

Red Chiefs' TV Talk Called Hopeful

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—Four experts agreed today that Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev's television interview last week indicated a greater Russian desire for real disarmament talks.

The disarmament question touched on in that interview, was one of several matters discussed during a special CBS-TV program "Comment on Khrushchev."

Excerpts from the filmed Khrushchev interview, first shown here by CBS last Sunday, were selected by the American experts, repeated on today's program, then answered by the Americans.

Appearing on the program were Dr. Philip Mosely, director of studies for the Council on Foreign Relations and former director of Columbia University's Russian Institute; Adm. Alan G. Kirk, former U.S. ambassador to Moscow; Harrison Salisbury, New York Times correspondent formerly stationed in Moscow; and Roscoe Drummond, Washington columnist for the New York Herald Tribune.

George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO who had been scheduled to take part in the program, withdrew last night. Meany said he felt the reshaping of parts of the original Khrushchev interview would give "further broadcast exposure and propaganda advantage" to the Russian leader.

All four of today's panelists found many statements by Khrushchev contradictory and lacking in straightforwardness but all agreed that the interview bore out an apparent new desire on the part of Russia for a real negotiations on disarmament.

Drummond said he believed "The Soviet Union has decided it wants to negotiate seriously and constructively about disarmament."

Kirk said he agreed, and found

in Khrushchev's remarks "a glimmer of a hope that they really do want to arrive at some workable solution of the problem."

The Soviet leader, said Salisbury, has arrived at a point where they would like to achieve some sort of understanding. They have taken a good hard look at this arms race.

Competitive Coexistence

Meany said the Soviets were pushing talk about disarmament, but warned that the United States "must press all the time for real inspection."

The American experts also discussed Khrushchev's prediction in discussing the competitive coexistence of Russian and American systems, that the grandchildren of present-day Americans would live under "socialism."

Mosely asserted that when Khrushchev said "socialism" he did not mean the socialism which is a "good word" in England, India and other parts of the world but meant "imposition of Communist dictatorship."

Drummond said the remarks on friendly competition were "most deceptive" because if Khrushchev had really meant them, "then he was proposing to end the cold war" and give East Germany and other satellite nations free elections.

Drummond added he did not believe this was what Khrushchev was proposing.

Ike Letter Boosts Gas Bill Hope

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Rep. Harris (D-Ar.) today made public a letter from President Eisenhower which Harris said boosts the chances of enactment of a natural gas bill this year.

Harris said he interpreted the letter as meaning Eisenhower is willing for Congress to ignore two administration-proposed amendments to a gas bill offered by the Arkansas Democrat.

This increases the measure's chances, he said, because "it was well known that with the two amendments there would be no gas bill—they just don't fit in with the purpose of the legislation."

The Harris bill would ease federal regulation of prices charged by independent natural gas producers. The administration amendments, however, would provide for tighter Federal Power Commission control over producer prices than now stipulated in the bill.

Harris read to a news conference a letter in which Eisenhower reaffirmed his belief "in the importance of enacting natural gas legislation at this time."

Speaking of the proposed amendments, Eisenhower said these had been offered "as of possible desirability, but do not represent my final conclusions."

Harris is chairman of the House Interstate Commerce Committee, which has just completed hearings on natural gas legislation.

The Harris bill has the same objective as one vetoed last year by Eisenhower because of what the President called "arrogant lobbying" in its behalf.

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50,000 Death Toll Visioned In A-Testing

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—Nuclear physicist Ralph E. Lapp estimated tonight that 50,000 persons will die within the next 30 years as a result of radioactive fallout from nuclear weapon testing.

The deadly fallout, Lapp said, induces leukemia (cancer of the blood). He estimated that it might cause leukemia in 100 of 1 per cent of the world's population.

The ratio, Lapp conceded, is small but when measured against the world's population of 2,800,000,000, the total figure is sizable.

However, Lapp said, his estimate of 50,000 deaths probably will never be proved. This is so, he explained, because it would be impossible to determine exactly how many persons will die from the disease naturally during that 30-year span.

Lapp appeared on The Mike Wallace television program, ABC-TV.

Nasser Says U.S. Tried To Kill Egypt

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—Egypt's President Nasser said today the United States has tried to "kill" his country by economic pressure and starvation.

