Solo To Scandinavia

Beautiful Denmark Attracted by Tourists

COPENHAGEN, June 4—The city is built on the Island of Zealand bounded by Osterund, across which one sees Sweden, the Kattegat on the north, Isefjord on the east and the Baltic on the south. The rest of Denmark, is mainland and attached to Germany.

Because it is an island, much of the city is waterfront and the people are conscious of the sea, in decorative arts, food and recreation. Though there seem to be no mountains, in Denmark and even hills, the countryside is pleasant, with forests of beach even close to the city. On the North Zealand tour, which takes one north from the city to Rosengard Castle with its series of moats, one passes miles of beautifully forested game preserves now used for picnics by the outdoor-loving Copenhageners.

Copenhagen proper centers at Raadhus Square, where street trams may be boarded, sightseeing busses engaged and the pigeons fed. This attractive square is connected with the towered City Hall, and is bisected by a wide, tree-lined street, Vesterborg, where thousands promenade in the evening and on holidays, or go spinning on bicycles.

Traffic is something, though there are few cars to watch, the pedestrian takes life in hand when crossing the streets. There are some traffic lights, but otherwise the pedestrian is free to take his chances with the cycling Copenhageners.

Tivoli, amusement park extraordinary, is right handy to Central Station, Raadhus Square, Vesterborg and the fashionable shopping district. It's a triple block of gardens, walks, bandstands, sidewalk cafes, ballet theaters, variety shows, fun houses and chocolate stands. A very long pointed bodog-like affair seems popular here for refreshment. They are eaten out of hand after dipped in mustard and from the Danes' facial expressions, must be good.

Tivoli Is Fun for Everyone

City-owned Tivoli is more than an amusement park, it is a meeting place of all Copenhagen. The floral displays are beautiful, and the lighting effects worth consideration. The place has its own symphony orchestra and corps de ballet. There is a variety show troop and a popular music band. These give performances alternating, so everyone can stroll along and see and hear all.

Admission to Tivoli is free, though about 14¢ cents and much of the entertainment is free, though you can spend money on the expensive side-walk candy, mechanical boats, fun houses, souvenirs, ice cream cones, candy, ferris wheels, and other enterprises typical of an amusement park.

But Tivoli is different, though there are thousands of people there, and a large percent are children, there is no boisterousness and the place is orderly and clean. Everyone strolls, enjoying life. During the day the Tivoli Toy Guards (little boys in the red and white uniform and wearing the big black bushes of the palace guard) marching through the grounds to the rolling of their own small drums.

Tivoli is said to entertain four million guests during the summer season, sometimes as many as 50 thousand a night.

Vesterborg, which starts out a wide street with rows of trees on either side and a wide lane for parking cars or bicycles, becomes a narrow one-car-wide lane, later Fredericksberg Nygade then turns and eventually, after another change, is Ostergade, along which are the fashionable dress, silver and crafts shops.

Danes like to walk, therefore window shopping is a great institution here. There seems, however to be no lack of buying, and of course the eating places thrive. Contrary to advice by tourist bureaus and guide books, I prefer to select my eating places according to whim rather than fashion.

Interesting Eating Places

I ate a fine Smorrebrod (open faced sandwich) lunch with a delightful pastry at the Metropole cafe, attracted there by the display of pastries in the window. One selects his favorite from the display before taking a table. Later one day I was drawn into a basement shop by the wonderful looking strawberries and other fruit displayed in the window. Going down several steps I sat at a table and was served a large dish of huge, long pointed strawberries and a man-sized spoon to eat them. They cost about 45¢. Another customer was eating a composite of assorted fresh fruit with lots of juice, which I shall try next time.

I like to take my pick of sidewalk restaurant, where one sits, either outdoors or at a street-side window (open and greets youthful passersby who love to tap your table or grin as they pass.

I attended a "superscope" film of a German made musical comedy last night. The best "solo" seats cost 75¢. The show starts at 8:15, for Copenhageners are lovers of the night. The Palladium theater is very modern, seats comfortable and well filled, by the way. One Peer Frost, evidently very popular, played the revolving gold and white Wurlitzer organ, on which he rendered popular musical comedy numbers with many flourishes.

The film, in technicolor, was a German one, with Danish subtitles. Between understanding the German slightly, and recognizing an occasional Danish word from the text I got the general drift of the typical musical comedy plot, up to the point of the punch lines, which I didn't get, I therefore missed the point of the whole story and never did find out what the title "Tigerstudenten" ("Der Bittelstudent") meant, but I do know the student-hero looked and acted in wonderful swashbuckling Douglas Fairbanks style who must have come into money for he married the Countess. The heroine, one Waltraut Haas, was very loveable and a pair of cute blond twins who danced together were enchanting.

In fact my first visit to Copenhagen has been a huge success, and my next one of three days in July, should be as a happy conclusion to my Scandinavian holiday, as its introduction.
