U.S. Seeks 10-Month A-Test Ban

LONDON, July 2.—The United States tonight conditionally proposed a ten-month ban on all atomic and H-bomb tests. The conditions laid down by Harold E. Stassen, U.S. delegate to the U.N. Disarmament Subcommittee.
