Lebanon School Consolidation, Budgets Passed

LEBANON, June 6 (AP)— Voters here passed two school budgets tonight in a vote of the six per cent limitation and approved the consolidation of two school districts.

District 14C voters passed a budget of \$441,794 which exceeds the six per cent limitation by \$18,000 and district 14B voters passed a budget of \$362,674 which is \$123,000 over the six per cent limitation.

District 14C vote was 327 yes and 113 no. District 14B vote was 379 yes ballots and no 123.

In addition to the budget, 16-C residents voted to consolidate with district 16 in Golden Valley. Vote was 240 yes and 90 no.

President's Escort Looks For Lost Jets

ABOARD USS SARATOGA, June 7 (Friday)—A new super-carrier, host ship to President Eisenhower, early today sent 16 of its 18 escorting warships on a search for two Navy jet planes reported down in the Atlantic.

A Saratoga briefing officer also announced that 16 search planes would be put into the air from the carrier at dawn to join in the hunt for the pilots lost off the Georgia coast.

In Jacksonville, Fla., the Navy reported two of its jets were missing and that an "intensive search is underway by plane and ship."

The craft, both one-man fighters based at Cecil Field, Jacksonville, were not participating in maneuvers being held for Eisenhower, a spokesman said.

Valley Farmers Co-op Reviews 'Best Since '47'

SILVERTON, June 6 (AP)—The past year has been the best year yet for the Valley Farmers Co-op, said William G. Stacey, auditor, at their annual meeting here tonight at American Legion Hall.

Stacey told members that they had their "house in order" and all they needed now was more volume.

He complimented the group on its low operating expenses, saying that he knew of "no other co-op operating on less than the \$9.56 it is costing you."

Volume of business was shown at \$1,170,394 this past year. Operating expenses have dropped from \$121.67 on \$190 in 1953, to the present \$9.56, the audit showed.

Earnings \$23,500

Total earnings was \$23,563. Breaking this down, Stacey pointed out that petroleum percentage earnings this past year were 7.38 compared to 6.99 per cent last year; hardware and supplies division showed 1.38 per cent against last year's loss of 2.48 in this department. Seed, feed and fertilizer earned \$1.67 on the dollar versus the past year against \$1.67 the previous year.

Patronage refund was up \$4,488, from \$13,824 this past year and \$8,426 the previous year.

On the other side, the auditor warned the co-op membership that its inventory loss on petroleum products was too high. It should be, he said, no more than 1 per cent while at the Silvertown this past year it was almost 1 1/4 per cent. The auditor also objected to the size of the patrons' accounts receivable which stood at \$33,077 at the close of the co-op's fiscal year.

Schmidt Re-elected

At the annual election which followed the auditor's report, Peter Schmidt was re-elected to the board of directors. Two new directors named were Leslie Lowery and John Stacey to replace Robert Riches and Tom Martin. Riches had served on the board for 10 years, and both he and Martin refused to be candidates for re-election.

Holders are Alvin Krug, president chairman who presided tonight; Louis Pfaffman, Dr. Steffens and Alfred Jensen. C. M. Brownell is manager of the co-operative.

The board will meet shortly to organize its officers.

