Jury Trials Defended by Bar Leader

PORT WORTH, Tex., July 4 (AP)—The president of the American Bar Assn. today defended charges that jury is an outmoded, time-consuming process which can be replaced by more efficient legal procedure.
David F. Maxwell of Philadelphia, who heads the lawyers' organization, said instead that jury trials are the ultimate protection against invasion of personal freedom.
He spoke at the diamond jubilee celebration of the State Bar of Texas.
"Too many persons today are prone to view trial by jury solely as a fact-finding device, and hence expendable, if as good or better a method can be devised," he said.
These critics are influenced, Maxwell said, by the late Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes who wrote that an experienced judge should be able to represent the common sense of the community far better than the average jury.
"Such a contention presupposes the ability of the trial judge to discard biases and prejudices built up within himself through his personal experience and background," Maxwell said, adding that a group of average citizens can mete out more even justice than can the most competent and experienced judge.
"So let us in this country take warning," he said. "The jury alone is able to function as the thin wedge of reserved power that separates our system of law from the monolithic, totalitarian despotism behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains."

2 Honeymooners Found Dead in Plane Wreckage

BENNINGTON, Vt., July 4 (AP)—The bodies of two New York honeymooners, missing since Sunday, were found today in the wreckage of their airplane in rugged terrain near Somerset Reservoir, the Air Force reported.
Capt. Maurice Howell of Grenier Air Force Base, Manchester, N. H., directing the ground search said the bodies were found by a ground crew after the wreckage was spotted from an Army helicopter.
The ground crew was forced to beat through a rugged mountain area for more than five hours before it came upon the wreckage and the bodies, Howell said.
Searchers said there was no doubt they were the bodies of Mark Larue of Hudson Falls, N. Y., and his bride of 13 days, who vanished while on a flight from Nantucket, Mass., to Glen Falls, N. Y.

Fireworks Display Ends in Tragedy

SILVER CITY, N. M., July 4 (AP)—A community display ended in tragedy here tonight as two men were seriously injured when fireworks exploded.
Melvin H. Porterfield, about 41, and Bill Word, about 42, both of Silver City, were helping to set off the annual display when an explosion of unknown origin ripped through the fireworks.

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French Boycott U.S. 4th, Protest Algeria Proposal

BREST, France, July 4 (AP)—French patriotic organizations in this Brittany seaport today boycotted American Fourth of July celebrations to protest Sen. John Kennedy's speech urging the United States to work for Algerian independence.
The town has staged annual celebrations to commemorate the arrival here of the American Expeditionary Force in 1917 during World War I.
Only a few scattered persons showed up for the ceremonies where Casimir Zdzewski, American consul in Cherbourg, laid a wreath on the monument to American war dead.

Iranian Puts Quake Death Toll at 5,000

TEHRAN, Iran, July 4 (AP)—A member of Parliament said tonight more than 5,000 Iranians were killed by earthquakes Tuesday in one mountainside and coastal area along the Caspian Sea.
Reports from there said survivors are battling wolves, sickness, thirst and starvation.
The area is nearly 100 miles northeast of Tehran, across the towering Elburz Mountain range, and about the same distance from Soviet Turkmenistan. No quake reports have come from Soviet sources.
Iran announced officially earlier in the day that the known quake death toll for the whole 50,000-square-mile area of devastation totaled more than 1,500.
Deputy Amidi Nuri, representing much of the stricken area, arose in the Majlis—lower house of Parliament—and dramatically challenged the government figures.
He said that because most villages in the area of devastation between ancient Amul and Babul have no roads or communications the government was unaware of the greater death toll.
A government spokesman quickly replied that later reports indicated the toll was well above the 1,500 figure the government announced earlier.
The government acknowledged that aid teams had not yet reached most of the quake-ravaged part of northern Iran.

