

Radar Crew Directs Rescue of Pilot 60 Miles From Crash

ONTARIO, Calif., June 15 (U.P.)—A radar crew 40 miles from the scene located a downed pilot to-night and directed his dramatic rescue by helicopter from a mountain peak 15 miles north of Ontario.

Muriel Reed, Los Angeles, was plucked from his wrecked light plane, teetering on the edge of a deep canyon, moments before darkness blanketed the Southern California's San Bernardino Mountains.

The operation was directed by

two Civil Aeronautics Administration radar operators at Long Beach Municipal Airport. They heard Reed's first radio call to Ontario International Airport reporting the crash.

Stays in Plane

Reed, a student pilot, stayed in the crashed plane and tried to direct rescuers to the site, but was unable to say just where he was. On the basis of his information, a helicopter was dispatched from El Toro Marine Air Base to Santiago Peak in the Santa Ana Mountains.

Reed and Lt. D. E. Long, the rescue pilot, were on different radio frequencies and unable to communicate with each other, so radarman Leslie A. Songstad and James W. Oliver in the Long Beach tower took over.

Their special directional finding radar equipment, taking a fix on Reed's radio signal, placed him on Oucumonga Peak, 30 miles north of where he thought he was. The radarman directed Long to the crash.

Copter Couldn't Land

Because of the rough terrain the helicopter could not land. With Oliver calling signals, a sling was lowered and Reed was told how to fasten himself into it. He was pulled out at 8:30 p.m., an hour and a half after the accident, and flown to Ontario Airport, where his injuries were found to be minor.

Reed said he was trying to find Ontario Airport when he crashed into the 8,911-foot peak.

City Resident, 82, Succumbs

George Wilbur Needham, 82, of 531 Kingwood Ave., died Saturday at his home. He was a barber, storekeeper and draftsman.

He was born in the Roseville district south of Salem on Sept. 22, 1875. He was the son of I. C. Needham and Clara Doty Needham. His father crossed the plains from Indiana in a covered wagon, settling in Tangent, and in 1879 became one of the earliest settlers of the Red Hills section.

George Needham started as a barber in Salem in 1908, and operated a shop here until 1930. In that year he moved to Langlois, Ore., on the coast, where he operated a service station and a small general store. He later went to Brookings, Ore., where he manufactured dishes. He came back to Salem in 1948.

He was married in 1897 to Anna Simmons, who died in 1948. In 1951 he wed Mrs. Mae White of West Salem, who survives.

Needham had two sons, Charles and Harley Needham, both of whom died a few years ago.

Other survivors besides his widow are G. D. Needham and W. I. Needham, a sister, Mrs. Mark McFarland of West Salem; and four grandchildren, Virgil, Perry, Delores and Noel, all of Portland.

Funeral services are pending at the Clough-Barrick Funeral Home.

Italy, France Areas Swept By Floods

LONDON, June 15 (U.P.)—Floods swept northern Italy and the Alpine districts of France, Switzerland and Austria today, isolating villages, destroying buildings, ripping out bridges and blocking roads with landslides.

Three persons were drowned in France and Italy. Damage to crops, livestock and property in northern Italy alone was estimated at 20 million dollars.

Heavy rains, which heralded the first two weeks of June the wettest in 100 years, brought on the deluge in the Alpine area.
