Graham Gets New Yorkers

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP)—Billy Graham tonight asked New York area people in his audience at Madison Square Garden to stand up. An estimated 85 per cent of the audience of 16,500 rose to their feet, then sat down at his bidding.

This was the evangelist's way of replying to critics who, he said, have claimed that New Yorkers are not attending his nightly services at the big arena.

Graham's staff reported that the New York crusade has now run longer than any other event ever held at the Garden. Tonight's service was Graham's 41st. A circus previously held the record of 40 consecutive days of performances.

33 Students From 20 Nations to Gather in Salem for Tour of U.S.

Thirty-three youths from 20 nations will gather in Salem Friday for a tour of the United States. The youths are guests of Salem families for two days and then on Sunday morning leave on a bus tour of the United States.

The youths have spent the last year in the United States under the American Field Service program. They have completed their senior high school year here and lived with American families, sponsored by various service clubs. The purpose is to promote good will among peoples.

A typical example is Anders Frykholm from Stockholm, Sweden, who has been living for the last year with P. H. and Edith Brydon at 1800 Park Ave. His stay has been the project of the Salem Rotary Club.

One of two in Salem

Frykholm, 18, has been one of two AFS foreign students in Salem during the past school year. Ellen Hauke of Oslo, Norway, left in the middle of the term because of illness. He has mixed emotions about leaving.

"I'm excited to return home, to see my family but I'm also sad about leaving," he remarked Wednesday. "I've had a wonderful time."

During the year he attended North Salem High School learned about American ways, made friends in the Salem area and visited California and the coast. He found the countryside and people almost the same as Sweden, but said the main difference is in the customs. "We follow older customs and sometimes you don't follow any customs," he observed.

Just meeting other people and living with them—that's an experience," said Frykholm.

The American Field Service is a non-sectarian volunteer organization that administers the program, choosing the foreign students on the basis of "character, leadership, scholarship, a fluent knowledge of English and a genuine desire to know democracy as it is lived in the United States."

A total of 787 young people have visited the United States under the AFS program during the past year.

In Oregon, California

The 33 that will assemble in Salem are citizens of Austria, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Greece, Guatemala, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Norway, Pakistan, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and Turkey. They have been living in Oregon and California. They are scheduled to arrive today at the YMCA and go from there to different private homes.

On Saturday afternoon they will tour the Capitol and in the evening attend a reception and dance at the "Y" where they will be welcomed by Mayor Robert White.

New Walnut Size Standards Adopted

New grade size specifications for unshelled walnuts and two new grades, Mammoth and Standard, have been adopted by the State Agricultural Department as a result of a recent hearing, the department said Wednesday.

At the same time Oregon mixed grade was dropped from the walnut terminology.

Some changes in filbert standing grades were considered at the hearing but those were not adopted, according to Frank McKinnon, plant division chief for the department. Walnut changes are now in operation.

L&C Counties to Fight Fee Ruling

EUGENE, June 26 (AP)—The Assn. of L. & C. Counties plans to fight against a recent court ruling to grant a "substantial" legal fee to A. W. Lafferty, Portland attorney.

Kenneth Nielsen, Lane County commissioner, said the association's executive committee voted yesterday in Portland to fight the decision by the federal Court of Appeals that Lafferty is entitled to the fee for work in connection with court fights for distribution of seven million dollars held by the federal government.

UNION CITY, N.J., June 26 (AP)—Barber Jerry Provitera reminded today about a clipping he took recently.

A man came into his shop and asked for a haircut, shave, and shampoo.

After stepping down from the chair, the man turned to a youngster waiting his turn, and said, "wait here for me after you get your haircut." Then the man walked out of the shop.

Provitera said he didn't press for immediate payment, considering the boy's suitable security.

He gave the lad a haircut. Finishing up, he asked the boy, "Where's your father?"

The boy burst into tears and said, "That man isn't my father. He met me on the street and said I needed a haircut. I don't have any money."

Provitera dried the boy's tears and sent him home.

State Suicide Rate Drops

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—The suicide rate dropped to a record low in Oregon last year, the state Board of Health said Tuesday.

There were 205 suicides, a rate of 11.4 per 100,000 population. The previous low was 12.1 in 1917.

The board said, however, that Oregon traditionally has one of the nation's worst suicide records. Only Vermont, Idaho, Nevada and Washington had higher rates in 1954, the last year for which national figures are available.

The national rate last year was estimated at 9.7.

The board also said the greatest number of Oregon suicides occur in spring and that four times as many men take their lives as do women.

Governors Chide Ike for Interest Rate

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., June 26 (AP)—The nation's governors called on President Eisenhower and Congress today to take action to lower interest rates on billions of dollars worth of state, school and local bonds.

Winding up their 49th annual conference, the governors elected Republican Gov. William G. Stratton of Illinois as their chairman, succeeding Democratic Gov. Thomas B. Stanley of Virginia. They voted to hold next year's conference in Florida.

In the conference's closing session, the governors whipped out a series of resolutions. One of these met President Eisenhower's personal delivery request for an appointment of representatives for a task force to survey the possibility of a rollback of federal government functions to the states.

But in a surprising action the governors also endorsed what amounted to an attack on the Eisenhower administration's "tight money" policy. Democrats have made it clear they intend to make this policy one of the chief issues of next year's campaign for control of Congress.

