It was the first such naval review in the United States in half a century—a spectacle that drew tens of thousands of onlookers.

Secretary of Defense Wilson and fellow officials were aboard the Cannbera which joined two other Navy cruisers in steaming slowly, at seven knots, down the 14-mile-long, double line of warships.

The ships riding at anchor stretched outward through Hampton Roads from the Norfolk Naval Base, their seaward ends lost from sight in the blue haze of a hot afternoon.

As the review ships started down the line a simultaneous salute thundered out from the guns of the ships—red flashes and white smoke lacking of from muzzle.

Over the stern of the Cannbera a missile, bright green and white, symbolized the protection for the surface fleet in an era of jet warplanes. Overhead circled and wheeled helicopters, balloons and airplanes.

The Cannbers steamed slowly on down the line past today's electronic-berained warships.

Off to port was the USS Saratoga, newest and mightiest flat-top of any navy.

Here was a sight seldom seen—perhaps to be seen many years longer—a tall-masted white-hulled woodjammer. Her crew manned the yards, high aloft.

on the square sail rig of the brigantine schooner.

The Cannbers continued on, saluted by each ship of many waves—114 of them. Thirty-three were foreign, 81 American. As each foreign ship was passed, the Cannbera's band played the national anthem of that country.

Wrong Turn Puts Glider Across English Channel

LONDON, June 12 (AP)—A British glider ace took a wrong turning in the clouds yesterday and became the fifth man ever to glide across the English Channel.

Cdr. G.A.J. Goodhart, on his return home today, said he set out from Lasham, Hampshire, for the 100-mile trip to the English Channel port of Dover. When he got there he banked around for the return trip and climbed into a cloud at 6,000 feet.

"When I came out I found myself several miles over the channel with a strong wind blowing from Dover," he said.

Ways to Raise City Revenue Suggested

Several suggestions for increasing city revenues came up at the Salem city budget meeting Wednesday night, when a balanced 1957-58 budget, a third of a million dollars larger than the current one, was approved.

The committee, chaired by Alderman Edward E. Roth, approved a recommendation by the sub-committee on revenue that the city council review all city licenses with a view toward possible fee increases.

The sub-committee also recommended that rental and other service fees at the city airport be increased by 10 per cent. This would make the airport self-supporting, it was reported.

A recommendation that an anticipated \$222,000 expected to accrue to city coffers from an increase in the state liquor tax, be funneled into the emergency fund, also was approved.

Biggest single item in the new \$4,873,171 budget, yet to be given final approval by the city council, is a \$1,307,568 spending program by the City Water Department.

Major share there is a new water line to Stayton island.

The new budget grants no outright wage increases. It allows \$20,000 for salary adjustments of city employees later in the year. Only other personnel change involved the switching of a part-time file employee to the city engineer's office to full-time.

Last night's meeting of the entire budget committee climaxed several weeks of individual subcommittee meetings to consider some eight individual budget divisions. Only minor changes, if any, on the original budget was turned in by sub-committees.

Kennedy Says Reports Indicate Brewster Wrong

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Robert F. Kennedy testified today the Senate investigations subcommittee received information indicating reports filed with the Labor Department by Frank W. Brewster "were not accurate."

Kennedy, chief counsel of the subcommittee, testified as the government's only witness in the contempt of Congress trial of Brewster, western boss of the Teamsters Union. He said the subcommittee also had information indicating there had been a misappropriation of funds of the Western Conference of Teamsters and of the union's Joint Council No. 28 in Seattle.

Kennedy was called to the stand to back up the government's contention that the subcommittee had authority to demand that Brewster produce records of the Western Conference and the Joint Council and to submit to questioning.

The 31-count indictment against Brewster, 60, stemmed from his refusal to produce records or answer questions when he appeared before the subcommittee in January.

He contended then, and his attorneys were contending now, that the subcommittee lacked authority to inquire into internal affairs of labor unions.

Motion for Removal of DA Dismissed

ROSEBURG, June 12 (AP)—Circuit Judge Carl W. Wimberty dismissed a motion to remove Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson from office.

But a complaint challenging Thompson's right to hold the job was immediately refiled by James G. Richardson, Douglas County Republican chairman.

Thompson, a Democrat, was appointed May 2 by Gov. Holmes, also a Democrat, to succeed Republican Robert M. Sully, who quit to resume private law practice.

The local GOP contends a Republican should have been named, despite the fact that Sully had been nominated by both parties in May, 1954, primary, and was both nominations.

State law provides that an individual leaving office should be replaced by a member of his own political party.

Thompson asked for the dismissal. The judge sustained his motion as the grounds that the action was not instituted by the district attorney or anyone else authorized to bring such proceedings.

Count Against Former State Officer Dropped

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—U.S. District Judge Gus Solomon today dismissed the indictment against one of seven persons accused of mail fraud in promoting an Estacada, Ore., plywood plant.

"We don't want to endanger anybody's life," Solomon said as he dismissed the charge against Richard Williams, 60, Millwaukie, Ore., a former Oregon State Police lieutenant.

Williams became ill on the witness stand and his physician told the court Williams' condition is "very serious." He has a history of heart trouble, the doctor said.

One of the remaining six defendants charged in connection with the Mt. Hood Hardware and Plywood Cooperative also took the stand today.

The remaining defendants in the trial are Glenn R. Munkers, Fredrick Alas Wright, Archibald L. Bomes and W. W. Lock, all of Salem; and Harold Martin of Portland.

Two other men earlier indicted in the case are awaiting sentence. One is Edgar R. Ervin, Seattle and Portland, who pleaded guilty to two charges of a 13-count indictment. The other is Robert Montgomery, 40, Hood River, who has pleaded guilty to one count.

Plane Crash Kills Two Men From Idaho

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, June 12 (AP)—Two Lewiston men were killed tonight when their light Air National Guard plane crashed and bursted in a grain field 13 miles southeast of here.

The pilot was identified as David W. Neuberger, 225, and the passenger as Thomas F. Speedy Jr., 24.

The single-engine L18 liaison plane crashed while on a training flight from Gowanus Field near Boise.