Wounded Burglar Search Continues

PORTLAND, July 4 (AP)—The search continued today for a man who was wounded while burglarizing the Rainbow Lodge yesterday near here.
Multnomah County sheriff's deputies said the man, apparently wounded in both legs, fled from the lodge after being shot by proprietor William Honeyman.
Honeyman told deputies he wounded the man with a shotgun after the burglar tried to run from the building.

Big A-Blast Slated Again

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev., July 4 (AP)—If favorable weather continues, scientists will touch off tomorrow what could be the biggest nuclear explosion on this continent.
The test, sixth of the summer series, had been set for today but was postponed for technical reasons. At this morning's weather briefing conditions were said to be good for a firing at 4:40 a.m. tomorrow.
The device will be suspended from a balloon 1,500 feet over Yucca Flat 75 miles northwest of here. More than 1,000 Marines are to crouch in trenches, then conduct maneuvers after the burst.
If the device returns the maximum amount of energy, scientists say, it will be the biggest bang ever heard in the Western Hemisphere.

Portland Man Named Top Rider at St. Paul Rodeo

ST. PAUL, Ore., July 4 (AP)—Portland cowboy, Billy Boag, topped some of the best U.S. and Canadian cowboys to win all-around cowboy honors as the 22nd annual St. Paul Rodeo came to an end tonight.
Boag, one of the youngest cowboys to ever take this rodeo championship, placed his name on the rodeo association's coveted gold trophy and captured an extra \$250 in cash money along with hundreds of dollars in prize money in bulldozing a bareback riding event.

Boag, about 20, started his rodeo career in the Western Riders Arena near Gresham and has been following the nation's rodeo circuit for less than 10 years.
A former University of Southern California sprinter and veteran rodeo performer, Barney Willis, Visalia, Calif., was runner-up to Boag.

Roping Champion
Ray Wharton, Bandera, Tex., won the calf-roping championship. Don McLaughlin, Smithfield, Tex., four times world champion calf roper, posted this year's fastest St. Paul rodeo time of 13 seconds for a single calf, only 18 seconds behind the St. Paul record.
Tully Cooper, Monument, N.M., was runner-up to the calf roping champion, followed by Dick Knight, Yuma, Ariz., and Herschel Romaine, Big Springs, Tex. Buck Boyce, Harve, Mont., posted enough points to win the bareback riding championship, followed by Darryl Hobbey, Gooding, Idaho, Jim Roser, Caldwell, Idaho, and Jackie Wright, Dayville.

Farm Prices Note Decline

PORTLAND, July 4 (AP)—Prices Oregon farmers received for their products dropped 3 per cent in the month that ended June 15.
The U. S. Department of Agriculture said wheat, feed grains, hay and potatoes led the decline. In livestock, prices went up for hogs, lambs, broilers and wool, but dropped for beef cattle and calves.
The price index was 1 per cent under the previous June. Livestock prices were 4 per cent higher than a year ago, but crop prices were down 7 per cent.

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Police Discover Burglar Elusive; 3 Searches Fail

PORTLAND, July 4 (AP)—Twenty-five policemen rushed to the Holman Transfer Co. warehouse today when a burglar alarm went off.
A door in the warehouse was open, but police found no one inside.
One patrolman was left to guard the building. He then heard a door slam, and saw a shadow flit behind a second-floor window.
Police searched once more—this time for two hours—but found no one in the building.
About an hour later the burglar alarm went off again. Back to the warehouse went police. The third search also was fruitless.

Air Force to Be Cut, Official Says

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—Air Force officials told the aircraft industry today that in the future many present production facilities will not be needed and that "an overall personnel reduction" is in prospect.
Air Secretary James Douglas, said a dollar pinch which is now upon the Air Force centers around the expanding missile program.

U.N. Stamp Due

UNITED NATIONS, July 4 (AP)—A special U.N. postage stamp honoring the Security Council will be issued Oct. 24 with a design by secretary of state Rashid-ul-Din of Pakistan. It bears the legend "Security Council to Maintain International Peace and Security" in English on a tan 3-cent stamp and in French on a green 5-cent stamp.

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