Nasser also said his nation's economy is now tied to the Soviet flag "as much as it was tied to the Western bloc a few years ago."

His comments were made in an interview published in the current issue of Look magazine.

The Egyptian president said of the United States that he had "tried in every way to be friendly—without being a puppet. But we were never consulted, never taken into your confidence."

"I was building castles in the air in my relations with America," Nasser said.

As for Egypt's economic ties with the Soviet bloc, Nasser said he had to turn to Russia because "it was a question of life or death for Egypt."

Legislator's Body Found Near River

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—Searchers today found the body of a state legislator from North Dakota on the banks of the Sandy River, a few miles east of here.

Dan Power, 56, of Langdon, N.D., had been visiting a brother-in-law, Dr. Frank Spaulding, of Troutdale, when he failed to return from a fishing trip, a search was started last night.

Dr. Spaulding said Power had suffered from heart trouble.

Italy Premier Resignation Said Imminent

ROME, June 9 (AP)—Most Italian newspapers predicted today new government Premier Adone Zoli will resign within 48 hours in the worst political muddle in this country's postwar history.

Communists and Fascists alike were howling with glee at the courtly Christian Democrat Premier's dilemma.

The decision whether to resign it up to him, it will depend on whether there was an error in counting the Chamber of Deputies vote of confidence Friday night. His party said he won by one vote without counting Fascist ballots that were cast for him.

Whether the 18-year-old former anti-Fascist partisan fighter would accept a vote of confidence whose majority depended upon the vote of death Fascist supporters, he said he could not say.

Romulo Says Asian Courts Must Try GIs

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., June 9 (AP)—One of Asia's chief spokesmen in the United States, Carlos Romulo of the Philippines, tonight said Asian nations demand court jurisdiction over U.S. military personnel stationed there.

Romulo, Philippines ambassador to the United States, said the United Nations made the comment at a news conference in response to questions about the case of William Girard of Ocala, Fla.

Girard, 31, is an Army specialist third class facing trial in Japan on charges in the fatal shooting of a Japanese woman last January.

Romulo, commencement speaker at Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington, declined to comment directly on Girard's case because, he said, the case concerned American and Japanese authorities and not the Philippines.

The former Philippine army general said Asian countries believe jurisdiction of American military forces in cases involving Asian civilians is "a part and parcel" of national sovereignty.

Romulo said that because of this problem, negotiations for renewal of leases of large military bases in the Philippines are "stymied."

Search Continues For Missing Man In Molalla Area

MOLALLA, June 9 (AP)—Search continued today in a forested area here for 78-year-old Mark Franklin, who vanished May 11 after leaving his wife at a bus stop in Northeast Portland.

The Portland man's auto was found in a Crown-Zellerbach refueling station. It was in that area that about 30 men on horses concentrated their search today.

Poles Swamp Luxurious U.S. Display

POZNAN, Poland, June 9 (AP)—Thousands of luxury-starved Poles swamped the U.S. exhibits at the opening of the Poznan International Trade Fair today. Scores of extra police were called in to control them.

The American display of the products of 300 firms gave a dazzling answer to the now-diminished propaganda that capitalism means poverty. By nightfall about 30,000 Poles had seen it.

Twenty-nine countries packed their products into the 40-acre grounds. Western nations dominated the show.

The United States is taking part in the fair for the first time since World War II. Its exhibition is calculated both to boost business and to show the Communist world how the United States lives.

It includes a typical American home packed with the household appliances that most homemakers in this part of Europe can only dream of.

There were displays of textiles, radios, household gadgets, sports goods, toys, frozen foods and all the other consumer goods that crowd U.S. store windows but are rarities here.

Premier Gierzynski and other government officials were among the earliest visitors.

Missing in Raging Waters

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., June 9 (AP)—Five men were missing and feared drowned tonight in the wake of a tropical depression which knifed across Florida and south Georgia before moving into the Atlantic near Charleston, S.C.

Two other men reached safety after their 36-foot cabin cruiser was swamped and went down off the Florida coast near New Port Richey, about 30 miles northwest of Tampa.

