

Dental Clinic Authorized By Planning Commission

Authority for a dental clinic building in a residential neighborhood at Miller and South Liberty Streets was granted Tuesday night by Salem Planning Commission.

Commissioners also heard a strong protest against expansion of Westwood Products plant at Bellevue and 21st Streets, without taking action, and gave a favorable reaction to a South Salem Friends Church expansion project.

The dental clinic action was an official variance granted by 3 to 1 vote to Dr. R. W. White, owner of the building, to erect a one-story clinic on Miller Street, west of Liberty, provided that a 20-foot setback from the street is maintained in keeping with the residential block.

Objecting were Commissioners Stuart H. Compton and U. S. Page who said they doubted there was justification for using the variance procedure. Compton said he felt the neighborhood ready for a zone change to permit such uses, however.

Variance also was granted to the Friends Church for expanding the building by a 10-foot addition on the front, provided the church

The governor, in an answer to Rep. Walter Norblad said that Oregon has not been taking part in such a program because the state public welfare commission could not afford to run such a program.

The governor added that he hoped a suitable plan could be worked out so that Oregon could take advantage of the surplus.

Youths Held Here Wanted For Robbery

Three southern youths, arrested early Tuesday morning by Salem police on charges of carrying concealed weapons, were found to be wanted by North Carolina authorities on numerous charges, among them armed robbery.

Held in city jail were Larry Dennis Simmons, 18, James Roland Hodges, 17, and Donald Lee Hodges, 16.

Summons pleaded guilty to the weapons charge in Municipal Court and was fined \$75. Both Hodges and Hodges were certified to appear in juvenile court.

Police arrested the trio near the Marion Street bridge and found three rifles and two pistols in their car.

Their car was found to be stolen and FBI agents entered the case on a possible violation of the Dyer Act which covers interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle.

A detective said Winston-Salem, N. C. police wired they wanted the youths on charges of breaking and entry, armed robbery and safe jobs pulled in North Carolina.

Salem police said the youths admitted breaking into many service stations and grocery stores enroute to Oregon. A set of leg irons and a police night stick were found in their car.

A permanent plan for clustered flags to decorate Salem streets on special occasions was set in motion Tuesday by Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber directors authorized a committee to arrange for purchase of 60 sets of flags as a starter this year, with gradual expansion of the project in coming years.

As outlined by committee chairman Reynolds Allen, the flag plan calls for affixing a metal collar to steel utility poles. Each collar would have four sockets for U. S. Oregon, Salem and welcome flags.

Allen said the plan would call for purchase of the flags and equipment, instead of merely paying some company to decorate as in recent years. The change would result in safer streets than under the present system of stringing decorations across the streets he said.

The governor added that he hoped a suitable plan could be worked out so that Oregon could take advantage of the surplus.

W. D. Hinson of Portland, trust officer of the U. S. National Bank, will discuss "The Impact of Estate and Inheritance Tax on Real Estate" at a luncheon meeting today.

Morning sessions will be devoted to discussions of contract and listings. Leever Johnson, instructor in real estate at the University of Oregon, will talk on listing prices this afternoon and the meeting will conclude with a session on buyers.

"Oregon's Economic Future" is the topic selected by Burton Wood, head of agricultural economics at Oregon State College, for his Thursday noon talk.

Earnest money contracts and sale of amenities will be topics at the morning session and basic knowledge and offer records needed by the realtor will be discussed in the afternoon.

All sessions will be held at the Senator Hotel. Burton W. Dunn, educational supervisor of the State Real Estate Department, will serve as chairman.

Membership in County Employees Group Pushes 100

Membership in the six-month-old Marion County Employees Association is pushing 100 with some 85 members now enrolled in the group, according to a report at a Tuesday night meeting of the association.

Seventeen new members have joined the association in the past month, Herb Totten, president, said.

Members voted Tuesday night to sponsor an all-county employees' picnic sometime late in July. Mrs. Jan Bates will head the picnic committee.

A good response from members also has been received on the first edition of the association's bulletin, the Marion County Courier, published last month, Totten said.

Flag Clusters Ordered For Street Decorations

A permanent plan for clustered flags to decorate Salem streets on special occasions was set in motion Tuesday by Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber directors authorized a committee to arrange for purchase of 60 sets of flags as a starter this year, with gradual expansion of the project in coming years.

As outlined by committee chairman Reynolds Allen, the flag plan calls for affixing a metal collar to steel utility poles. Each collar would have four sockets for U. S. Oregon, Salem and welcome flags.

Allen said the plan would call for purchase of the flags and equipment, instead of merely paying some company to decorate as in recent years. The change would result in safer streets than under the present system of stringing decorations across the streets he said.

Flags would be put up during major conventions and holiday observances. They are to be purchased by the business houses of the city.

On Allen's committee are Donald Peterson, Lawrence Flagg, Robert Brownell, Russell Bonesteel and Edwin H. Armstrong.

Salem Chamber's board in its Tuesday meeting also appointed a committee to follow up on the Salem Army project that calls for incorporating a civic auditorium suitable for major events and conventions.

State and federal funds are now available if the city and Marion County arrange to supplement them with some \$250,000. On the civic committee to coordinate this effort are Wallace Bonesteel, chairman, Elton H. Thompson, William H. Hammond, Gardner Knapp, Lee V. Ormair, Elmer Berg and Robert K. Powell.

The chamber board voted to pay \$125 for bus transportation and feeding of the South Salem High band as part of the Salem effort to finance the local float for the Rose Festival parade in Portland Saturday.
