Navy Finds Substitute for Transistor

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—A new electronic device has been developed which could eventually replace vacuum tubes and transistors in a wide range of electronic applications. The Naval Ordnance Laboratory said tonight.

The new technology involved, a spokesman said, makes use of natural laws governing the movement of ions through a fluid instead of through space as in a vacuum tube or through solids as in a transistor.

Nelson N. Estes, an ordnance laboratory physicist who heads up much of the development work, has disclosed that test models of an electrochemical integrator already have been produced under Navy contract.

The integrator unit, one type of many electrochemical devices, consists of a small cylinder divided into two sections by a porous ceramic filter. Two electrodes are immersed in a solution of potassium iodide to which a small amount of iodine is added.

'Journey for Margaret' Orphan Weds

EMPORIA, Kan., June 22 (AP)—An orphan whose rescue from the ruins of London's Blitz during World War II became the subject of a book and movie was married today in this quiet city.

She was Miss Barbara White, now 20, the adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. White. White, editor of the Emporia Gazette, was a war correspondent when he found the little girl in London and brought her to America. His book was titled "Journey for Margaret."

It was the basis for the movie of the same title, starring Margaret O'Brien.

Miss White married Lt. Paul David Walker, 21, Claremont, Calif. They met while students at Stanford University.

After the wedding and a reception, the couple left for Hartington, Tex. Air Force Base where Walker is stationed.

Butler Linked to Melchior Theft

LOS ANGELES, June 22 (AP)—A nationwide search was on today for a one-time butler of Laurita Melchior as the opera singer and his wife identified \$88,670 worth of furs and jewelry stolen from them and recovered by police.

Also sought in the \$69,770 robbery at the Melchior home last Tuesday night, police said, is a dope-addicted ex-convict.

Police announced yesterday the arrest of two other men and recovery of all but \$11,000 worth of the loot. Robert Morgan, 39, an ex-convict, and Alfred J. Pope, 28, both of Los Angeles, were booked on suspicion of robbery.

Police said the valuables were found in their possession. Melchior, 44, employed by Melchior as a butler 10 years ago, and Richard McFall, 38, an ex-convict and heroin addict, were also arrested.

Bullet Kills Shop Owner

PORTLAND, June 22 (AP)—A repair shop operator died of a bullet wound in the head today, and police said they would question the owner of a pistol left at the shop presumably with a bullet in the chamber.

The shop operator, Floyd D. Drummond, died 12 hours after his brother, Bernard, found him critically wounded. Police arrested him accidentally discharged the revolver while working on it.

Kidneys of Twins Transplanted

BOSTON, June 22 (AP)—Peter Bent Brigham Hospital reported today after a 72-hour waiting period—that a six-hour transplant kidney operation on identical Shepherdsville, Ky., twins apparently is successful.

Leonard Masden, 19, gave a healthy kidney to his brother, Leonard. The hospital said Leonard is making normal progress toward recovery and that the kidney taken from him and given to Leonard is functioning. Leonard has been told that his outlook for renewed health is good.

The operations took place in adjoining rooms with two teams of surgeons.

The community of Shepherdsville assisted the Masden family in coming to Boston. Hospitalization costs were provided for by the John A. Hartford Foundation in a special grant to the hospital for unusual cases, and the physicians contributed their services as has been their custom in three other successful transplants between identical twins.

If the new kidney continues to function well, Leonard will undergo two more operations for removal of his diseased kidneys—one at a time. For the present he will have three kidneys, two of them nearly useless.

The twins are seniors at Lincoln Ridge Industrial School and are studying to be carpenters.

Proposed Security Rules Could Imprison Newsmen

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—A newspaperman or his boss could be fined \$10,000 and sent to prison for five years for publishing "secret" information if a key recommendation of the Commission on Government Security is adopted.

Any other person could similarly be punished—even though there was no intent to harm the country—for divulging such information to unauthorized individuals.

This became clear with publication of the 13-member commission's proposals to strengthen the government's security system and with elaboration given at a news conference by the body's chairman, Los Angeles Atty. Lloyd Wright.

Unlawful to Tell Secrets

A bill drafted by the commission would make it unlawful for "any person" who has obtained "secret" or "top secret" information in atomic or any other field "to communicate any part thereof" to anyone else not authorized to receive such information.

Until now the law has banned such disclosure by persons in the government service only.

In a statement which was part of the commission's report Wright made it plain that the proposed law change was aimed mainly at the press.

"An informed citizenry," he said, "is a major premise of our government structure. But that same structure may be destroyed if a potential enemy is supplied with information critical to national self-preservation."

Those Qualified to Judge

"The final responsibility for the difficult decisions of what shall be secret must be confined in those loyal and devoted public servants who are qualified to make the judgment."

"No citizen is entitled to take the law, and the safety of the nation, into his own hands."

"With near unanimity, the American journalism profession has conscientiously observed these limits."

"But there are a few exceptions."

D. A. Meeting Ends at Capitol

John D. Nichols spoke on motion picture practice in criminal law and Peter Herman discussed legal principles. Panelists Saturday were five district attorneys, Max McMillin of Josephine County, John Hathaway of Tillamook County, Richard Beasley of Klamath County, Lester Johnson of Sherman County, and Kenneth M. Abraham of Hood River County.

At a Friday night banquet attended by 108 persons chief Justice William C. Perry of the Oregon Supreme Court defended attorneys as major champions of America's Liberties, and declared that the legal profession has saved America from regimentation and decay.

LOS ANGELES, June 22 (AP)—Veteran actor Donald MacBride, 63, who starred on the stage and appeared in more than 50 movies, died last night after a year-long illness.

He started his long career as a teen-age concert hall singer, appeared in some of the earliest silent films, and then went on the stage where he won success as comedian, singer and actor.

He was one of Hollywood's busiest actors from the time he arrived in 1928, making movies, appearing with road companies of current stage hits, and playing in the "My Friend Irma" television series for three years.

Girl at Office Brings Others, Graham Says

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—"I know of one girl who accepted Christ here and went back and told the people in her office about it," said Billy Graham tonight.

"They laughed at her and she just smiled back and loved them."

"But two weeks later she was back in here with two other people from that same office—and they made decisions for Christ."

They may be the whole office will be in here before it's over."

The slim, 36-year-old evangelist from North Carolina spoke to an estimated 17,500 persons in his fourth Saturday night appearance. Tonight's appearance was televised over ABC TV.

Huge Response

Graham said the previous television appearances have brought a huge response—"thousands on thousands of letters." Many of them told of personal conversions made through the broadcasts.

He announced that the television series, which was originally limited to four nights, has been continued to include next Saturday night, June 29, and might possibly be extended even further.

"We haven't got the money but we're doing it on faith," he said.

Four hundred and thirteen persons came forward tonight to signify their acceptance of Christ. In the weeks since Graham's New York crusade began on May 15, "decisions for Christ" have totaled 21,000.
