

Brownsville Hosts Pioneers This Week for 70th Picnic

BROWNVILLE, June 20—This is the week that Oregon's remaining pioneers and their descendants trek to Brownsville in southern Linn County for the 70th annual Pioneer Picnic and Reunion.

In June 1867 a group of early day residents gathered in Crawfordville, a few miles east of Brownsville, and organized the Linn County Pioneer Association. This year's theme, "Then and Now," continues that spirit of pioneering.

Opening event is a 6:45 Junior Legion baseball game Thursday evening between Central Linn, composed of players from Halsey, Brownsville and Sheed, and the Scio club.

Later at 8:30 Queen Janice Bault of Pioneer will be crowned coronation events in the city park where all events but parades are scheduled. Princesses will be Sharon Coter and Judith Calhoun.

Music by Les Browns

Les Browns' orchestra is furnishing music for the Queen's Ball following the coronation.

A carnival is also located in the park.

First Friday event is a children's parade at 1 p.m. downtown, followed at 1:30 by pictures of "old timers" back for the reunion. A park platform program at 2 p.m. features music, address of welcome by Brownsville Mayor Russell Taylor, presentation of the royal court, and novelty numbers.

Big event for kiddies is staged at 4 o'clock in the large sawdust covered arena near the midway. Children 4 to 12 years old will be turned loose in the fifth annual penny scramble, with scores of dimes and nickels added to the pennies mixed in the sawdust.

Loggers Jamboree

The loggers jamboree at 8:30 in the evening features axe throwing, chopping, choker setting, power saw bucking and hand bucking.

A firemen's program that evening concludes the day. Folk dances with oldtime music, exhibition square dancing, solos, songs, Scandinavian Schottische dances are included, along with polkas, Military Dance by Albany Timberettes, and State Championship Baton Exhibition by Champion Carol Mortenson.

Luncheon For Queens

First day sidelights include queen's luncheon for the royal court at noon given by the Pioneer Association officials, and judging of windows downtown for prizes.

Saturday morning opens with Annual Pioneer Parade at 10 a.m. which winds through the business section of town. A free- admission horse show in the ball park by Football Riders follows the parade.

Afternoon program at the park platform opens at 1:45, again featuring valley entertainers in the Olin A musical program is slated again in the evening at 7:45.

The windup Fireman's Ball at Pioneer Hall climaxes the three-day celebration.

Musical Interludes

The tree-shaded park features outdoor organ music in picnic and rest areas, a flower show is being staged by mid-valley garden clubs and the annual meeting of the Linn County Pioneer Association is scheduled at the conclusion of the Saturday afternoon platform program.

Industrial tours of the new Brownsville Particle Board plant are planned Saturday afternoon from 2 until 4 o'clock.

Contract Award Expected Friday At Four Corners

FOUR CORNERS, June 20—Four bids to furnish the Four Corners Water District with pipe were taken under advisement by the district's board of directors after the official opening of bids Wednesday. A contract is expected to be awarded Friday evening.

Low bidder was Deen Herder Construction Co., Lebanon, asking \$240,429 for steel and cast iron pipe, and \$229,304 for steel. It includes some 62,000 lineal feet of pipe, valves and hydrants, and necessary construction.

Other Bids Reported

Other bids submitted included Rushlight Automatic Sprinkler Co. steel and cast iron, \$206,345.80; steel, \$261,819; Lord Brothers steel and cast iron, \$344,483; steel, \$304,460; Salem Sand and Gravel Co. steel and cast iron, \$292,685; steel, \$231,916.

Bids were also opened on two sizes of storage tanks, one of 600,000 gallon capacity, the other 100,000 gallons. Pittsburgh-Des Moines Co., \$78,820 and \$47,690; Chicago Bridge and Iron Co., \$72,580 and \$44,800; American Pipe and Construction Co., large tank only, \$68,000.

Keizer to Call Bids

Keizer Water District has seen voters pass a \$500,000 bond issue to finance a municipal water system, and bonds have been sold to First National Bank of Portland. They were purchased at a net interest cost to the district of 4.58 per cent and mature serially from 1960 through 1965.

Bids on materials and construction work will be called Friday, June 28. Approximately 22 miles of pipe is needed. Alternate bids will be sought from each bidder, one for supply the pipe another on placement of lines along the street and another for inclusion of both.

The Keizer district includes about 1,500 families, lying north from the Salem city limits to a mile past the Keizer school and from Willamette River east to the Oregon Electric tracks.

Service Saturday For Sweet Home Accident Victim

LEBANON, June 20—Funeral services for Wallace, William Woodli, 35 Sweet Home, fatally injured Wednesday afternoon near Creswell, will be held Saturday 2 p.m. from Huston Funeral Chapel in Sweet Home. Interment will be in Liberty cemetery.

Woodli, who was alone in the car, crashed into a support for an overhead crossing on Highway 99. It is believed he may either have gone to sleep or was reaching for a pair of sun glasses found in the wreckage.

