

Air Force DI Convicted Of Mistreating Recruits

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 4 (U.P.)—An Air Force court-martial today convicted drill instructor William Roberts Jr. of charges of mistreating recruits.

The court-martial, meeting at Lackland Air Force Base, will hand down its sentence tomorrow.

Roberts, an airman second class, was found guilty of abusing basic trainee Robert Dinsbacher, 30, Astoria, N.Y., but was acquitted of a charge of assaulting the airman.

Roberts had been accused of striking Dinsbacher and shoving him against a wall. Dinsbacher died two days after the alleged incident. However, Roberts was not in trial for his death, which officially was attributed to heat exhaustion and a kidney ailment.

County Need For Additional Blood Aired

Members of the Marion County Red Cross Blood Bank Committee met with representatives of the Pacific Northwest Regional Blood Bank program at the local Red Cross headquarters last night to discuss an urgent need for additional blood supplies in the county.

William G. Ellis, newly appointed chairman of the Marion County group, said the county used 3,815 pints of blood during 1936 while donating only 1,973 pints.

The group agreed on a quota of 2,555 pints for the remainder of the year to head off another possible shortage.

Paul Bird, administrative director of the Pacific Northwest committee, explained Marion County did not experience a shortage because blood was supplied from other areas through the Red Cross.

Most of the Salem area needs were met by the generous lending of blood by service men at Ft. Lewis and the Portland Air Base, he said, adding that this source may not always be available.

Blood for dramatic emergency cases was readily given, the group was told by Dr. B. Pirofski, the Pacific Northwest director, but the great need was in its steady, everyday medical uses.

Searchers at Molalla Find Footprints

MOLALLA, Ore., June 4 (U.P.)—Search teams tonight found a new set of footprints they said may have been made by 70-year-old Mark Franklin of Portland, who has been missing since Friday.

Some of the 60 men looking for Franklin said the tracks were found about four miles from his abandoned car and led through a heavy thicket of trees to a paved road.

There the searchers lost the trail. But they brought back to the area a team of bloodhounds owned by Norman Wilson, Dallas, which they hoped might regain their tracking skills in the evening's coolness.

Earlier in the day, they had been removed from the search when heat and dust blunted their trailing abilities.

Franklin's car was found about 10 miles east of here, its doors unlocked and trunk door open.

He apparently was last seen Friday night when he stopped to inquire at a timber camp for directions. Four light planes and an Air Force helicopter also were pressed into the search today.

Murder Charge Lodged Against Drain Woman

ROSEBURG, June 4 (U.P.)—Douglas County Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson today filed a first degree murder charge against Myrtle Miller, 57, of Drain, Ore.

Thompson said she is charged in the May 28 death of Garrett Alva Mappin, 62, who was shot once in the back at his home.

The woman, Thompson said, suffered a gunshot wound in the chest the morning Mappin was killed. Thompson said she probably will be released tomorrow from Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

Ike Refuses To Answer Khrushchev

WASHINGTON, June 4 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower has turned down any idea of trying to answer Soviet Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev on Russian radio or in any other direct way.

But the President almost certainly will respond at a news conference tomorrow to Khrushchev's precedent-making TV interview, which was seen in this country last Sunday.

The Soviet leader said, among other things, the United States eventually will go socialist—which Khrushchev meant Communist—without any pushing from Russia.

White House press secretary James C. Hagerty told a news conference: "It has been decided that the President has no intention of answering Mr. Khrushchev." Hagerty added, in response to questions, he was talking about a reply on Russian TV or radio facilities. No offer to do so had been made to the President by the Russians, but the U.S. government could have requested such an opportunity.

3-Year-Old Salem Boy Hit by Car

A three-year-old Salem boy sustained apparently non-serious injuries Tuesday evening when he was struck by a car in the 100 block of East Owens Street, city police said.

Taken to Salem Memorial Hospital by Willamette Ambulance Service after examination by city first aidmen was Allen Raymond Wick, 151 E. Bush St. The boy was released after treatment for chest and head contusions and a scalp abrasion.

Police said driver of the car in the 5:30 p.m. accident was Harry Lamine Barber, Salem R. 2, Box 692.

Klamath Wreck Takes Third Life

KLAMATH FALLS, June 4 (U.P.)—A two-car accident last Saturday on Rly Mountain, 31 miles east of here, claimed its third life today.

George R. Ross, 34, Bonanza, died in a hospital here.

Jack Westling, Klamath Falls, and Dorothy May Wood, Lakeview, were killed outright in the crash. Three others hurt in the accident were reported improved today.

Ross' death raised to 15 the number of fatalities in Oregon Memorial Day holiday accidents. Ten were highway victims. Five drowned.

Cherrians Take 12 New Members

Joseph Zeis, Mt. Angel Farmer, Dies

MT. ANGEL, June 4 (U.P.)—Joseph Faddis Zeis, 63, a farmer and hop grower in the Mt. Angel district for 45 years, died today at the Silverton hospital following a seven-month illness. Death was attributed to cancer.

Born Nov. 23, 1883 in Beaver Falls, Minn., to Joseph M. and Anna Zeis, he was the first of 11 children to die.

