

Two Armies of Christians Join In New United Church of Christ

CLEVELAND, June 25 (AP)—Two armies of Christians reached across a chasm of centuries to join forces in a new United Church of Christ.

Dramatic paganism marked the sealing of ties between national bodies of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

At the climactic moment, 714 official delegates of the two denominations chorused in unison.

"We do now declare ourselves to be one body and our union consummated in the name of the father and of the son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen."

Differing Governments

The merger is the first in the United States to link historically divided families of Protestantism with differing forms of church government.

"We unite in mutual trust and not any wise in fear," said the Rev. Dr. Fred Hoskins, New York executive minister of the Congregational Christian General Council.

"We come to this union in faith that God has his hand in it all."

Together, the denominations have a membership of more than two million.

Declaring a "new unit of the household of God" was now established, the Rev. Dr. James E. Wagner, Philadelphia, president of the E. and R. Church said. "We will find ourselves increasingly one through the loving zeal with which we now reinforce each other in our witness for Christ."

Bonds of Union Agreed

A constitution of the new church still is to be written, adhering to a "basis of union" already agreed on, and subject to approval of two thirds of the individual congregations.

A colorful parade through six blocks of downtown Cleveland preceded the unification ceremonies.

Two abreast, nearly 1,000 clergymen and laymen, representing the merging bodies and other denominations, marched side-by-side to the city's big Music Hall.

Flags of 18 Nations

Flags of 18 nations where the denominations carry on mission work, and of 53 denominational colleges and seminaries fluttered along the street.

Inside the auditorium, the gathering joined in a stirring hymn, "The Church's One Foundation."

After formal presentation of the merger agreements, a solemn "united prayer" was given by Dr. Douglas Horton, president of Har-

'2nd Honeymoon' Almost Tragic for Actress, Family

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. June 25 (AP)—A "second honeymoon" yacht voyage almost ended in tragedy for movie actress Jeanne Crain, her husband Paul Brinkman and their four children.

They were rescued last night after their 11-foot yacht Pavane drifted onto rocks on the Newport jetty with its motor dead and its hull taking on water.

Miss Crain and Brinkman became seasick and exhausted as the vessel wobbled helplessly in the swells. The sons, Robert, 13, Paul, 10, and daughter Jeanne, 8, managed to stay on their feet.

Miss Crain said she and her husband had decided on a "second honeymoon" cruise while she was at liberty between pictures.

The Pavane ran aground off Catalina Island yesterday afternoon and began taking on water. Brinkman then headed back to Newport Beach—and the motor cooked out.

The Pavane's distress signal was heard by Worthington Lee of Corona Del Mar while listening to his short wave radio. He ran to a nearby Coast Guard station. A Coast Guard rescue vessel arrived at the scene just as the excursion craft Bay Queen put two men aboard the Pavane to handle towing lines. The Pavane was brought in safely.

City Planners Approve Plats, Grant Variances

In a brief 45-minute session Tuesday evening, the Salem Planning Commission approved ordinance variations requested by two Salem property owners and also approved a subdivision plat for some 15 acres of property on North River Road.

No property owners appeared for a public hearing on the variance petition submitted by Richard P. Embick requesting a 30-foot setback in an area zoned for a 40-foot setback line. The council approved the variance for two lots on Holiday Drive in Crestview Addition in South Salem.

The council also granted a variance for Dwight and Margaret Lear on 17th and Market Streets which are zoned for 40-foot and 50-foot setbacks. Approval was granted on condition that the Lears sign an agreement to remove any station set over the line on 90 days notice.

The approved subdivision plat, submitted by Petta and Allison Investors, Inc., contains 41 residential lots. It is located on the east side of North River Road just north of the junction with Broadway.

At the request of Walter Foster, the council also recommended to the Polk County Court that the county acquire 60-foot right-of-ways on Gehlar and Glen Creek Roads just out of West Salem City limits. The council also recommended improving Military Road between the two roads to its full 60-foot width.

Salem Family Hurt In Albany Accident Said Improving

Virgil J. Miller, his wife, and daughter Susan, seriously injured Sunday in a head-on collision near Albany, are gradually improving, attendants at Albany and Salem General hospitals reported.

All three were described as in "fair" condition Tuesday evening. Miller will be moved from Albany to the Salem General Hospital today, according to Mrs. Henry Baer of Salem, Mrs. Miller's mother.

Mrs. Miller, suffering from numerous fractures and lacerations, remained in semi-conscious state. Susan, 4, who had been unconscious since the afternoon accident, was slowly coming out of her coma, attendants said.

Schrunk Said Victim of 'Frame-ups'

PORTLAND, June 25 (AP)—Defense testimony Tuesday pictured Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk as the victim of frame-up plots organized by Gambler Jim Elkins with former Police Chief James Purcell and former Multnomah County Sheriff Mike Elliott participating.

Earlier in the judge's chambers, Judge James W. Crawford and attorneys were told that Elliott had proposed two plans to frame Schrunk. One involved a 15-year-old girl and the other a dummy bootlegging place. Nothing happened in either case, he said.

Schrunk himself was called as the last witness today but he did not get beyond a recitation of vital statistics and his military record before court adjourned for the day.

