Mound Star Gives Up 17 Hits But Hangs On

YAKIMA, July 12 (Special)—The Salem Senators hung on for a 10-7 Northwest League series opening win over the Yakima Bears here tonight, a hit-happy contest in which righthander Chuck Lybeck of the Solons went all the way despite being tagged for no less than 17 safe blows. Salem had 12 off five Yakima fingers.

For Lybeck, it was his 14th triumph of the season, against three losses. He's now won all five starts he's had for the Senator, since moving from the Wenatchee club.

Shutout String Broken
Lybeck had three consecutive shutout wins prior to tonight's mix, and ran his consecutive scoreless innings to 25 before the Yaks nicked him for a tally in the fourth inning, on singles by Herm Lewis and Vince Moreci, and Whitey Phillips' sacrifice fly.

The Bears scored another unearned run in the sixth and then pounded the low-headed curveballer for five tallies on six singles and an error in the eighth.

Big Start For Solons
Salem got Lybeck off to a fast start with three runs in the first inning, bombing starter Bob Roberts out with four hits. Roberts had lost a 1-0 game to Salem the

Cards Retain Margin

Jones' Gem Halts Giants; Yanks Win While Chisox Idle

Sad Sam Jones hurled a two-hitter that beat the New York Giants 5-1 last night and retained the St. Louis Cardinals' two-game lead in the National League. Milwaukee reclaimed second place, defeating Pittsburgh 5-4 as the Chicago Cubs knocked Philadelphia back to third with a 5-2 decision.

Brooklyn took fourth place from Cincinnati, handing the Redlegs a seventh consecutive defeat 3-1 in a game free of incident after Thursday night's player battles which led to four \$100 fines.

In the American League, the New York Yankees gained their largest lead of the season, four games, with a 4-2 victory at Kansas City at Harry Simpson, late of the A's, made his first home run as a Yank good on three runs in the eighth. New York is 13-0 against Kansas City this season.

Orleans Slide
Washington and second place Chicago were rained out. Baltimore plunked back to sixth place with an 8-4 defeat at Cleveland that hoisted the Indians into a fourth place tie with Detroit. The Tigers defeated Boston 5-3 as all-star game winner Jim Bunning survived two home runs by Ted Williams to win his 11th.

Jones, now 7-3, had a one-hit shutout until Willie Mays belted his 4th home run with two out in the ninth. The other hit was Whitey Lockman's single in the sixth. The Cards backed up the veteran righthander with home runs by Stan Musial, Alvin Dark and Don Blasingame. Ruben Gomez, waved with Jones after they threw "dusters" at each other, was the loser for a 10-7 record.

The game was interrupted after the fifth—when the beanball warnings were administered—as fans threw sundry items on the field, almost hitting Cardinal right fielder Joe Cunningham with a bottle.

Home's Help Cubs
All of the Cub runs came on three homers, two by Jerry Kindall, off Righthander Robin Roberts, who now has lost six in a row for the first time in his long and spectacular major league career. Ernie Banks got the other Chicago homer, a two-run shot that overhauled a 2-1 Phillie lead in the eighth inning. Roberts, 6-12, has given up 26 homers thus far. Jim Bronson won his first, in relief.

Don McMahon came on to get the final two outs for Milwaukee as the Pirates rallied for two ninth-inning runs against Warren Spahn, who won his ninth. Hank Aaron belted his 20th home run, top total in the majors, and gave the Braves the lead to stay with a sacrifice fly in the seventh after Ed Mathews' triple off loser Elroy Face. Johnny Logan, subbing for injured shortstop Felix Mantilla, hit his second homer in two nights to open a two-run ninth that nailed it.

Newcombe Winner
The Dodgers, held to four hits, broke a 1-1 tie in the eighth as Gene Cimoli tagged Johnny Klippstein's 3-0 pitch for a two-run triple. Don Newcombe won his fifth in a row for a 9-4 record, striking out seven, walking none and giving up only five singles. Klippstein, who struck out 10, now is 3-9.

