

Committee Approves Foreign Aid Program Near Requested Sum

WASHINGTON, June 7 (U)—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved tonight a \$3,637,116,000 foreign aid program, cut only \$227,300,000 below President Eisenhower's request.

In addition, the committee approved the President's request for authority to reappropriate \$500 million dollars in military assistance funds left over from the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Cash Needed By Vanderbilt To Pay Bills

NEW YORK, June 7 (U)—A Supreme Court justice today heard the plea of Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., that "despite the name which I bear," he needs funds to pay rent and restaurant bills.

Justice Walter A. Lynch released to the author-traveler \$26,000 out of \$206,782.13 held to secure alimony payments to his former wife, Mrs. Patricia Wallace Vanderbilt.

Vanderbilt filed an affidavit earlier this week stating that "I have no significant capital or property and must support myself and pay all of my bills out of my income."

Vanderbilt receives \$60,000 annually from three trust funds, but half of that goes to a receiver to guarantee alimony payments to his former fifth wife.

The Vanderbilts were divorced in Nevada in June 1953. Two years ago a Supreme Court justice here upheld the validity of the divorce obtained by Vanderbilt and awarded Mrs. Vanderbilt \$250 a week, under a then untested law which permits a wife to receive separate maintenance even though her husband received a valid out-of-state divorce.

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'Maniac' With Hatchet Turns Out Playful

SPOKANE, Wash., June 7 (U)—A man armed with a hatchet and "laughing like a maniac" was creeping along the ground toward her back door, a suburban housewife told the sheriff's office today.

"Sometimes he jumps up and waves his arms and that awful hatchet around," Mrs. William H. Falke said excitedly over the telephone.

Deputies sped to the scene and made this report:

"No maniac just the old man playing cowboy and Indians with the kids."

The man was 40 years old, 5'10" tall, 160 lbs., brown hair, blue eyes, and a mustache. He was wearing a dark suit and a white shirt with a tie.

He was seen on June 6 at 5:30 p.m. near the back door of the house. He was holding a hatchet in his right hand.

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Giant Bomber Loses Rudder, Lands Safely

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., June 7 (U)—A giant B-50 bomber lost its rudder today in flight, but landed safely after its pilot practiced landing approaches on clouds for more than two hours.

Capt. Albert D. McKinnon of the 31st Bomb Squadron here brought the huge 10-engine bomber in for what onlookers called a beautiful landing with 27 men aboard who were not even shaken up.

McKinnon said the plane left Travis at 12:20 with extra personnel for what was to have been a brief instructional flight of from four to six hours. At 3:15 p. m., however, he said he heard a great rending noise at the rear of the big plane—162 feet behind him—when they were at 15,000 feet.

McKinnon said he and the copilot, Capt. Alvin E. Prothero, did not know what had happened until they felt their rudder controls go limp. There is no place in the fuselage of the giant ship, McKinnon said, where the rudder can be seen. The 20-foot-high rudder fell off while the plane was in a turn, he said.

They found other controls, including the tail elevators, functioning normally, and McKinnon said they straightened the plane out, took it up higher, and made some practice runs on clouds to see how well they could control the plane.

By 5:30 p. m. they were ready, McKinnon said.

He brought the great plane, with a wingspan of 220 feet, in as a long low approach and set it down in the middle of the runway at 5:52 p. m. He steered by using ailerons and varying the speed of his six piston engines and four jet motors.

The wreckage of the lost rudder was reported found tonight just outside the abandoned airport at Stockton.

Drain Woman Released on Killing Charge

ROSEBURG, June 7 (U)—Myrtle Miller, 57, Drain, was freed today in a preliminary hearing of a first degree murder charge filed in an information writ.

She had been accused of killing Garrett Alva Maupin, 82, Drain, at his home May 26.

Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff said there was not sufficient evidence brought out at the hearing to tie the woman to the charge.

Maupin was shot with a rifle. The woman was found in another room, wounded by a .22 caliber pistol shot. She was released earlier this week from a Eugene hospital.

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Oregon Chief Justice Honored

George Roseman, of Salem, chief justice of the Oregon Supreme Court, will be honored in absentia tomorrow by the University of Chicago Alumni Assn. for his 40 years as a jurist.
