Chinese Red Law Student Attacks Purge

HONG KONG, July 5 (AP)—A girl law student at Peking People's University has accused the Chinese Communists of wrongfully punishing 70,000 Chinese in the 1955 campaign against so-called counter-revolutionaries.
The charge was made by Lin Hsiung, the People's Daily reported in its July 13 issue. The paper described her charge as "indiscreet and absurd."
Charges and counter-charges were made during a month-long series of violent discussions among university students.
The outspoken Miss Lin also asserted there is no press freedom and called on the masses to express their dissatisfaction with the present situation. The paper said.
Beyond saying that 14 per cent of those arrested were executed, the Chinese never disclosed how many persons were involved in the counter-revolutionary movement.

Timber Industry: Ministers La Lung-chi and Communications Minister Chang Po-chun, members of a minor party called the Democratic League have been labeled "rightists" by the People's Daily for questioning the Communists' good graces.
On the other hand the Communist New China News Agency reported that La had defended himself in a tempestuous meeting of the Central Committee of the Democratic League. He is vice chairman of the committee.

Top Democrats Gather to Dedicate Truman Library

KANSAS CITY, July 5 (AP)—Politicians just naturally bubbled up as top Democrats of the Truman White House gathered today around their former chief tonight. In separate interviews, on the eve of the Truman Library dedication, they belatedly lauded the former administration's foreign, fiscal and farm policies.
I may be out of politics but politics never will be out of me, declared Mrs. India Edwards, former vice chairman of the Democratic National Committee. Her statement seemed to describe the others, too.
Dean Acheson, former secretary of state, said U.S. foreign policy is drifting badly.
"Other alliances have become weakened and our position of respect in the world has declined," Acheson added.
Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, former ambassador to Russia, asserted the administration's money policy is directing money to big business. Harriman said construction of homes and schools is being hurt and small business is having its troubles.
Charles F. Brannan, former secretary of agriculture, branded the farm and bank plan as a fraud.
"It is a political fraud," Brannan stated. "And I don't think it has achieved its announced ends—that of reducing alleged surpluses."
A Republican appeared on the scene, too. Chief Justice Earl Warren, but he said he would have to steer clear of any comments on the international situation, politics, or much of anything else.

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Blast Strikes Soybean Plant In Illinois

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—An explosion ripped through a part of the big Glidden soybean processing company plant tonight. The blast and subsequent fire injured at least two workers.

Injured were Jefferson Nicholson, 30, and Sandra Harrison, 35, Negroes. Nicholson was reported in serious condition with third degree burns on most of his body. Harrison suffered burns on the hands. Both were hospitalized.

The explosion occurred at the firm's mixing plant, a three-story structure. Police said the entire top floor of the building was blown out by the force of the explosion.

A new shift was preparing to report for work at the Northwest Side plant shortly before the explosion. Authorities said most employees were believed to have escaped.

Albert H. Petersen, assistant to the Fire Commissioner, estimated damage at \$300,000. He said cause of the blast could not be determined immediately.

The fire called for a 5-11 alarm, meaning a good share of the city's fire-fighting equipment was sent to the scene.

Smoke and a nauseating stench covered a wide area near the fire. Persons living near the plant reported houses, several blocks away were rocked by the blast.

Fireworks Bomb Blast Injures Lad

PATERSON, N.J., July 5 (AP)—A married aerial bomb picked up from a Fourth of July fireworks display by a teen-age boy exploded today almost blowing his brother to bits.

The boy, Joseph Bonnick, 14, was rushed to Paterson General Hospital where his condition was described as critical.

All his fingers were blown off and his ankle was nearly severed and four gaping holes were torn in his body by the blast, police said.

It also rocked the neighborhood, leaving off the Bonnick's cellar door shattering a window and hurling part of the bomb's container into Joseph's room where it was embedded in a mattress.

Joseph, 15-year-old brother, Michael, had picked up the bomb last night when it landed at his feet after failing to explode during a fireworks display at Hinch life Stadium. Michael told police.

Mrs. Bonnick ordered Michael not to play with it and he left it near the garbage can. This afternoon, Michael said he saw Joseph pick it up and slam it down on the sidewalk. Some of the powder spilled out, Michael said, and when Joseph lit a match to it, it went off.

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Graham Audience Hears Film Actress Dale Evans

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—A capacity crowd of 18,000 heard evangelist Billy Graham and actress Dale Evans in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Miss Evans, wife of cowboy star Ray Rogers, sang a medley of gospel songs and told how she accepted Christ nine years ago. She said she and her family, which includes five adopted children and two of her own, would be able to live in a land of make-believe like Hollywood if they didn't have Christ.

The Rogers children include a Korean, an American Indian and one of Scottish descent.

Before beginning his sermon to the huge throng, which included the standees, Graham asked all those under 25 to stand. Observers said about 60 per cent of the crowd arose.

The evangelist's subject was "Youth Affirms." His text was Ezekiel 37:1-14. He sought for a man among them, that should make up the bridge and stand in the gap before Me for the land that I should not destroy it. But I found none.

Graham said God is searching for young people to serve him. He said that in his travels around the world he had seen young people giving their all for communism. God demands no less, the evangelist said.

There were 174 decisions of Christ tonight bringing the total for the 30 meetings in 27 cities to 14,000. Attendance at the Garden is now 547,000.

'Fifth' Refuge Takes Ballad From Program

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—The "Fifth" Refuge, Ballad for America, was dropped from the Fourth of July program at the Washington Monument after a protest that its composer had taken the Fifth Amendment.

Rosario Schull, executive director of the National War Relocation Authority, said the program was made to the Marine Corps band this week. Instead of the ballad, the Marine Band played "The Hymn of the Republic and This is My Country."

Earl Robinson, who wrote the Ballad for America, to make refused to tell the House committee on Un-American Activities at a hearing in New York April 14 whether he was a Communist.

In refusing Robinson invoked the Fifth Amendment's protection against self-incrimination.
