

Cascade Drive, Broadway Paving Projects Approved Over Protest

(Council acts also on Page 1)
Major Cascade Drive and Broadway paving projects were ordered by Salem City Council Monday night, over a protest from property owners who will share in costs of the work.

Councilmen also took new steps of their City Hall meeting to negotiate with East Salem Water District for selling city water in that suburban area and to resume conference with the City Service Commission over the outside work policy which recently led to a disputed suspension of three city firemen.

The Cascade Drive street improvement will extend from Edge-water street up the hill to Eola Drive. Mayor Robert F. White said this project was initiated by the Council upon petition of road users because it is an important thorough street that needs improvement and one where the abutting property owners never did have to pay for paving.

Objections came from Sam Tripp and Mrs. Francis Smith who said the matter should have been left to regular petition by the affected property owners who, like themselves, will have to pay. They said property owners there were probably of the opinion paving should wait until later.

The approved Broadway project is a resurfacing and widening to 44 feet of the North Salem street from Locust Street to the city limits. V. C. Turner, owner of one of the homes along that stretch, said he wanted to see plans first, to determine if the new grade would affect lawns. He questioned if the street were being widened to "racetrack" width.

Another engineer, Frank H. McClurg, declared pedestrian traffic wasn't enough to require sidewalks on both sides, as planned in the improvement. Alderman Earl O. Bushnell said the problem of school children alone was enough to require walks. Highland School Mothers Club and many nearby residents has asked him for them, he added.

The controversial civil service issue over outside jobs for city firemen came up only briefly at the City Hall meeting, when Mayor White assigned a committee comprising Aldermen E. E. Roth and Loring Grier and himself to again consult with the commission on its outside work rule.

A one-year suspension and other short work suspensions recently handed to firemen charged with doing outside work on their own time has precipitated the policy dispute. The Council has held up execution of the suspension orders. Mayor White said after the meeting it is possible the issue may result in resignation of the three.

Six-Jet Bomber Lands on Belly
WICHITA, Kan., June 10 (AP) — A B-47 six-jet bomber skidded to a belly landing on a runway smothered with fire-fighting foam at McConnell Air Force Base today after its landing gear jammed.

Base officials said the three-engine crew was unhurt. The instructor-pilot on the training flight from McConnell was Capt. Guy A. Peake. Other members of the crew included 2nd Lt. E. F. Jones, of Lakeview, Ore., co-pilot.

Lumber Workers' Request Rejected, Committee Says
PORTLAND, June 10 (AP) — The Lumber and Sawmill Workers' negotiating committee reported today that the Employers' Industry Committee had rejected a request from the union for a 5-cent hourly wage increase.

The union negotiators called an "emergency" meeting with the union's executive board for Wednesday and said that strong action will be recommended. Last week the union and the International Woodworkers of America reached tentative agreement with Georgia Pacific Corp. and the Willamette Valley Lumber Co. on a 5-cent increase on the board increase, retroactive to June 1.

A spokesman for the Sawmill Workers said he thought other plants would accept a similar agreement.

Salem Firm Wins Seedling Contract
PORTLAND, June 10 (AP) — The Interior Department office here today announced that John B. Woods & Sons, Inc., Salem, has been awarded a \$197,747 contract for production of 14 million forest tree seedlings.

The project involves planting of various types of seedlings needed for the 1957-58 planting season in Western Oregon.

Schrunk is scheduled to go on trial here next Monday on a charge of perjury. He is accused of lying to the grand jury when he stated that he did not accept a bribe in a bid at the 8213 Club here when he was sheriff in 1955.

Pratum Co-op Votes Change In Financing

PRATUM, June 10 (AP) — The Pratum Co-op Warehouse members favored a change tonight in the association bylaws which would permit changing the certificates of earnings into \$500 membership certificates.

At present, manager Herbert Wiley explained, 25 per cent of the dividends is paid back to the members in cash and the remaining 75 per cent has been placed in revolving certificates.

The 25 per cent cash payments would be continued, the manager explained. He added that when sufficient amounts had been accumulated from each 75 per cent to make a \$500 certificate for a member, his remaining stock from further 75 per cent dividends would be placed in revolving certificates to be picked up at approximately eight year periods.

It was also stated that the membership certificates would be redeemable in case of death or if the member would sell out his farm business and no longer have use for the membership in the cooperative.

