## Salem Man Pleads Innocent to Salmon Snagging Charge

STAYTON, June 12—Robert I. Bellensie, 18, of 1263 Saginaw St., Bellensie, pleaded innocent today in Stayton Justice Court on a charge of taking salmon by prohibited methods.

The case was continued for trial. Bellensie was cited into court Friday by state police on the charge involving snagging chinook salmon near the fish ladder at the upper Stayton dam in the North Santiam River.

**Hearings** on two juveniles cited to appear in Marion County Juvenile Court today on similar charges have been postponed until June 11.

## Bridge Fall Brings Suit

The collapse of Mary's Creek bridge in the upper Santiam canyon over a year ago was the basis of a \$2,000 damage suit filed Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court.

**Jarvis Harris**, Idanha, sued that amount in a suit against the Young & Morgan Lumber Co. and the Idanha Lumber Co. for damage to his logging truck when the bridge collapsed.

**Colonial Insurance Company**, which paid Harris \$223 in damages for the truck, is co-defendant in the suit.

**Harris** is hauling timber on contract for Young & Morgan on land owned by the Idanha Lumber Co., when the accident occurred, the complaint states.

## Blind Association Board to Meet on State Legislation

The executive board of the Oregon Council of the Blind will meet Friday at Medford to hear reports on legislation, fund raising and convention planning. Attending from Salem will be Fred Krepela, first vice president, and Nina May Nunn, recording secretary.

The Oregon group reports that of five proposed bills it submitted this year to state legislators, four have become law.

The bills were HB 40, increasing the Commission from the Blind from seven to nine members; HB 401, raising the appropriation of money for blind college students; HB 44, giving Social Security benefits to blind workers in the commission's brown shops; and HB 47, giving preference to blind vendors and snack bar operators on public property.

## 'House Should Sell Itself,' Real Estate Meeting Told

One-hundred thirteen real estate men and women from Marion, Polk and Yamhill Counties attended the first day of a two-day real estate school sponsored by the Oregon Real Estate Department at the Seemaster Hotel Wednesday.

They were told by Ed Luchs, sales manager for realtor John Clarke, Portland, that a good real estate salesman should perform a service for his client, by analyzing his needs and then finding him a house that will fit those needs best. "house should sell itself," he said.

Prof. Levern R. Johnson of the University of Oregon recommended that, to lessen inheritance taxes, married couples should have their estates in joint ownership when the value is in five figures. If the estate is worth \$100,000 or more, he advised separate ownership. Prof. Johnson also discussed these laws of contracts.

Burton V. Dunn, educational supervisor of the Department of Real Estate, presided. He said his department aimed to provide "not only knowledge of the law, but of the ethics of real estate dealing."
