Addressing a 47-member Israeli bond drive delegation from Chicago last night, he declared: "The possibilities of peace with the Arab countries are remote as long as their governments are not democratic and do not care for the needs of their people. People in the Arab countries need bread and housing, not Russian arms."

Ben-Gurion Sees No War, No Peace With Arab Nations

NEWSPOINT, Operation Alert, July 14—A test government-including today strapped a straitjacket of mock "freezes" and controls on a national economy supposedly shattered during the nationwide civil defense exercise. Today the planners of Operation Alert 1957 made an imaginary jump from D-Day Plus 2—the second day after 175 simulated bombers "smashed" 162 cities—into D-Day Plus 15, the digging out period.

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The new problem is: How to survive, fight and win "World War III" with half the population dead, wounded or homeless and with perhaps half of all basic industry trashed into radioactive ruins. To meet that problem under field conditions, more than 5,000 government workers in 30-odd agencies today moved out of Washington by plane, train and auto for duty at some 80 secret relocation centers. They will remain until Friday.