Although conference actions were taken in closed session, all the Republican governors went along with a statement suggesting Eisenhower and Congress take some action toward "alleviating" the burden of high interest rates. Democratic Gov. George Leader of Pennsylvania drafted the statement.

Gov. Holmes of Oregon was among those signing the statement.

California Man Named by Kiwanis

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 26 (AP)—H. Park Arnold, a Glendale, Calif., lumber dealer and machine part manufacturer, today was unanimously elected president of Kiwanis International.

Also selected today were two vice presidents, a treasurer and 12 trustees. Among the trustees was Ben H. Hazen, Portland, Ore.

Judges Fight Division of West District

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26 (AP)—Judges of the U. S. Court of Appeals, ninth circuit, voiced opposition today to dividing the court which serves seven states and three territories.

Chief Judge William Dennyman called "perfectly absurd" a Senate proposal for separate organizations of an 11th district including four Pacific Northwest states.

The court now includes California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Nevada, Montana, Idaho and the territories of Alaska, Hawaii and Guam.

Mother Still Searching for Plane Wreck

NORTH BEND, Wash., June 26 (AP)—A Tennessee school teacher has begun her ninth summer of searching Cascade Mountain roads and trails for traces of a son who vanished in a Navy plane in 1949.

"I feel definitely encouraged each year," said elderly Mrs. O.C. Mayes of Clinton, Tenn., as she started again on her lonely mission from this foothills town on the west side of the Cascades.

Ensign Gaston E. Mayes, 23, vanished on a flight from Seattle with Lt. J.G. Benjamin O. Vreeland now keeps Mrs. Mayes' husband at home, and two other Mayes children now have children of their own.

The mother has become a familiar figure to loggers and foresters in the area and they give what help they can. Mrs. Mayes, by piecing together the many bits of information she has gathered, thinks she has localized the probable area of the crash.

She explains her mission simply: "We want to take him home."

Hen Holds to Egg Per Day

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., June 26 (AP)—Meg O'Day is still laying an egg a day, Rutgers University crowed today.

Rutgers took a gender at the hen's record and cackled that she had laid 235 eggs in the last 235 days, quite an accomplishment in the world of poultry.

It's the best score so far in the 28-year history of the Rutgers-sponsored Hunterdon County egg laying test.

The university wants everyone to know that the contest is not just a lot of low play. It helps research work and aids chicken breeders.

Handcuffed Youth Escapes Police

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—A 16-year-old youth wearing handcuffs jumped out of a moving police car here last night and got away.

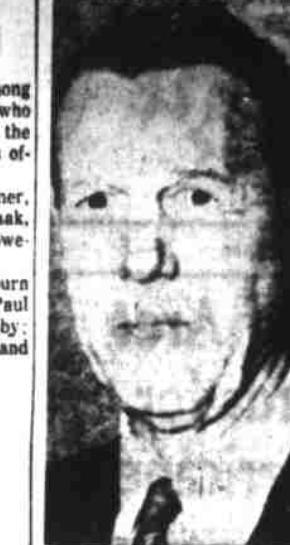

Excess Gas Use Penalties Suspended

Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan announced Wednesday that penalty proposals against Oregon utilities which have exceeded their supply contracts have been suspended by the Federal Power Commission.

Morgan said he had been advised that hearings on the penalties proposed by Northwest Pipeline Corp. are scheduled. The company is the only supplier of natural gas in the Northwest.

The proposal would allow Northwest Pipeline to attach drastic penalties to the standard rate whenever utilities need more gas than they have contracted. Morgan said that this was to force utilities to buy the maximum amount of gas.

The standard rate is about 3 cents per hundred cubic feet. Under the penalty proposal it would jump to from 9 cents to \$1.03 per hundred cubic feet.

Fog Brings New Color To Houses

RUTHERFORD, N.J., June 26 (AP)—A senior state engineer gave discouraging news today to homeowners who awoke Tuesday to find their houses mysteriously changed in color.

Lester Barrer, senior engineer for the Department of Public Health, explained the mystery this way after two of his chemists examined the homes with Rutherford health officials:

A hydrogen sulfide solution in the atmosphere discolored the paint by creating lead sulfide from the lead base paint.

Moreover, Barrer said, the brown blotches on the white homes will vanish only when the paint is removed or covered up.

This was bad news to the 200 homeowners here and in nearby Lyndhurst and North Arlington who had their houses discolored.

Residents had reported an extensive fog settled over the area Monday night.

Non-Support Charged

Richard Omar Veneman, 1094 S. 23rd St., was arrested Wednesday night by Salem police on a Marion County circuit court warrant charging non-support. Bail was set at \$500. Veneman was released by police to the Marion County sheriff's office.

Burns Lawyer Indicted Again in Traffic Death

BURNS, June 26 (AP)—Burns attorney Willis F. Bardwell, 37, today was re-indicted by a Harney County grand jury on two counts stemming from the traffic death of Douglas Mullarky, co-publisher of the Burns Times-Herald.

Bardwell was indicted May 15 on charges of manslaughter and hit-and-run in the April 4 death of the publisher. The indictments were found faulty by Circuit Judge William S. Fort and were dismissed June 10. Today's indictments charge the same offenses.

Police said that Mullarky died from injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile.
