

# String of Witnesses Detail Charge Against Schrank

PORTLAND, June 20 (AP) — A string of witnesses continued to detail today to the state's charge that Mayor Terry Schrank committed perjury when he denied he took a \$500 bribe from a gambler.

Defense Attorney Edwin D. Hicks said, however, he may try to impeach one of the principal witnesses, racketeer Big Jim Elkins. It is the defense contention that Elkins and his cohorts have tried to frame the 44-year-old mayor.

Elkins testified not only on the alleged bribery but also said Schrank once told him it would be all right to reope a gambling club that had been closed by a Schrank raid. He said that was two years ago when Schrank was sheriff.

Asks Transcript

Hicks in a conference away from the jury told state Circuit Judge James W. Crawford he believed Elkins was contradicting earlier testimony Elkins had given a grand jury. He asked for a transcript of the grand jury testimony.

The judge said not all the grand jury testimony was transcribed, but what there was would be made available.

The state contends Schrank led a raid on the Bill Club in Portland's Kenon district in 1955, and

there accepted a \$500 bribe from Clifford O. Bennett, who was operating the place with Elkins' financial backing.

Money in Envelope

Witnesses said Bennett put the money in an envelope and went outside.

A city policeman, Lowell Amundson said he saw Bennett pause by the corner look around and lean over. He said it was dark and he could not tell if Schrank leaned over to pick up something.

Elkins testified he never contemplated paying police in his operation of various gambling spots in Portland. He said their locations were changed frequently to keep ahead of police and that special watchers would warn when the vice squad or liquor enforcement squad appeared to be preparing for a raid.

The prosecution said it hopes to complete its case tomorrow.

Man on Bicycle Struck by Auto

A 57-year-old patient at the Oregon State Hospital riding a bicycle sustained numerous abrasions and contusions when he was hit by a car in the 3200 block of Center Street around 3:45 p.m. Thursday, city police said.

City first aidmen cleaned and dressed the man's injuries and he was returned to the hospital by Willamette Ambulance Service. Officers said driver of the car was Alice Jean Fenkens, 4800 Auburn Rd.

Archaeologist Charged With Smuggling

CAIRO, June 20 (AP) — Egyptian police arrested Charles A. Muses, 38-year-old American archaeologist, on a charge of trying to smuggle antiquities out of Egypt by air tonight. Muses is from Indian Hills, Colo.

He was taken into custody as the Cairo press was splashing reports of his discoveries in the base of a newly found pyramid some 40 centuries old.

An Egyptian official said Muses was detained by customs officials at Cairo's International Airport when they found he had four bags full of unlicensed antiquities in his possession.

Other relics, plus an unlicensed pistol and \$4,000 in currency which had not been declared under Egyptian monetary regulations were found in a search of Muses' home, the official said.

Japanese Students Scuffle at U.S. Embassy Entrance

TOKYO, Friday, June 21 (AP) — Outnumbered leftist Japanese students today scuffled with police who barred their approach to the heavily guarded American Embassy. Student leaders said they were protesting against U.S. policies on Okinawa, nuclear tests and the Girard case.

Groups of 70 to 150 students three times tried to push their way through 400 armed Japanese police who formed a human wall 100 yards in front of the main police bussy gate. Another 400 police were in riot trucks on side streets.

No one appeared hurt in the early scuffling.

Two of the students were arrested for slugging police.

The police barred the students from approaching the embassy on the ground they did not have police permission to stage a demonstration.

AEC Chairman Asks World 'Humanists' to Devise Peace

WEST BRANCH, Iowa, June 20 (AP) — A new kind of conference among nations bringing together the chief humanists of our day should be called to seek what all men desire: a durable world peace. Adm. Lewis L. Strauss said today.

Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, took the occasion of the dedication of a memorial blacksmith shop at this birthplace of former President Herbert Hoover, to offer a new plan for seeking a solution to the "great challenge of our times."

It is the multibillion-dollar question, the 1,700-million-person question, said the speaker. "Can man learn to live with his inventions, or must he perish because of them?"

Strauss recalled that an international conference in 1955 on the peaceful uses of atomic energy "resulted in a great exchange of knowledge and was acclaimed a 'monumental success.'"

That conference was concerned, however, he said, only with what men might gain in a material sense from the application of scientific discovery.

The conference he proposes, Strauss said, is one which starts from the knowledge of what men will lose—the accumulated treasure of culture and civilization—if the fruits of science are used for destruction.

The humanists who would be invited to the conference, Strauss said, would include the philosophers, historians, sociologists, theologians, and all the leaders of thought whose concern is with man rather than the physical universe which man is in.

Strauss acknowledged there are many who would say his plan is "utterly visionary," but man he said, must exhaust every possibility to find a solution to the "dreadful problem" and "a gathering of noble minds from many parts of the world" just may generate the idea which could transform the thinking of all.

# Suit for \$500,000 Blames Suicide on Congress Probers

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20 (AP) — The House subcommittee on Un-American Activities was sued for a half-million dollars today in the suicide of a young scientist, subpoenaed to appear before its televised hearing here.

Papers were served on the three congressmen and their staff as the committee ignored announcements in Washington that there would be no more televising of House committee hearings.

The suit filed in San Francisco Superior Court charged subcommittee actions caused William K. Scherer "to become so mentally disturbed that he committed suicide by poisoning."

Died Sunday at 41

The 41-year-old Stanford University biochemist and graduate student died in Pacific Grove, Calif. Sunday two days before he was supposed to appear before the committee. The action was brought in behalf of the widow and their four children.

Defendants knew that on other occasions similar activities of the House Committee on Un-American Activities and similar committees had caused the death by suicide or heart attack of Canadian Ambassador E. Herbert Norman, Harry Dexter White and others including actor John Garfield, the suit said.

"It's a Communist tactic," Rep. Gordon H. Scherer (R-Ohio) said as he was served with papers. The suit was filed by Bertram Edises, who has been subpoenaed to appear.

"Empty Gesture"

Scherer declared the suit was an empty gesture because congressmen are immune from civil suits arising out of their actions on official business.

"I am going to ignore the subpoena," said Scherer.

**Actor's Son Sued**

LOS ANGELES, June 20 (AP) — The automobile collision which sent Edward G. Robinson Jr. to jail for 90 days for drunk driving brought a \$50,000 damage suit against him today.

The suit was filed against the son of the stage and screen actor by Martin Barth, M. Barth lost his right eye in the accident.
