

Violent Storms Hit South Central U.S.

A line of thunderstorms, at least one spreading a tornado, laced Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas Sunday with wind, rain and hail.
The storms developed in a warm, moist flow of air moving eastward across the Southwest, the Gulf region and the South Atlantic states.
The U. S. Weather Bureau said a tornado touched ground harmlessly about four miles west of Washburn, Tex., then receded into a bank of dark, low-hanging clouds.
Winds of cable-snapping force belted parts of Texas. The gusts snapped power lines, trees and picked up blinding dust in the Dallas area.
Torrential rains pushed by 44 m.p.h. winds also struck Dallas.

Navy to Test 40 Rockets

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The Navy announced today it will fire 40 super-sonic rockets to a height of some 30 miles above the Virginia coast this week in an effort to learn more about the weather.
The Navy said the rockets will be shot into the stratosphere at 3,000-plus miles an hour from the naval aviation ordnance test station at Chincoteague, Va.
The rockets will be fired from a 5-inch gun.
Once the rockets climb 20 miles or more, the announcement said, their warheads will explode and release a cloud of metal foil fragments which will be tracked by radar to learn wind velocity and direction.

Paper to Jump Daily Prices

NEW YORK, June 23 (AP)—The New York Herald Tribune announced today it will increase the retail price of its weekday editions from 6 to 10 cents a copy outside a 100-mile zone from New York City effective Tuesday, July 2.
The price will remain 5 cents a copy in the New York metropolitan area and other areas within the 100-mile zone. New Jersey, Connecticut and Philadelphia are included in the zone.
"The continued spiraling cost of producing a newspaper has necessitated this increase," the newspaper said. "Labor, materials, newsprint, distribution and transportation have reached new highs."
The price of the Sunday Herald Tribune will remain at 25 cents.

Ike Back in Capital

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—President Eisenhower returned to the White House tonight after a weekend at his Gettysburg, Pa., farm.
He was met by Mrs. Eisenhower and the children at the entrance to the White House.
The president said he had a "very good time" at Gettysburg and that he was "glad to be back in the White House."

Charles B. King, Designer of 1896 Automobile, Dies

RYE, N. Y., June 23 (AP)—Charles Brady King, 80, credited with designing and driving the first automobile in Detroit 61 years ago, died today at his home.
King helped Henry Ford construct the first experimental Ford car. He later manufactured the Silent Northern, a car long vanished from the American highway.

Draft Board Fired for Action in Case of Negro

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 23 (AP)—The national director of selective service has fired the Bullock County draft board after it refused to call up inductees for more than nine months in protest to a Negro's desertion.
A former member of the board, L. K. Andrews of Union Springs, reported that the board was dismissed several weeks ago.
An official of the state selective service system confirmed the action by Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national director. The board has not been replaced yet.

Gas Blast Rips Georgia City

SYLVANIA, Ga., June 23 (AP)—A terrific gas explosion ripped through a business district today. Damage was estimated at \$125,000.
The explosion was believed to have been caused by gas escaping from a tanker truck of the Coastal Gas Co. Officials advance the theory that the hot sun blew out a safety valve on the tanker, which was parked at the rear of the gas company, and the escaping gas exploded.
No one was killed or injured seriously, although there were six people in a cafe which was damaged heavily by the blast and fire. Two persons received minor injuries.

BLM Reports Rise in Timber Sales

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—The Bureau of Land Management today said O & C land timber sales swung upward sharply in May.
The bureau said more than 12½ million board feet of timber was sold for \$3,300,000.
Sales for the first eleven months of the fiscal year, however, were reported far below the sales for a comparable period of the preceding year.

Seven Irishmen, Scotsman Share in Purchase of Killarney Lakes

PHILADELPHIA, June 23 (AP)—A fine brood of Irish and Scotsmen like Doyle and O'Neill—along with a Scotman from Florida who shares their Gaelic good taste—have freed the Lakes of Killarney from British control for the first time since the reign of the first Elizabeth.
J. Stuart Robertson, a Miami real estate man, bought the Killarney estate last August. Yesterday it was revealed he was acting not just on his own but for eight sons of the old soil as well.
Michael Francis Doyle, a Philadelphia lawyer who helped save Irish Prime Minister Eamon de Valera from hanging, disclosed he was one of the new owners of the

The fashion tennis king, who resigned his job as usher at Wimbledon because of the controversy caused in 1949 by Miss Moran's panties, said in an interview with the Sunday Pictorial:
"There are no such garments any more. Panties and underclothes only existed when we had occasional provocative glimpses of them. Nowadays we see them all the time, so they are designed all in one."
"Shorts and skirts are so short these days that to see underclothes would be embarrassing. They are old-fashioned. They are out."

