restore some of the 2½ billion dollars slashed from defense funds by the House.

But Democratic Leader Johnson of Texas said in a separate interview that "What the Senate does will depend on the evidence brought before it."

Johnson noted that President Eisenhower "cut 10 billion dollars off the services' requests and the House cut 2½ billions off the President's requests."

Public hearings on the Defense Department's money bill for the fiscal year starting July 1 will be resumed Tuesday before a Senate Appropriations subcommittee headed by Sen. Chavez (D-NM), Donald A. Quarles, deputy secretary of defense, and Wilfred J. McNeil, assistant secretary of defense for financial matters are listed as witnesses.

Chavez has predicted that the Senate group will restore any House reductions that "jeopardize the national security."

Before any decisions are reached, he said he will ask closed-door testimony for 10 days or two weeks on the hundreds of individual funds and items in the biggest of all annual money bills. As it passed the House, the measure carried 33½ billion dollars in new funds.

A hospital attendant said she was listed in "good" condition. It was not determined if Miss Witbeck was the driver or passenger during the 10 p.m. accident.

760 Soviet Tourists on Paris Visit



PARIS, June 2 (AP)—About 760 Soviet tourists descended on Paris today with pockets stuffed with dollars but with different ideas from most Americans on how to spend them.

They were passengers from the Russian ship Grusia inaugurating the second season of Soviet government-sponsored cruises to the West for "reliable" citizens.

The ship docked in Le Havre from Odessa on the Black Sea.

French authorities have little use for rubles, so Kremlin authorities handed out U.S. currency to the travelers for pocket money.
