

Frick Cites Baseball Cash Loss

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—Some major league baseball clubs have made profits as high as \$200,000 a year over the last five seasons, Congress was informed today.

But financial statements laid before the House antitrust subcommittee also indicated many teams have lost money — as much as \$700,000 — in each of those seasons.

In the end the records showed

all major league operations from 1955-59 netted the owners \$28,378,000. Of this, American League clubs reported \$1,282,300 and National League teams \$26,095,700.

After examining the balance sheets, Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick said in answer to subcommittee questioning that some clubs might go broke pleading their case in court if Congress put the sport under Federal antitrust laws.

The figures pinpointed Brooklyn and Milwaukee as the big money makers in the National League, where Pittsburgh and Philadelphia have been the most consistent losers.

Considering Milwaukee's role last year in Boston, the Dodgers also registered a profit each season in the National League.

Another summary indicated only Cincinnati and New York in the National and Chicago, Cleveland and Washington in the American have paid dividends in the seasons covered.

The Chicago White Sox posted the largest single net to stockholders — \$74,500 in 1952.

While winning the American League pennant and world championship last year, the New York Yankees reported a gain of \$301,682. Brooklyn listed \$487,402 for its 1958 pennant season.

Cards Take Lead in N.L.

Giants End Braves' Reign

The St. Louis Cardinals breezed into the National League lead for the first time since opening day by defeating Pittsburgh 7-4 last night. New York's Giants ended Milwaukee's seven-day reign by handing the Braves their fourth defeat in five games, 4-1 in a 12-inning afternoon contest.

St. Louis, a half game ahead of Milwaukee, is the fourth club to claim the top spot in 15 days, coming from 4½ games back with 21 victories in the last 28 games. Cincinnati, with a 2-1 claim, claiming only its third victory in 11 games, jumped into third place, 1½ games behind St. Louis, with a 4-1 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers, who slid to fifth, 2½ back. Philadelphia took over fourth place two games away with a 7-2 decision over the Chicago Cubs.

In the American League, New York's second place Yankees swept Detroit 3-1 for their seventh consecutive victory setting up a four-game showdown series this week end with the Chicago White Sox, whose first place lead was trimmed to 1½ games by a 4-1 defeat at Baltimore.

Boston Victor Again
In the other AL games, Boston made it two in a row over Cleveland, 9-7, and Washington cut its losing string at four games with a 4-4 job on Kansas City.

The second place Yankees have won nine of their last 11 to gain 4½ games on the White Sox, swept the three game set from the Tigers as Bill Skowron doubled and Gil McDougald singled for the deciding run off Frank Lary in the sixth inning.

Bob Turley won his third with a six-hitter, striking out eight and walking only one for his first complete game against a first division club since September, 1965. It was his first complete game against Detroit in seven starts since Aug. 7, 1965.

Tempers May Flare Tonight; Series Due

NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—The Friday night lights may come from Yankee Stadium tomorrow night when the Chicago White Sox open a four game series against the New York Yankees who are rolling along on a seven-game winning streak.

Lossing eight of their last 14 starts the White Sox have seen their American League lead cut to 1½ games. Repercussions of the lights of a week ago at Comiskey Park and the fines that followed still are bouncing off the walls of the League office.

For the series opener, expected in atract upwards of 50,000 fans, manager Casey Stengel has named Johnny Kucks (3-4) to face Chicago's Jim Wilson (7-3).

Larry Doby, whose left hook floored the Yanks' Art Ditmar in the first of many bouts last week, has been hobbled by a leg injury. Doby was able to pinch hit and drove in a run against Baltimore yesterday but it is not certain that he will be ready for full time duty. For the Saturday afternoon game when at least 25,000 are expected, the Yanks probably will call on Dittmer (3-1) to face Dick Donovan (4-2).

Broncs Win Final Clash

Five New Players Secured

NEW SERIES IS DELAYED
No Game Tonight; Twin Bill Saturday

The pesky Lewiston Broncs, definitely one of the Northwest League clubs, the team Senators can't handle effectively, last night grabbed the odd game of the series at Waters Field, topping the Senators 6-3 on the five-hit burling of massive Thornton Kipper, a veteran right hander.

