One-Time Demo Candidate for Presidency Dies

DAYTON, Ohio, July 15.—James M. Cox, unsuccessful Democratic presidential candidate in 1920 and publisher of a group of newspapers, died at his home here tonight. He was 87.

Cox, first man ever to be elected governor of Ohio for three terms, was defeated in the 1920 presidential race by another Ohioan, Warren G. Harding.

Until two weeks ago he was active in publishing his news.
