Art Show to Be Bigger, Better

SALEM (Special)—An art show that will be representative of the best in Oregon art is promised for the 1957 Oregon State Fair, opening in Salem August 31. Mrs. A. T. King, newly appointed superintendent of the art department, has enlisted the cooperation of all the "big names" in Oregon art circles who has promised to enter the best of their work.

"This will be the first time that the Oregon State Fair has shown work of this calibre," said Mrs. King. "This year, with the help of Dr. Cameron Paulin, head of Willamette University's art department, we have redesigned the art department. In the old roller skating rink it will have suspended walls and lots of hanging space with good lighting."

Mrs. King is a trustee of the Salem Art Association and was first chairman of the art committee of Salem's Bush House Museum.

Among other new features in the art department for this year's fair will be a special section for children's art; a newly designed display case for ceramics and pottery and a sculpture court. Twice daily there will be a free showing of slides of Oregon scenery. Premiums for most exhibits will be higher than for previous years.

Emphasis will be given to photography for which a special salon has been designed. Entries for the art department will close Tuesday, August 27.