Ed Flicker, 45, and his son Jack, 21, of DaDe City, stumbled ashore about noon after being in the water since 6 p.m. Saturday. They were taken to their home.

Missing were John DeWitt, Cole Shearer, C. W. Nodine, 78, and Woods, and Charles Swann, 26, all of DaDe City.

Edgemoor said authorities still hoped four of the five might be found since all wore life jackets when their cruiser Kinnebar was swamped and they went overboard.

Edgemoor quoted the elder Flicker as saying John DeWitt was flourishing in the surf, which was very choppy.

The Flickers said they assumed four of the five were going to stay near the scene of the wreck, while Shearer would attempt to swim to No. 4 blinker light near Anclote Key.

Clashes Mark Lebanon Vote

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Monday, June 10 (AP)—Candidates of the pro-Western government slate were reported leading in most races in Lebanon's parliamentary election today. But Premier Sami Solh was having a personal battle for his political life.

Two short but violent clashes in Beirut marked the election yesterday, the first of a series that is to continue through June. One person was reported by hospital authorities to have been killed and 11 injured. Police denied that anyone had been killed.

The government held back official results of the election in Beirut where 11 members of the 66-seat Parliament were being chosen. But pro-government candidates were reported leading in most of the districts.

Youngsters' Get Together

NEWBERG, June 9 (AP)—The five Thompson children got together here today for the first time in 20 years.

The "youngsters"—aged from 11 to 80—were last united in 1937 at their parents' 64th wedding anniversary. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Thompson, are demerced.

Oldest of the children is Mrs. Lera Rose, Newberg. Youngest is Mrs. Beulah Baird, of Scottville, Mich.

MOLALLA, June 9 (AP)—A Tillamook driver's pickup was demolished today when it skidded into a ditch and turned upside down about 3 1/2 miles east of here on Highway 211, but he suffered only a scratch, a witness reported.

Ivan Wells, a passing motorist, said he was two cars behind a pickup operated by Elbert Walker Dunswoorth when the accident occurred, around 4 p.m. Wells said Dunswoorth cut his hand and he supplied him with a Band-Aid after the driver crawled out of the wreckage.

Permanent Foreign Aid Supported

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Heavy support for putting U.S. nonmilitary foreign aid on a continuing basis was found in a survey of members of the National Planning Association.

The survey made public today showed 41 per cent of those polled favoring a program without a terminal date, 37 per cent preferred a fixed period of years and 20 per cent said the program should continue on a year-to-year basis.

The association, which describes itself as a nonpolitical organization devoted to planning in agriculture, business, labor and the professions, polled the 300 members of its board of trustees, standing committees and national council. Military aid was not covered. Replies were received from 34 per cent of the 300.

The association's survey, conducted last month showed the heaviest support for an indefinite continuation of the nonmilitary aid came from agriculture representatives, 57 per cent favoring it. The next heaviest support came from 46 per cent of the professional groups. The lowest support was from business representatives, with 38 per cent.

Of those answering the questionnaire, 53 per cent said the United States should continue the aid and only 7 per cent thought it should be ended.

Loans Preferred

Of those favoring the overseas assistance, 37 per cent said the present level of one billion dollars a year is too low, 30 per cent said it is too high and 30 per cent said it is adequate.

Of the fields represented, 40 per cent of business said the level is too high while 40 per cent of labor representatives said it is too low.

As to the form of the aid, 78 per cent favored mostly loans and 17 per cent favored mostly grants.

Forty-five per cent thought the present International Cooperation Administration should be transferred to a new government corporation within the State Department. As posed by the question "this corporation" would be under general policy guidance of the secretary of state but would be autonomous in operations and would not require annual spending authorization and appropriation.

Senate Expected To Approve Full Ike Aid Program

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) predicted today that the Senate will approve President Eisenhower's new foreign aid program "without any drastic cutbacks."

Aiken is a member of the Foreign Relations Committee which approved a new \$3,537,100,000 authorization last Friday by a 13-3 vote.

Despite efforts to cut it deeper, the measure is only \$227,300,000, or between six and seven per cent below the White House recommendation.

Sens. Long (D-La.) and Morse (D-Ore.), who cast two of the opposing votes, are expected to make new efforts to cut the measure further when it reaches the Senate floor, probably on Wednesday or Thursday.

