WARSAW, July 17 (AP)—Eighty philosophers from both sides of the Iron Curtain began a four-day conference today to determine if words like freedom and truth can mean the same thing under both communism and democracy.

Western participants at the meeting of the International Institute of Philosophy say the search for meanings is a main aim. It is the first meeting of the institute in a Red-ruled country and the first since the war in which Marxist philosophers are taking part.

Jury 'Hung' In Trial Minus Defendant

The double rarity of a court trial held without the defendant present and a jury unable to make up its mind occurred Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court during the appeal trial of William O. Doughty, arrested March 25, 1956, in Salem on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

Neuberger Raps Tobacco Price Aid In Wake of Reports

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) introduced legislation today to end tobacco price supports on the ground that smoking may be a contributing cause to lung cancer.
