(Continued from preceding page) and didn't appear likely to consent for first place. Ron Delany, Villanova's Olympic 1,000-meter king, failed to qualify in the 800 in 1:52.1. Ed Collymore of the Wildcats was right up with the leaders in the 200 with 21.4, and tomorrow Villanova has its great pole-vaulter, Don Bragg, and Gearty also is in the mile.

Only two NCAA records were broken—Morrow's 100 and Bell's broad jump, that took out the 26 feet 6 inches set in 1947 by Willie Steele of San Diego State.

Mark Set in 1948

The world's record by Morrow was set in 1948 by Mel Patton of Southern California and tied in 1954 by Hector Hogan of Australia. James Golladay of Northwestern in 1965 and Leamon King of California and Steve in 1950.

Giam A. Oerter of Kansas buried the discus 133 feet 7 inches this afternoon to easily lead qualifiers in the opening event of the big meet.

The throw by the Olympic champion was more than six feet under the NCAA record but was far ahead of anything else produced by the field of 15 contestants.

Jay Silvester of Utah State was second in the qualifying with 170 feet 9 3/4 inches and Fred Peters of Stanford was next, with 164 feet 9 3/4 inches.

Others who qualified for the finals tomorrow were Ralph Yoder, Iowa State, 163 1/2; Herman Johnson, Texas A&M 162-8 3/4; Ken Rantoum, Manhattan, 158-3 1/4; John Tullar, Penn State, 157-9 3/4.

Pale Vaulters Set

The fellows who soar 15 feet in the pole vault—and there are three who have done it—will be going all out against each other for the very start tomorrow night.

The world's record claimant is in the field. He's Bob Gutowski of Occidental, who cleared the bar at 15 3/4 inches to better the storiad 15 feet, 7 3/4 inches set by Cornelius Warmerdam 15 years ago. It hasn't yet been accepted as a world's record, however.

The mile run, featuring Ron Delany of Villanova, one of the men who has bettered four minutes, and the 3-mile with three NCAA record holders—Bob House of California, James Realty of North Carolina and Lewis Stieglitz of Connecticut—also have no prelims and will go on as finals tomorrow night.

(Continued from preceding page) Australia, the British open King, who bagged three of the last four holes for a 72 and 143.

Also back in the pack were Dr. Cary Middlecott, the high-strung defending champion, at 146 and poor old hard-luck Sam Sneed at 148 after shooting a second straight 74. Julius Boros, the Philadelphia 1932 open Champion who had an opening 69, shot a scrambling 75 for 144.

Players shooting 150 and better—there were 53 of them—qualified for the double-round final. Chief casualty in the cutoff were Arnold Palmer (152), second leading money winner, Ted Kroll (152), Mike Souchak (152), Dutch Harrison (152), Tommy Bolt (withdrew) and a trio of former champions, Ed Furgol (152), Lloyd Mangrum (155) and Gene Sarazen (158).

This is the third time that Patton has become a pest to the professionals in a Major Tournament.

In the 1954 masters, when an amateur never has won the belt, jumblerman led the first round and finished, with the help of a hole-in-one, stroke back of Hogap and Sneed, who had a playoff with Sneed the victor.

Chatting Patton

Later that year at Baltusrol Patton, spraying, scrambling and chatting amiably as he went along, led the first round with a 69 but blew to a 76 the next day. No amateur has seriously threatened the pros in the open since Johnny Goodman won in 1933.

Mayer, 32, is a regular on the tournament trail whose best performance this year was a second place finish in the Colonial Invitational at Fort Worth.

His other dramatic shot was on the 18th where he teed his eagle, "guess you ought to have a birdie here." So he put his approach 15 inches of the cup and sank for a birdie three.

He missed only two fairways—that is, missed them badly—and commented later: "I played good golf. Good for me, that is. In fact, darn good for anybody."

Venturi, a pro for less than a year who as an amateur in the 1956 masters led until the final round, was steady as par itself in his round of 35-36. On the back nine, he had nine straight pars.
