

Ke Signs Bill to Permit Lower Down Payments On FHA-Insured Homes

WASHINGTON, July 12 — Legislation permitting lower down payments on FHA-insured homes was signed by President Eisenhower today. But whether the reduced scale will go into effect will be known until next week. Eisenhower did not say one way

or the other, although he criticized other features of the omnibus housing bill in announcing his approval of the measure as a whole. Ever since Congress passed the bill on July 1 there has been an argument in administration quarters over whether its lower down-payment provision would have an inflationary effect.

Action Due Next Week
A spokesman for the Federal Housing Administration said today it was indicated that Commissioner Norman P. Mason probably will take advantage of the new authority to reduce down payments. He said no definite action will be taken until next week. Later in the day, Mason said he has the "responsibility of determining whether lower down payments are in the public interest" at this time. He said he wants "to correct any assumption that he has already made that finding." He said he has not yet done so.

Far Housing Projects
In addition to the lower down-payment provision, the bill authorizes \$1,990,000,000 for various housing programs. Eisenhower said the measure carries out his housing proposals "in the main" but unfortunately, he added, it also contains a number of very serious defects. He asked Congress to repeal some of these features early next year. He said the \$1,990,000,000 in new obligations authority is more than double the amount he requested and "runs directly counter" to his budget-balancing efforts.

Nat 'Serious Setback'
"However," he added in a statement, "these amounts do not have to be made available for obligation in the current fiscal year. Hence they do not represent so serious a setback in our joint effort to control federal expenditures as to require that the bill be disapproved."
"Accordingly," he said, "I have given instructions to limit the use of the new authority provided by this act during the fiscal year 1958 to amounts consistent with the over-all budget program."
The 1958 fiscal year started July 1 and runs until next June 30. The bill authorizes, but does not direct, the FHA commissioner to reduce the down payment on the first \$10,000 of an FHA-insured mortgage to as low as 3 per cent. An additional 15 per cent would be required for any amount between \$10,000 and \$16,000, and 20 per cent on any amount above \$16,000.

This compares with present requirements of 5 per cent on the first \$9,000 and 25 per cent on the rest. Thus on a \$15,000 home for example, the down payment could be cut from \$1,950 to \$1,050.

U.S. Official Links Cancer To Cigarettes

WASHINGTON, July 12 — Citing recent studies, Surgeon Gen. Leroy E. Burney said today there is increasing evidence that excessive cigarette smoking is one of the causative factors in lung cancer. Burney said the Public Health Service favors more research to identify and "try to eliminate" these factors. He said, "It is clear that heavy and prolonged cigarette smoking is not the only cause of lung cancer."

In New York, Dr. Clarence C. Little, chairman of the scientific advisory board to the Tobacco Industry Research Committee, said Burney's statement adds nothing new to what has been known about the cause of lung cancer. "It reflects the opinions of some statisticians and the relatively few experimental scientists who have actively charged that cigarette smoking is a cause of lung cancer," Little said.

The surgeon general's statement was the first PHS pronouncement on the question since the agency noted in 1954 that there was some evidence of a statistical association between cigarette smoking and lung cancer.

In today's statement, Dr. Burney offered no new proof but cited results of studies, especially one by a special group organized jointly by the Public Health Service, National Cancer Institute and the American Cancer Society and the American Heart Association. This group's findings were made public last March.

Rare Cranes Set Record

NEW ORLEANS, July 12 — Another day passes and two awkward, chubby, growing and changing color fliers—set another world record. The chicks are Audubon Park Zoo's baby whooping cranes. The oldest is 55 days old, the youngest 52 days. No other whooping crane has ever lived longer than 46 days. George Douglas, the overworked zoo superintendent, appears confident these new members of the rare species will grow to maturity. He pronounces them in top health and announces that the youngest is 44 inches high. The oldest, which was injured and had to be separated from its parents for about 10 days last month is 41 inches. When full grown, cranes reach about five feet high. The world has less than 30 of the whoopers, white birds with black underwings and red-tipped heads.

Cure for Tobacco Craving Outlined

LONDON, July 12 — Dr. Henry Berg, a general practitioner writing in the British Medical Journal, suggests cigarettes should be called "cigarettes." He also had these suggestions for beating the craving for tobacco:
1. Eat candy.
2. Bite empty cigarette holder.
3. Chew gum.
4. Switch to filter tips.
Dr. Berg said the filter tip would ease the craving in eight to 10 weeks.

Blackwood Dissatisfied With Trip to Red China

HONG KONG, July 12 — Back from a disappointing 12-month visit to Red China, American Donald J. Blackwood declared tonight he wants to get back to the United States as soon as he can.
"When he gets there," he said, "I will probably work for my father, who operates a chain of restaurants in and near Cincinnati, Ohio."
Blackwood, 35, his Korean wife and infant son arrived in Hong Kong less than 24 hours after he was expelled by the Chinese Communists as an "illegal immigrant" because he slipped into Red China unannounced April 28.