Police said he and friends carried her off into the wilds of Aspromonte (Harsh Mountain) two weeks ago.
Police disguised as peasants searched for them for several days.
Then they received a note saying they would find her safe and well in a cave. They did.
The same day the 40-year-old mayor showed up and told police it was all planned between him and Francesca to get her parents to agree to the wedding.

Portland Officer Delivers Baby on 'Prowler' Call

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—Portland patrolman Kenneth Whitman was sent to investigate a "prowler" here late yesterday.
He nabbed the suspect, Orre E. Kerna. But Kerna wasn't prowling. He was trying to find a telephone to summon aid for his wife who was having a baby.
Officer Whitman followed Kerna to his apartment and there found the wife, Lila, 30, in the final stages of labor.
Whitman rolled up his sleeves and delivered the baby—a four-pound girl—himself.
The mother and daughter are "doing fine" at a Portland hospital.

Paper Claims Queen, Duke Cut Court Barriers Against Divorced Persons

LONDON, June 23 (AP)—A London newspaper suggested today that Queen Elizabeth and her husband, Prince Philip, are trying to break down right court barriers against divorce.
Robert Edwards, writing in the Sunday Express, cited as evidence the 30-year-old Queen's "public and intimate association" with Douglas Fairbanks Jr. and his wife, both of whom went through the divorce courts before their marriage.
The American couple "entertained Elizabeth, Philip, Princess Margaret and other members of the royal family at a lavish country house party during the fashionable Ascot horse races last year," Edwards said.

Schrunk Trial To Resume In Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23 (AP)—The trial of Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk on a charge of perjury will resume in a state circuit court here tomorrow.
The 44-year-old mayor is charged with lying when he denied under oath the accusation that he had accepted a bribe from a Portland gambler. He also has been accused of accepting a bribe but a trial date on that charge has not yet been set.

The prosecution completed its case last week after presenting a number of witnesses whose combined testimony indicated that on the night of Sept. 11, 1955 Schrunk—who then was sheriff of Multnomah County (Portland)—picked up an envelope near an illegal gambling spot he had raided.

The prosecution contends the envelope contained \$500 and that it was put there by Clifford O. Bennett, operator of the club, as a payoff to Schrunk to keep him from arresting patrons.

The defense is scheduled to resume its case tomorrow. Schrunk contends that the bribe story was a political frameup by gamblers who feared his election as mayor would put them out of business.

Plans to Halt Secrets Leak Under Fire

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—Congress members studying the report of the Commission on Government Security aimed most of their criticism and questions today at a recommendation aimed at halting "leaks" of secret information.
Chairman Celler (D-N.Y.) of the House Judiciary Committee said that "at first blush" this and some other commission proposals appear unconstitutional.

Bias Laid to Office Building In Portland

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—The Urban League today said the Portland Medical Arts Building refused to rent office space to dentist Clarence Pruitt because he is a Negro.
Gerard Macnamara, the building's manager, said "he was refused, all right. We weren't offering any space for rent."
Macnamara said the building was built by doctors and dentists as a private corporation, "for their own use, and not for outsiders. It's just like a club."

Mask to Protect Troops Against Atom Radiation

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The Army gas mask familiar to millions of soldiers is due for eventual replacement by a new-type mask that also protects against germ warfare and airborne radiation, the Army announced today.
The Army said its new mask "must undergo rigorous tests before it can be adopted as standard." But the announcement spoke of eventual "large-scale production for troop use."
Missing from the new mask is the protruding canister which has long been a cumbersome feature of masks used in this country and abroad. The canister is replaced by pads of a lightweight, pliable gas-erosol filter material fitted into the mask's rubber facepiece.

Home Damaged In Auburn Fire

AUBURN, June 23 (AP)—Fire broke out 11:15 tonight in the home of C. J. McPherson, 5410 Auburn Rd., and caused about \$10,000 in damages. Four Corners Fire Chief Ted Miller said.
Eighteen firemen responded to the fire call and quickly brought the blaze under control.