Purcell, a police captain who resigned as chief when Schrunk took office as mayor, testified that he knows Elkins and that Elliott had talked to him about a plan to recruit police to join a Philippine security police program. Purcell said the plan looked like a fraud. Purcell was not asked about any frame-up plot.

Bribe Story Denied

Another defense witness, a convict, said he was offered a job to testify "along the line" that Schrunk took a bribe from a gambler nearly two years ago.

But Robert W. Fink, serving time in the Washington state prison for forgery, said "as far as I know today no actual bribe was taken."

Fink was called by defense attorneys seeking to show that the mayor was framed by political enemies who feared he would shut down gambling operations in the city.

Fink said a part-time bartender, Frank Daniels, told him in the fall of 1934 that he "had a gim-mick" that Schrunk was supposed to have taken a bribe on Sept. 11, 1935, from gambler Clifford O. Bennett after a raise on Bennett's club. Schrunk was county sheriff at the time.

Before Schrunk Election

Daniels promised him a job. Fink said, if he would testify "along that line," Fink said, "but I got the impression it was 'Fink said he couldn't testify to that because he was in prison at the time of the raid. The conversation took place in the fall of 1934, a short time before Schrunk was elected mayor."

Earlier today Daniels testified that he saw Bennett leave an envelope near a telephone pole after the raid and later saw Schrunk walk over and pick it up.

Daniels said he talked to Bennett later the morning of the raid. Bennett said he "figured he was going to take a pinch but everything was all right now," Daniels testified.

In other testimony Fink said he talked with Raymond Clark, an employee of Elkins, on how to raise money to beat Schrunk in the mayoralty campaign.

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In addition, two \$2 bills were stolen, an old silver dollar and about \$1.50 in change. Entry was made through a garage door and then through a kitchen door, police reported.

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National Steel Founder Dies

PHILADELPHIA, June 26 (AP)—E. T. Weir, one of America's great steelmasters, died at 115 a. m. today in a Philadelphia hospital.

Weir would have been 82 next Aug. 1. He was the founder and for many years executive head of National Steel Corp.

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Mrs. Alta Wright, 640 N. Commercial St., who reported the youths missing, said they have not been heard from since Saturday evening.

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He was born Dec. 4, 1860 in Baden, Germany, and came to the United States in 1914 and settled in St. Louis, Mo.

He lived in St. Louis 17 years before he came to Mt. Angel, where for a number of years he was a meat cutter at the Mt. Angel Abbey and later with the Mt. Angel Meat Lockers Co.

Paulus married the former Thelma Weiland of Mt. Angel in June 1944.

In addition to his widow surviving there are a number of brothers and sisters in Germany.

2 Architects Hired to Study Fairgrounds

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Jack Travis, commission chairman, said Tuesday. The fee for their survey has been set at \$5,000.

The two architects, Thomas A. Balshiser and Alan G. Sedar, started Tuesday on the survey which the commission hopes will show the adequacy of buildings and grounds, roads, sidewalks, picnic and parking area, and the relation of these to the fair, the city of Salem and to the state highways.

Included in the information the survey will give, will be the continuation of the buildings in use, possibility of remodeling for the future, and necessity for replacement. The architects will put a life expectancy on all of the buildings, and develop a traffic plan in reference to buildings and entrances to the fair.

The survey will also include the suggested location for the new \$300,000 junior building, and the armory, which "may or may not," Travis said, be built at the fairgrounds.

"With such a survey, we hope that we, as the present commission, as well as future commissions, will be able to go ahead and plan in an orderly fashion, for fairs not only in the immediate future but for fairs in 15 to 20 years from now," Travis said. He added: "Certainly such plans should prevent replacements of a number of buildings coming at one time. It should make it much easier both for the fair commissions and the taxpayers."

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Moses Stegner, Salem Church Leader, Dies

Moses B. Stegner, 86, who was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church and superintendent of the Adult Sunday School class, died Tuesday in his home, 1827 N. Cottage St., after a long illness.

Stegner sang in the church choir 10 years and was also a member of the Salem YMCA choral group. He was a charter member of the Salem Knite and Fork Club, Salem Toastmasters, and helped organize the Harvester's Club of the Presbyterian Church and the Golden Age Club of the YWCA.

Stegner was born April 23, 1871 near Kenyon, Minn., and lived in Salem 32 years.

After attending normal school in Fargo, N.D., he taught school in that state and later graduated from St. Paul's Business College. He was a railroad employee for many years and once in Little Rock, Ark., gave a welcoming address for President Theodore Roosevelt.

Stegner next operated a business in Waverly, Minn., and helped organize the State Bank of Gilman in Wisconsin.

He arrived in Salem in 1924 and started a real estate and insurance business at 130 N. Commercial Street. He sold his business to William Krueger about 11 years ago.

Stegner married Minnie Kleinmeyer of St. Paul, Minn., in June 1896. She passed away in 1930.

In January 1941 he married the Maudie P. Fleming of Salem, who died in 1950.

In 1951 he married D. A. (Golda) MacGillis of Gilman, Wis., who survives.

Surviving in addition to his widow are his son, Ralph Stegner, Portland; grandchildren, Miss Ann and David Stegner, Portland, and sister, Mrs. Anita Schroeder, Minneapolis.

Services are pending at the Cough-Barrick Funeral Home.

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Two Hurt in Salem Crash
