Western Pine Orders Up From Last Week

PORTLAND, June 20 (AP)—Orders, shipments and production of western pine were up last week compared with the previous week. Production figures were 89,940,000 feet, 83,111,000 feet, and 89,310,000 feet.

Orders totaled 85,680,000 feet, compared with 74,597,000 feet for the previous week and 99,028,000 feet for the corresponding week last year. Similar comparison of shipments were 87,288,000 feet, 80,774,000 feet, and 82,282,000 feet.