Smith Heads College Group

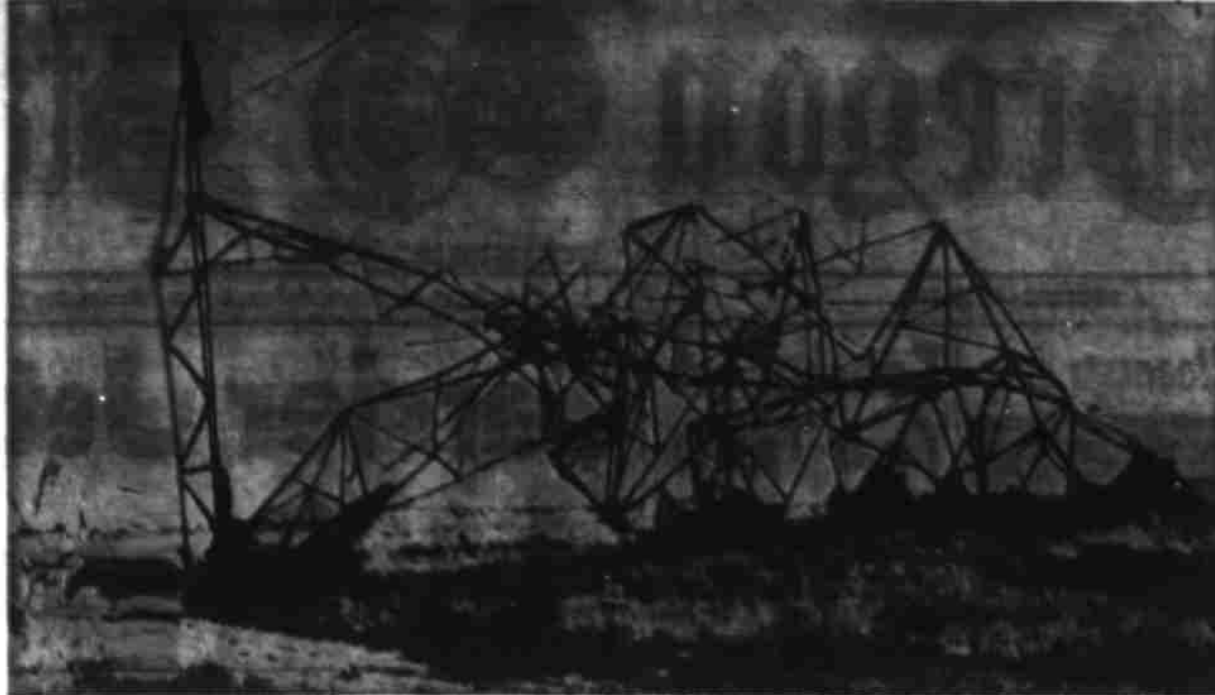

Strawberries Ripen With No Pickers

Willamette Valley's bumper strawberry crop continued to ripen today with the prospect that there won't be enough pickers to get it out of the fields.

Groves have marked the state for aid in getting an estimated \$8 million worth of berries picked. They added that the situation may become desperate if good weather and the picker shortage continue.

State Labor Commissioner Norman Niles, urged labor organizations to recruit workers needed in Oregon fields northward from Albany.

One grower said, at least, in the North Willamette district, said he wouldn't have been able to pick his strawberries this year. The hail and ice of Tuesday night all but ruined this year's crop for him.

Peter Schmidt explained Wednesday a survey revealed that practically all three ripe strawberries on his farm were completely rotted by the storm, and that many of the green berries as well as the foliage was "badly injured." There will be short pickings here, he added.

However, the overall check of the Tuesday storm showed that injury was very spotted, with most of the fields, particularly those in the hill areas, completely unharmed. The crop remains heavy, the berries big, and the ripening process moving along much more rapidly than pickers are showing up, growers said Wednesday.

Curb Asked On Schunk Case Publicity

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP)—A state Circuit Court today was asked to issue an order "to prevent further abuses of pre-trial publicity" in the case of Mayor Terry Schunk.

Edwin D. Hicks, an attorney for Schunk, said three prosecutors should be forbidden from making press releases which attack the integrity of the mayor or his lawyers.

Earlier, Hicks had protested a press release by the prosecutors. He asked the court to issue the order against three assistant attorneys general assigned to prosecute Schunk, Ralph W. G. Wyckoff, Elliott Cummings and John J. Pickett. Hicks also cited an editorial and articles in The Oregonian and asked that the newspaper be told not to publish such.

Hicks said the publication of such releases "may interfere with a fair trial in the courts and otherwise prejudice the due administration of justice."

Schunk is scheduled to go on trial here June 17 on a charge of perjury.

Hand Grenade Robber Foiled In Second Try

CHICAGO, June 6 (AP)—The hand grenade holdup man is the latest in Chicago crime.

On Tuesday a man walked into a currency exchange carrying a paper bag. He warned the clerk it contained a grenade that would blow her to bits. She handed over \$4,000 and he fled.

Today Mrs. Nannie Booth, cashier in another exchange, received a phone call from a man who said he was a police sergeant. He told her a man with a grenade in a bag was on his way and that she should not resist because the exchange was surrounded by detectives.

When a man fitting the telephoned description entered, Mrs. Booth reached for the phone. Unnerved, the man fled.

Police said no one at the station had called the exchange and that apparently Tuesday's robber was trying a repeat performance.