Sen. Langer (R-Ind.), who has been ill for several months, cast the third vote against the new authorization, by proxy.

Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.), assistant Democratic floor leader, said in an effort to slash 800 million from the total in the committee and is not expected to renew that effort in the Senate.

Sen. Morse received permission to file a minority report which he would protest the "inevitable" cutbacks. His dissent is due Wednesday with expectations that Senate debate can start then or Thursday.

Stassen Tells Of Progress On Disarming

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen returned today from disarmament talks with the Russians at London, ready to check signals with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles on the new U.S. arms control plan.

"We are carefully and slowly making progress toward an agreement for partial measures constituting a first step in the arms control program," Stassen told reporters at the airport.

"We are moving in accordance with the policies of President Eisenhower and Secretary Dulles for a lasting peace," there are many problems remaining."

Stassen brought back with him, presumably for a review, the American plan to look to London two weeks ago. He will fly back to London in a few days.

As Eisenhower's disarmament aide Stassen has been consulting privately with his fellow delegates from Britain, France, Canada and Russia at the United Nations Disarmament subcommittee meeting in London. But so far he has not unveiled the new plan, which is understood to propose:

1. Aerial "open skies" inspection of U.S. and Soviet zones in the Arctic.

2. Trial suspension of atomic bomb testing.

3. Freezing production of atomic weapons.

4. Limited cutbacks in troop and conventional weapons strength.

Trotsky Wife Afraid To Talk, Solon States

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Chairman Walter (D-Pa.) said today Mrs. Leon Trotsky had agreed to testify before the House Committee on Un-American Activities before she suddenly left the United States.

Walter said he is convinced she was frightened into changing her mind.

Mrs. Trotsky, widow of the Russian revolutionary army commander, said in Mexico City yesterday she had never had any intention, when she visited the United States recently, of appearing before any congressional committee.

But Walter told a reporter today, "She had definitely agreed to appear. She was going to warn Americans not to be fooled." He did not elaborate on this. Walter said Mrs. Trotsky was in Washington awaiting her appearance before the committee when she decided to visit some old friends in New York.

"They obviously scared her to death," Walter said.

Mrs. Trotsky has lived for many years in Mexico. Her husband, who with V. I. Lenin was the principal architect of the Communist revolution in Russia, lost out to Joseph Stalin in a struggle for power after Lenin's death. He went into exile and was assassinated at his home near Mexico City in 1940.

Soviets Say Satellite Will Span Globe in 90 Minutes

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—Soviet Russia's first artificial earth satellite will circle the globe in 90 minutes and be visible through ordinary field glasses, Moscow radio reported today. It will look like a star in the sky.

A preview of the launching—date not yet announced—was given in a Moscow broadcast quoting the Soviet Magazine Ogonok:

"The launching will be done at dawn and watched by scientists from a concrete pillbox. The entire missile will consist of several rockets joined together, with the actual satellite in the head."

"The satellite—a metal ball—will break away from the rocket at a set altitude and proceed on its orbit around the globe, which will take 90 minutes to complete."

"The satellite will reflect the light of the sun at night, like the moon, and will resemble a tiny star visible through ordinary field glasses at sunrise or after sunset, when it will move across the horizon in the space of 12-13 minutes."

"After a time, the satellite will begin to lose speed and height and eventually be burnt up as it hits the lower atmosphere."

Nixon Backs Decision on Girard Case

EAST LANSING, Mich., June 9 (AP)—Vice President Nixon today defended the government's decision granting the Japanese jurisdiction in the William S. Girard case.

He said in a news conference following his commencement address at Michigan State University that the decision to allow the Japanese to try the American soldier was "correct."

Girard, 31, is charged with fatally shooting a Japanese woman shell gathered on a U.S. firing range in Japan last January.

"The decision of the Defense Department and the administration is correct based on all the facts," Nixon said.

Portland Cabbie To Chat With Ike

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—A Portland cab driver-owner—Berkeley R. Gustafson—will have a chat with President Eisenhower tomorrow in Washington.

Gustafson is one of 30 cab drivers in the country to win safe driving awards that include a three-day holiday in Detroit and the national capital.

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