Final action on the proposed new financial structure will be taken at the annual meeting set for July 11. Elmer Meyer, Silvertown, who will construct the new addition, said that the annex would be ready for use for this season's harvest.

Carpenters Union Boss Mum in Fraud

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP) — President Maurice A. Hutcheson of the powerful Carpenters Union resorted to the Fifth Amendment today in the face of evidence linking him to fast, fat profits in an Indiana highway scandal.

He did two other top officials of the union. Hutcheson, 50, who is also a vice president and member of the executive board of the AFL-CIO, said it might incriminate him to answer questions about what Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) called "this conspiracy against the federal and state governments."

A Senate Public Works subcommittee of which Gore is chairman brought out testimony and documents indicating Hutcheson was in a five-way split of some \$60,000 in profits on right-of-way land sales.

At one point in his testimony, Hutcheson said: "I want to state that I have never used any brotherhood funds for anything except brotherhood business since I have been in office."

The subcommittee itself has uncovered no indication that union money figured in the highway scandals.

Telegraphers Union Extends Negotiations
NEW YORK, June 10 (AP) — Commissioner Walter Magglio of the U.S. Mediation and Conciliation Service, announced today that the Associated Press and the Commercial Telegraphers' Union had agreed to extend their contract until midnight Wednesday.

The federal service had summoned both parties to a meeting today in an effort to settle a wage dispute.

Magglio said in a statement that at his request "the parties have agreed to extend their contract to midnight Wednesday, June 12. A further meeting has been scheduled for 10:15 a.m. Tuesday at the office of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service."

Magglio said both parties agreed that he would speak for them. He said that neither side had changed its position.

Candy Maker's Rites At Portland Today
PORTLAND, June 10 (AP) — Requiem mass will be said Tuesday morning at Portland's Holy Redeemer Catholic Church for Robert T. Burns Sr., 83, a retired candy maker who died Friday.

He was born in Indiana and from 1913 to 1918 owned the Spokane Wash. Candy Co. From 1920 to retirement in 1948 he was owner or manager of candy making firms in Portland.

Improvements Slated for Seven Parks

At least seven city parks are tentatively earmarked for major improvements if Salem voters approve a \$150,000 bond issue in a special July 11 election.

The election was set Monday night by Salem City Council at its regular City Hall meeting.

Although the ballot issue will not specify where the money is to be spent, the City Council's preliminary priorities from a park department list of needs have been given these parks:

Bush Park, \$71,500; Wallace Marine Park, \$19,600; Highland, \$14,500; Fairmount, \$9,700; West Salem, \$8,000; River Road, \$5,500; Fairgrounds Road, \$6,000.

Many aldermen also appeared to favor \$7,000 for Claremont Street park on Kingwood Heights. Tentatively left out were Englewood and Pringle park projects and some additional projects recommended for the parks on the priority list.

The aldermen defeated the proposed \$150,000 bond issue for purchase of parkland. From a list of five parks board-recommended sites, priority had been given a 100-acre site in the Glen Creek area and a 47-acre site near Hollywood Bowl in North Salem.

Aldermen Loring Grier told fellow aldermen he felt city voters in the past had defeated some park issues because the city had not spent enough money improving parks already established. He suggested if the \$150,000 parks improvement issues passes, and money is spent on those parks this year, then the voters might be more favorable to an acquisition program at the primary election next May.

Aldermen also indicated they would put some plan of fund-raising for a Salem Armory Auditorium project on the May ballot.

Another long-talked-of plan that might get to the voters by then is a proposed city charter change to make the office of city treasurer appointive instead of elective. This has been recommended by official auditors employed by the city and by many city officials.

Five Charged With Liquor Possession

Silvertown Hospital Founders Ponder By-Law Change

SILVERTOWN, June 10 (AP) — At a special meeting of founding members of the Silvertown Hospital Association on Monday night, a committee of three was appointed to consider revision of the by-laws.

Dr. A. W. Simmons presided at the meeting, where it was explained that by-laws now permitted only founding members to vote. It was pointed out that all board members are not founding members, making it impossible for the board of directors to carry on the business of the hospital.

Also pointed out that less than 15 members of the founding group are still in Silvertown.

