Doyle Beats Jacobson For JC Tennis Crown

Harry Doyle, state prep champion from Portland, rallied to score a repeat victory over Salem's Bill Jacobson in the finals of Division I in the State Junior Chamber of Commerce tennis tournament yesterday on the Willamette University courts.

Doyle, who defeated the South Salem High athlete in the high school singles finals this spring, posted set scores of 4-6, 10-8, 6-1.

In the Division II finals, Joe Harvey of Milwaukie won in straight sets from Keith Baxter of Klamath Falls, 6-2, 6-1.

All four boys earned berths in the National Jaycee tournament at Santa Monica, Calif., August 6-10.

In the girls' finals Saturday, Mary Campbell won over Dorothy Moen. Both girls are from Salem.

Doyle, seeded No. 1, dropped only one set, that being the first in the finals to Jacobson, as he vanquished three foes in the preliminary rounds enroute to the crown.

Jacobson, seeded No. 2, also powered by three losses after a first round default.

In the best-of-five championship set, Jacobson picked off the first set and had a 3-0 lead in the second. Then Doyle rallied to tie and to win in extra games, 10-8. Doyle won the third set handily and clinched the Division I title, 6-3.

Heavyweight Bout Okehed

TACOMA, Wash., June 30 (AP) — The Washington State Athletic Commission decided today to stand by its approval of the proposed heavyweight boxing championship fight between Champion Floyd Patterson and Olympic champion Pete Rademacher at Seattle Aug. 22.

Dr. Charles P. Larson of Tacoma, chairman of the commission, said the commission decided to ignore the action of the National Boxing Assn. which said Friday it would not sanction the proposed battle.

"If Rademacher wins," Dr. Larson said, "we will recognize him as heavyweight champion of the world in the great sovereign state of Washington, regardless of what the NBA says."

Yankees Forge Ahead

Milwaukee Takes 2 To Retain NL Lead

Redlegs Keep Pace With Pair; White Sox, Washington Divide

The New York Yankees jumped into a full-game lead over Chicago in the American League race, defeating Kansas City twice 2-1 and 5-1 while Washington was holding the White Sox even in their two hill Sunday.

Effective pitching by Tom Sturdivant and Don Lauen together with a timely two-run double by pinch hitter Harry Simpson extended the Yankees' streak over the Athletics to 11 victories in as many games.

Ray Seavers knocked the White Sox out of a first place tie, slugging a two-run homer with two out in the 10th inning to give Washington an 11-8 victory after Chicago had rallied for four runs in the ninth to win the opener 7-4.

Loe Wins Ninth
Jackie Jensen's grand slam homer in Ted Williams' 20th four-bagger of the season helped the Boston Red Sox down Detroit 4-3 for their 11th victory in last 13 games.

Edstrom Is Runner-up UO Spiker Finishes Strong in Decathlon

KINGSBURG, Calif., June 30 (Special) — The University of Oregon's versatile Dave Edstrom, a sophomore-to-be from Sherwood, Ore., finished strong to capture second place in the grueling National AAU decathlon championships here late last night.

The title went to Charley Pratt, former Manhattan College athlete now in the army with 7,164 points.

Edstrom, in third place throughout most of the competition in the 10 events, nosed out Bob Lawson of the University of Southern California, via Aberdeen, Wash., for second spot. Edstrom had 6,811 points to 6,510 for the Aberdeen flash.

Edstrom won the javelin with a toss of 179' 1 1/2", good for 615 points. He tied for sixth in the pole vault at 11' 3" for another 480 points and then finished 11th in the endurance-testing 1500 meters with a time of 4:32.2 for a final 315 points which pulled him ahead of Lawson.

In earlier events, Edstrom tied for first in the high jump at 4' 7", was second in the broad jump at 23' 6", was fourth in the 400 meters in 56.3 seconds, tied for fourth in the 100 meters in 11.1 seconds, was seventh in the shot put at 47' 7", was fourth in the 110 meter high hurdles in 15.1 seconds and was fourth in the discus at 139' 11".

KINGSBURG, Calif., June 30 (AP) — Charley Pratt parlayed his long, swift strides and hurdling speed into the 1957 National AAU Decathlon championship last night. He won the 10-event struggle with 7,164 points.

Where Pratt plans to give up the sport, the second and third place finishers, Dave Edstrom of the University of Oregon and Bob Lawson of the University of Southern California, said they hope to continue and try for the 1960 Olympic squad.

Edstrom, an 18-year-old from Sherwood, Ore., who just completed his freshman year, won the javelin throw last night with a toss of 179 feet 1 1/2 inches as he beat out Lawson with 6,811 points to 6,510. It was the Oregon youngster's first decathlon try.

Pratt won the 100-meter dash in 10.4 seconds, the 400 in 48.3 and the 11-meter high hurdles in 14.1. He also broad jumped 22 feet 7 1/2 inches, high jumped 6-2, pole vaulted 10-8 1/2, threw the discus 139-11, put the shot 47-7, hurled the javelin 153-6 and ran 1,500 meters in 4:32.3.

Fourth place in the overall totals went to Jim Klein of the Los Angeles Striders with 6,518 followed by Ken Kelley of the Army's Brooke Medical Center at San Antonio, Tex., 6,250; Howard Smith of the Striders, 6,161; Phil Mulkey, Memphis, Tenn., 6,092; Hank Ketels, USC, 5,935; Glen Lewis, De Soto, Mo., 5,750; and Hubert Moore, Camp Pendleton Marines, 5,698.