The man was born Dec. 11, 1901 at Sweet Home. He was a partner with his son Allen in Fern Ridge Lumber and Logging Company at Sweet Home, and had ranch holdings in that area. He was organizing and building Western Panel Plant at Sweet Home at the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife, Eunice, and sons Allen, John, Harold, Ralph and Wayne, all of Sweet Home, mother, Minnie Woodli, and two sisters, Freda Forster and Miss Marie Woodli, all Sweet Home, and brother Earl at Portland.

First Crypts in New Mausoleum Placed Into Use

SILVERTON, June 20—Two first crypts in the new Silverton Mausoleum were filled this week when the coffins of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Ames, who died in 1938 and 1939 respectively, were transferred from a Salem Mausoleum to the Silverton repository.

Mrs. Ames was a member of pioneer family, the Leander Davis family who came here first in 1847. Ames was born in the east, but came to Silverton as a young man and was active in business and civic betterment for more than 60 years prior to his death.

They were the parents of Mrs. Reber Allen and Norris Ames of Silverton.

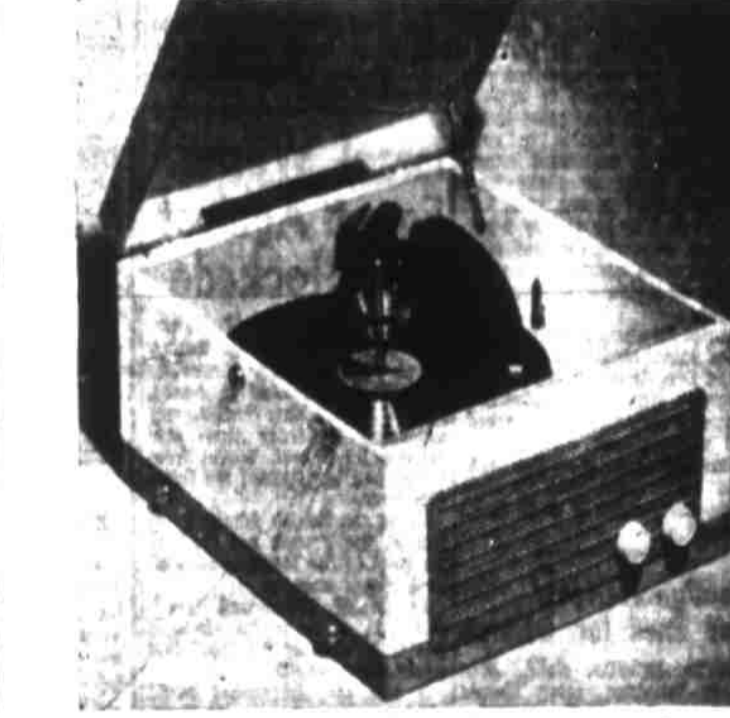

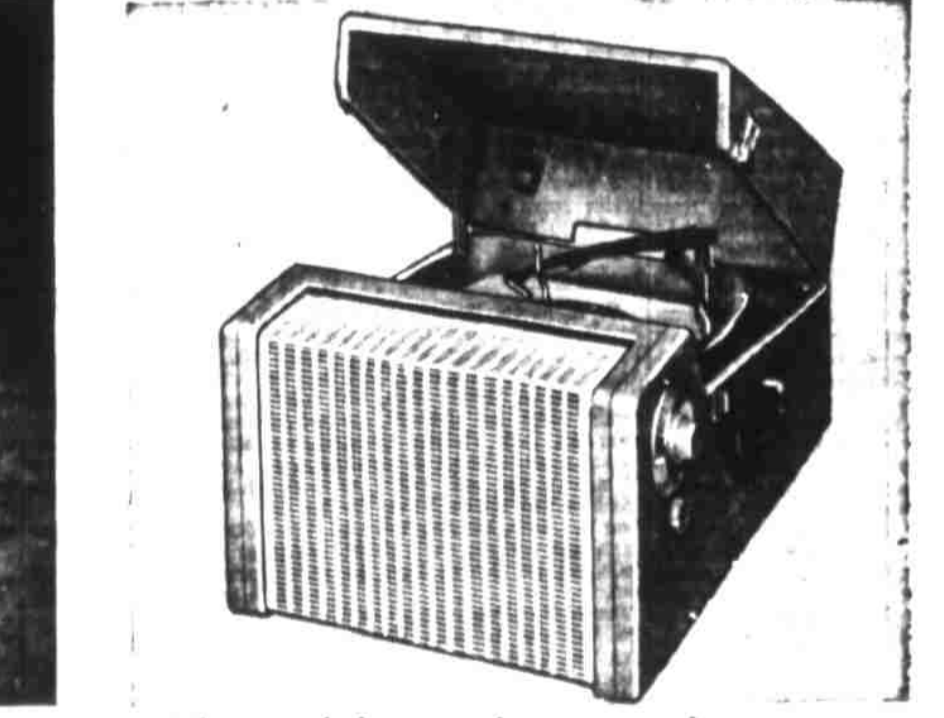
