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## Cal Regents Vote Muddled By Schmidt

LOS ANGELES June 22 (AP)—The Pacific Coast conference committee voted today to support a resolution of the University of California Board of Regents that would allow UCLA to withdraw from the PCC after its probation period ends.

The full import of yesterday's resolution of the University of California Board of Regents can not be obtained without some further clarification of all its implications.

Upon careful study of the full text of the resolution, it can be concluded that some of yesterday's endorsements parallel existing conference rules and policies. There are very few new rules and policies of the conference which express the complete desires of any member.

Rules usually are a compromise of various. In this field of compromise, the last few years have brought this conference the most stringent requirements for academic progress in the country. The strictest academic regulations governing transfer students and the adoption of a program of higher entrance requirements for athletic participation.

Moreover, even the present financial aid program is one of the most restrictive in the nation—much more so than those of nearly all of our intercollegiate opponents.

Against this background, it can be seen that the Pacific Coast Conference has been rightfully recognized throughout the nation as an organization of universities which has pioneered such restrictive controls of college athletic behavior as may maintain proper balance between athletic and academic interests of the students.

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## Yanks Regain 1st in AL

BERKELEY, Calif. June 22 (AP)—Breakup of the present Pacific Coast Conference alignment was a certainty today unless the 42-year-old loop alters some basic policies.

Such changes appeared doubtful as spokesmen for PCC schools in the Pacific Northwest gave a chilly reception to yesterday's statement of principles by the University of California Board of Regents.

The board ruling body for California and UCLA held that after the 1957 season, the schools should not be bound by the PCC football rule requiring all member schools except Idaho to play each other annually.

If this is an ultimatum to the conference, I would like to say I don't believe this is a way to solve conference problems, asserted Dean Orlando Hollis of the University of Oregon, its PCC representative.

How the regents action could be taken for anything but an ultimatum was hard to see. Just last May 23 the PCC refused to amend its roundrobin football schedule policy and allow each school to play only five conference games (Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State, Stanford and Idaho) and to maintain the roundrobin California-UCLA-Southern California and Washington voted against it.

If California and UCLA go out, it's an odds-on bet that Southern California will join them.

Also set forth by the regents was a scholastic policy requiring a C average or 2.0 in college, 2.3 in junior college, and 2.5 in high school. This same schedule was approved at the last meeting of the PCC but not to be effective until 1960.

The regents demanded that in individual schools have responsibility for enforcement of its policies. Games would be scheduled with teams from schools having policies consistent with those of California.

'Old Pros' Lead Victory Over Sox

New York's turnabout Yankees, with Yogi Berra and Tommy Byrne furnishing the "old pros" hand powered into first place in the American League for the first time in seven weeks yesterday with a 6-3 win over the struggling Chicago White Sox.

Berra, who hits the hardest when the chips are bluest, smashed a home run to win the game off Phil Laffaine after left-handed, had worked nine scoreless innings of relief on a yield of one hit—that an infield single.

It was the streaking Yankees' ninth straight victory and their second in succession in their week-end Yankee Stadium series with Chicago, which reaches its climax with a doubleheader today. The Yanks who won the opener 4-2 Friday now lead Chicago by a half game—the same margin they held in their last visit to first place back on May 8.

The teams shared the lead on May 9 before the White Sox went into an unbroken run that ended yesterday with their ninth loss in their last 14 starts.

The five-team National League race also was taken in a hot Saturday when Brooklyn beat first place St. Louis 6-4, Cincinnati topped Pittsburgh 6-3 on Wally Pate's homer.

## AAU Mile Duel Fails

### Four More Marks Fall in Oval Test

DAYTON, Ohio June 22 (AP)—An expected assault on the four-minute mile barrier failed to materialize tonight as Australia's Mervyn Lincoln needed 4:06.1 to win the 40th National AAU event.

Lincoln, who recently ran the mile in 3:58.9, was content to lay back in the pack until the last eighth of the mile when he surged from fourth place to win by about 10 feet.

His time wiped out the old record of 14:18 set by Horace Ashenbeller of the NYAC in 1954.

In addition to four records which fell last night, other meet marks to fall were in the 200-yard hurdles which Elmer Gilbert of Winston-Salem, N.C., won in 22.5 seconds, and the two-mile walk which Harry Laakka of the New York 92nd St. YMCA took 14:23.3 to step off.

Gilman Cassell of East Tennessee set the meet mark in the preliminaries by 1:13.5 in the 400-yard dash around one turn with 21 seconds left.