It wasn't only the final game of the series with the Broncs it was also the last outing for the 'old' Senators. The 'new' club, made so by the addition of the five Wenatchee stars sent this yesterday by the parent Seattle Rainiers, will make its debut Saturday night in a seven o'clock doubleheader with Wenatchee.

Clayton Boss Calls
There will be no game tonight even though one is on the schedule. The Clavis, N.M. players sent to Wenatchee by Cincinnati in their new tieup haven't all arrived yet, and tonight's game was postponed because of it. Even big boss Gabe Paul of Cincinnati called yesterday to ask that the game be delayed.

The five new Salem players are scheduled to check in today. Wenatchee is expected to be fully loaded with the talented Redding farmhands by Saturday, and since two games are booked for that night and two more for Sunday afternoon, local folks will be the first to get to see the new clan from Clavis.

They Look Tough
The dozen Clavis players tagged for Wenatchee were hitting at a .345 clip and had a 27-7 pitching record in the Class B Southwestern League when the team folded. Clavis was leading the loop by 1½ games.

Rookie Don Shafer, no physical pee-wee himself, had the misfortune of tangling with the clever Kipper in last night's sortie. Even so, the former Lebanon High and Linfield College lad had the best of it for five hits, and had himself a 2-1 lead on some sharp two-hit pitching at that point.

Schafer was given a 2-0 lead in the first as Kipper started slowly Jack Dunn singled and was sacrificed, and then yielded runners in the eighth and ninth. Huge M. Kipper accounted for the run of the eighth when he socked a home run over the right field fence.

Kipper was in no serious trouble after the first, although the Salems go two runners aboard in both the second and eighth frames. The big guy struck out nine and walked five in racking up his fifth win, against three losses. At one point in the clash he whiffed six straight Salems.

Catcher Harv Koepf, who has been hitting very well of late, was the only Salem able to solve the right hander with any regularity, as Harv whacked a single and a double for two of the only five biggies Salem got.

Lewiston had 10 hits, seven off Schafer who now has a 2-2 record. Kipper escaped some real harm in the first inning when with bases loaded just prior to Lauren's two-run single, Terry Muddox clouted a long drive over the left field fence—foul by a scant few feet.

Notes: Both Lauren and Ted Rhodes, due to be sent from the squad today, may be placed with the Stockton club of the California League. Sam Rolin goes to Mexfall of the Arizona-Mexico loop. . . In six games now played with Lewiston here, Salem has won only two. . . And since the up-to-date count with Wenatchee is 5-2 for the Chiefs, it will be interesting to see how things turn out when the reconstituted club get at it Saturday and Sunday. . .

AAU Track Go Tonight

DAYTON, Ohio, June 20 (AP)—Approximately 450 of the nation's brightest cinder stars will compete here Friday and Saturday nights in the 96th annual National AAU track-field championships.

Eleven 1956 Olympic champions and a host of other talented performers are entered in the 21-event program.

Early arrivals today included Merv Lincoln, the Australian miler who posted a 3:59, and Don Bowden of California, first American athlete to crack the four-minute mile. Bowden, who toured the four laps in 3:58.7, has announced he will compete only in the 800-yard dash.

Olympic champions entered include Charley Jenkins, 400 meters, Tom Courtney, 800 meters, Parry O'Brien, shot put, Al Oerter, discus, Harold Connolly, hammer throw, Lee Calhoun, 110-meter high hurdles, Charley Dumas, high jump, Glenn Davis, 400-meter hurdles, Rev. Bob Richards, pole vault, Greg Bell, broad jump, and Mill Campbell, decathlon, who goes in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Only NCAA victors who will miss the meet are Bobby Morrow of Abilene Christian, winner of both dashes, and Ron Delany of Villanova, who won the mile. Morrow has decided to skip the event after a tough year of competition while Delany is on his way to his native Ireland.

Verdict on PCC Bolt Due Today

Cal, Uke Regents Said Not in Favor

BERKELEY Calif., June 20 (AP)—An official stand on whether California and UCLA can bolt the Pacific Coast conference was expected tomorrow from the board of regents governing body of the two institutions.

There was speculation that the answer would be "no," but those in authority refused comment.

A final meeting of the regents' educational policy committee tonight was to outline its recommendations but Chairman Edw. Carter of Los Angeles said, in an announcement made until tomorrow, then the full board will hear the committee report and presumably one from President Robert G. Ronson Sproul outlining his stand along with those of UCLA Chancellor Raymond B. Allen and Chancellor Clark Kerr of the Berkeley campus.