Simpson's home run off Ralph Terry, who went to the A's in the June 15 deal that sent Simpson to the Yanks—broke a 1-1 tie and carried the Yankees to their sixth consecutive victory. Don Larsen won his fifth, with relief help, giving up a homer to Vic Power in the sixth that matched Mickey Mantle's 24th homer in the first inning. Woody Held, also in on the June trade, homered for the A's other run in the ninth.

Swim Stars Set Marks

HONOLULU, July 12 (AP)—Australia's Lorraine Crapp broke her own world 400-meter freestyle record here tonight as she stroked her way to a 10:24.3 clocking in the annual Koo Nakama swim meet.

Earlier, Nancy Ramey of Seattle bettered the world and American records in the 100-meter butterfly with a narrow win over Shelley Mann of Washington D. C. the Olympic champion for this distance.

Miss Ramey was timed in 1:10.1, fourth tenths of a second under the listed world mark set by A. Voser of The Netherlands in 1954 at Velsen, The Netherlands.

Miss Mann set the American record of 1:11.8 at Inayton Beach Fla. last year.

Earlier, Australia's Dawn Frack (lashed) in a three-lap victory in the 50-meter freestyle in 28.5 seconds, 1/2 seconds under the listed American record.

HONOLULU, July 12 (AP)—Light winds today slowed most of the 34 yachts in the Trans-Pacific race to Honolulu, with the West Coast Yacht Club's Barlovento still in the lead and the Nam Sang of the Los Angeles Yacht Club moving up.

The Barlovento and the Bagatelle of the same club were reported holding on a straight line course.

The Y-Como, which had led on a handicap basis, was holding farther to the north.

The 63-foot cutter Orient has taken the lead on the handicap basis. The Orient and the Nam Sang are both on a more southerly track.

If the winds do not freshen, it is unlikely the leader Barlovento, some 650 miles from Honolulu, could arrive at the Diamond Head finish line before late Monday or early Tuesday.

Czech Star Sets New 1,500 Mark

Jungwirth in Equal of 3:55 Mile

VIENNA, July 12 (AP)—Stanislav Jungwirth, a pale, handsome Czechoslovakian distance runner, today smashed the world record for 1,500 meters and in effect ran the mile five full seconds under four minutes, long considered the absolute barrier.

Jungwirth's time for the 1,500 was 3:58.1. The listed world record is 3:40.6, held by Istvan Rozsolyvari of Hungary. Only yesterday in Finland, Olavi Salola did 3:40.2.

The Czechoslovak news agency CTK reported that Jungwirth made his amazing record on the Houtka track near Prague in beautiful, clear summer weather.

His partial times were 54.9 for 100 meters (the equivalent of 440 yards), 1:54.2 for 300 meters (the equivalent of 330 yards), 2:24.5 for 1,000 meters, 2:43.4 for 1,200 meters (the equivalent of three quarters of a mile) and 3:38.1 for 1,500 meters.

His idea of the blistering pace Jungwirth set may be gained from the fact that the world records are 45.2 for 400 meters, 1:47 for 800 meters, and 2:19 for 1,000 meters. There is no standard mark for 1,200 meters. However, 1:54 for 800 meters (or the half mile) would win most big time college track meets in the United States, and Jungwirth not only did this but kept on going for almost twice the distance.

Track experts reckon that by adding 17 seconds to the 1,500 meter time an equivalent time for the mile can be approximated. Under this computation Jungwirth's mark today would be equivalent to a mile in 3:55.1, as compared to John Landy's world record of 3:58.

Jungwirth is no newcomer to high speed distance running. At the Olympic games in Melbourne he finished sixth in the 1,500 meter race, won by Ron Delany of Villa-

CANADAIQUA, N.Y., July 12 (AP)—Donald Campbell hit 200 miles an hour early today in his jet speedboat, Bluebird II, and was on the dock waiting when the refueling boat came in from the far end of the course.

"Where were you, Andy?" he asked crewman Andy Brown. "I didn't see you."

Brown just shook his head. The British speed king had gone by the refueler so fast he couldn't possibly have seen it.

Campbell, who expects to break his own record of 225.38 miles an hour within the next seven weeks, expressed great satisfaction with the condition of Canadaiqua Lake at the early hour of 6:15 a.m., when the run started.