The committee members appointed include Max Hubbs, Harry Carson, Jr. and Dr. P. A. Loe. These will make a study of the by-laws as now existing with proposed amendments and report back at a July meeting.

Serving on the board now are Dr. W. A. Simmons, C. A. Hande, Harlan Mae Charles Hoyt, Hugh R. Hanger, Maurice Snodgrass, Mrs. Henry Pritzlaff, Harry Rich and Jack Fish.

Teamsters Should 'Clean House' By Fall Meeting, Reuther Says

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP) — Walter Reuther, AFL-CIO vice president, said tonight the Teamsters Union should be able to demonstrate by September, when the union's convention will be held, whether it can "clean its own house."

"But if they fail," Reuther said, "if they fail to comply with the ethical codes of the AFL-CIO, then we will have no recourse excepting to expel them."

Reuther said the AFL-CIO has set no time schedule for the Teamsters and "we're not going to crowd them," but he said September ought to be roughly "the deadline by which we can begin to find out whether they are able to do this job internally."

The AFL-CIO has postponed indefinitely a meeting of its ethical practices committee on charges the Teamsters Union is corruptly dominated. The move was announced after action was taken within the union to oust Dave Beck as Teamster president.

Beck, subjected to court action and a Senate inquiry into his handling of union funds, has announced he would not seek reelection as Teamster president at the union's convention.

In a transcribed radio interview "NBS Reporters' Roundup," Reuther said he does not believe the Teamsters should give Beck "any further considerations in the way of pensions or in the way of salary after he is removed from office."

"I think we certainly have demonstrated how we feel about Mr. Beck," Reuther added. "We think he's a disgrace to the American labor movement; we think he's a disgrace to America."

Girl Recalls Road Warning Seconds Late

A 7-year-old Salem girl hit by a car Monday evening remembered her mother's advice of never walking with her back to oncoming traffic a moment too late.

The youngster, Edna Kay Wieggers, 4083 Glendale St., sustained apparently minor injuries when she was hit by a car bumper at 5:30 p.m. on Lancaster and Silverton roads.

State policeman Floyd O. West said the girl was walking home with traffic in back of her when she recalled her mother said she should walk on the side of the road of oncoming traffic.

As she prepared to cross the road she was hit by a car operated by Virgil Coy Jackson, Silvertown, West stated.

Edna suffered minor bruises and was not hospitalized.

La Grande Fire Takes Three Lives

LA GRANDE, June 10 (AP) — A blaze raged through two rooms of a house here early today and claimed three lives.

Joseph L. Crabtree, 76, a retired logger, and his wife, Elizabeth, aged 65, suffocated. Their grandson, Ronnie Darcangelo, 6, was burned fatally.

Ronnie's parents, Chief Boatswain's Mate Angelo Darcangelo, and his wife, jumped to safety from a second-floor bedroom window. They were taken to a hospital where their condition was reported as satisfactory.

The fire was spotted by neighbors. It was limited to the living room, where the boy was sleeping on a davenport, and to the Crabtree's bedroom.

The Darcangelos tried to rescue their son but were forced back by flames and had to jump.

Darcangelo had been transferred by the Navy from Washington, D. C., to San Diego and the family had stopped here to visit his wife's parents.

\$500 Theft From Church Reported

Salem police received a report last Monday night that \$500 to \$600 in cash and checks was stolen from Christ Lutheran Church, 1750 State St.

Church treasurer T. F. Ellinger, told officers the money, representing part of Sunday's collection, was taken from a church office Sunday or Monday.

A hospital attendant said late last night Mrs. Lambert was in "fair" condition.

Officer Robert Anderson said Christiansen was cited for failure to drive on the right side of the highway in the 5:10 p.m. accident.

Youth Who Shot at Police Starts Term

THE DALLAS, June 10 (AP) — Police today took Ernest LeRoy Smith, 19, to the state penitentiary at Salem to start serving an eight-year term to which he was sentenced last Thursday.

Smith was convicted last month on a charge of assault with intent to kill. Circuit Judge Malcolm Wilkinson sentenced him after rejecting his petition for a new trial.

Smith was accused of firing at Robert Brower, a city policeman, in March. Two bullets hit Brower's police car as he tried to stop Smith's speeding vehicle but did not wound Brower.

The chase wound up with Smith's arrest east of here.