He came to Mt. Angel in 1902 with his parents who resided on a farm three miles south of Mt. Angel. He has lived there ever since. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

Survivors include two brothers, Michael, Silverton, and Lawrence, Mt. Angel; eight sisters, Mrs. Martha Coffman, Clara Zeis, and Mrs. Anna Himes, all of Portland; Mrs. Mary McDonald, St. Helens; Mrs. Irene Simpson, Granger, Wash.; Mrs. Louise Quinn, Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Matilda Buell, Tillamook; Mrs. Ruby Klotter, Silverton; two nieces, Frances Moore, Portland; Diane Zeis, Mt. Angel; two nephews, Richard and Delbert Zeis, Silverton.

Beck Pleads 'Not Guilty'

TACOMA, Wash., June 4 (U.P.)—The firmly spoken words, "Not guilty, not guilty, your honor," was the rider Dave Beck's answer today to government charges he lied about his income taxes in 1936.

The Teamsters Union president's answer was given in proceedings before U.S. Dist. Court Judge George H. Boldt lasting five minutes. Beck was arraigned on two counts of income tax evasion and fraud in an indictment May 11. Beck will remain free on \$5,000 bond pending trial.

Legal circles have forecast the trial will be in late autumn.

Firemen Called To Cupboard Cafe

Salem firemen were called to the Cupboard Cafe, 408 State St., about 11:45 p.m. Tuesday when a motor in the cafe's fountain section apparently overheated and caused a short circuit.

A dishwasher at the establishment said firemen were called when the fountain section began to smoke. No estimate of damage was available.

State Laundry Workers Dropped From Union

The eight Oregon locals of the Laundry Workers Union were today suspended from the AFL-CIO, Associated Press reported. Approximately 100 Salem laundry workers belong to the union.

Mrs. Mildred Gianini, Portland, newly elected international secretary-treasurer of the laundry workers, said the entire union earlier had been elected for failure to follow recommendations of the AFL-CIO ethical practices committee.

Dave Beck Jr. Sticks With Fifth Amendment

WASHINGTON, June 4 (U.P.)—Dave Beck Jr. and Joseph McEvoy, a cousin to the Teamsters Union president by marriage, invoked the Fifth Amendment today in refusing to answer the questions of the Senate Rackets committee.

Beck Jr. clinging to the Fifth Amendment, too, in declining to say whether he cheated on his income tax returns for 1934, 1935 and 1936 or whether the union paid his expenses while he played hide and seek for two months with Senate subpoena servers. He and McEvoy both hid out in Vancouver, British Columbia, for a while.

Beck the elder, meanwhile, pleaded innocent today in Tacoma, Wash., to federal income tax evasion charges.

The Senate committee has accused Beck Sr. of misusing some \$370,000 of union funds. Beck has announced he won't seek re-election as Teamster president, but said he did so largely because his wife has been ill.

McEvoy, whose wife is a niece of Mrs. Dave Beck Sr., took the Fifth Amendment on whether he has a one-third interest in a mortgage company and insurance brokerage firm which had extensive, profitable business with the Teamsters Union.

Likewise, he refused to say whether Teamster cash bought him a station wagon in 1935, whether he actually worked for the union while drawing \$22,711 in salary and expenses in 1934 and 1935, and whether Beck Sr. put him on the union payroll to act as a bodyguard for Beck Jr.

Beck Sr. set something of a speed record for the hearing as he signed and, in bored tones, chattered monotonously at the Fifth Amendment 130 times in 45 minutes. The elder Beck did it more than 200 times, but in much longer sessions with the committee.

About the only information the committee could pry loose was the younger Beck's name and address and the fact that he was represented by Atty. Edward L. Carey. Exasperated and frustrated, McEvoy finally inquired: "Are you married?"

Varying the Fifth Amendment routine momentarily, Beck replied with a "no" and a grin. He and McEvoy each refused repeatedly to say under oath, even when ordered to do so, whether the truth might be incriminating. That was the basis for McEvoy's instructions to the committee staff today to start drawing up contempt citations.

Teamsters Limit Tenure Of Officers

Union members of AFL-CIO Teamsters Local 324 in Salem passed an amendment to their constitution Tuesday night which shortens the tenure of their officers. The vote was 67 in favor and 18 against.

Under the new amendment the office of president and secretary-treasurer will be limited to three years instead of five. Also limited to three years will be the recording secretary and vice president.

The amendment also states the only officer who can serve more than one term in any six-year period will be the secretary-treasurer.

A union member said the new amendment had nothing to do with the teamsters' hassle in Washington, D.C. He stated the goal is to give members a closer control of their local.

Portland Hospital Probe Pending

WASHINGTON, June 4 (U.P.)—A House committee will be asked later this week to decide whether to go ahead with a proposed investigation into the Morningstar Hospital at Portland, Ore.

Rep. Chudoff (D-Pa.), chairman of a Government Operations subcommittee who confirmed last week such an inquiry had been proposed, told a newsmen "something else has come up."

He declined to elaborate except to say the committee will be asked Thursday to determine whether to go ahead with the inquiry.

The Portland hospital has for more than 30 years held a government contract to care and treat Alaska's mentally ill. A comptroller general's audit report last year criticized the hospital's operation and management.