Action Criticized
Two chancellors have criticized PCC action for opposite reasons. The committee recommendations are not binding upon the board.

Powerful alumni groups of UCLA have demanded the school be permitted to withdraw from the conference. UCLA, Southern California, Washington and California last year drew heavy penalties from the PCC because of illegal payments to athletes mostly by alumni and booster groups.

UCLA has sought a relaxation of PCC rules governing aid to athletes. However, Chancellor Kerr of UC termed the latest PCC rule change "clear subsidization of athletics and discrimination of non-athletes."

Bevos Bop Stars, 3-2

PORTLAND Ore., June 20 (AP)—The Portland Beavers made it three in a row over third place Hollywood tonight, defeating the Stars 3-2 in a Pacific Coast League baseball game. The winning run in the eighth inning broke up a 3-2 tie.

Curt Raydon, who went the distance for Hollywood, allowed seven hits to eight allowed by Portland pitcher Bob Alexander.

Portland stepped off to a lead in the first inning Luis Marquez singled and Frank Carswell doubled him.

Hollywood tied it up in the fifth as Dick Smith tripped to center and scored on Bill Hall's sacrifice fly. The Stars went ahead briefly in the sixth as Jim Baumert walked, Paul Pettit singled, and Emil Panke singled, scoring Baumer.

Ford's Arm Said On Mend at Last

NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—Whitey Ford is sporting a smile for the first time in weeks. The erstwhile ace of the New York Yankee pitching staff, sidelined a month with a sore arm, thinks he finally is on the mend.

"For the first time in weeks, I threw for 20 minutes before the game today and I felt no pain. I admit I wasn't throwing hard but the fact is I felt loose for the first time in two months."

Ford won't give the arm a thorough test for a while yet but he believes if the arm continues to improve at the current rate he may be able to take his regular turn on the mound after the All-Star break.

"I've written off the first half of the season," he said. "But I'm looking forward to taking my regular turn during the second half."

"I tried to throw during the team's last trip into Cleveland and I had to quit because the pain was unbearable. So I did no throwing at all for 11 days. Then, in Chicago, I did a little throwing and it didn't hurt so much. When we returned to Yankee stadium last Tuesday, I threw again and the pain was less."

Giandra, Calhoun to Box on Video Tonight

Rangy Stylist to Meet Stiff Puncher

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 20 (AP)—Handsome Joey Giandra, winner of nine straight, faces muscular Rory Calhoun of New York in a battle of middleweight contenders at the War Memorial auditorium tomorrow night.

The 25-year-old Giandra, now fighting out of San Francisco, is the 7-5 favorite. The 10-rounder will be telecast (NBC-6 p.m., PST) coast to coast.

A smooth boxer with a powerful left hook, Giandra swept all seven of his fights last year and two this year to move up to fourth among the 160-pound contenders. A pro eight years, he has a 50-1 record, including 26 knockouts.

Strong, Still Crude
Calhoun, 22, strong and still crude after less than three years of pro fighting, is ranked sixth. He has a 27-2 record including 15 knockouts. Neither he nor Giandra has been knocked out.

Rory's losses were by narrow margins. He had won 23 in a row until he was edged by Spider Webb, in Chicago, Aug. 29, 1956. He lost by one point to Joey

Giardello in Cleveland May 17. That was his last fight. Giandra stopped Chico Vejar in seven May 17.

On style, this should be right up Giandra's alley. The rangy stylist likes to have an opponent come to him so he can operate with his sharp left and fast combination punches. He won't have to look for Calhoun. Rory will be after him when the first bell sounds. That's the only way he knows how to fight.

Round Scoring
If the bout goes the limit, the verdict will be based on the round scoring of the three officials. A supplementary point system also will be used to help break draws. The winner of each round gets from one to four points, the loser none.

Rams Sign Boyd, Clarke

LOS ANGELES, June 20 (AP)—The Los Angeles Rams signed two more regular pass catchers today to round out their aerial array for the coming National Football League season.

Clarke, last year's rookie sensation, joined a third star receiver, Elroy "Crazy Legs" Hirsch, who signed last week.

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
