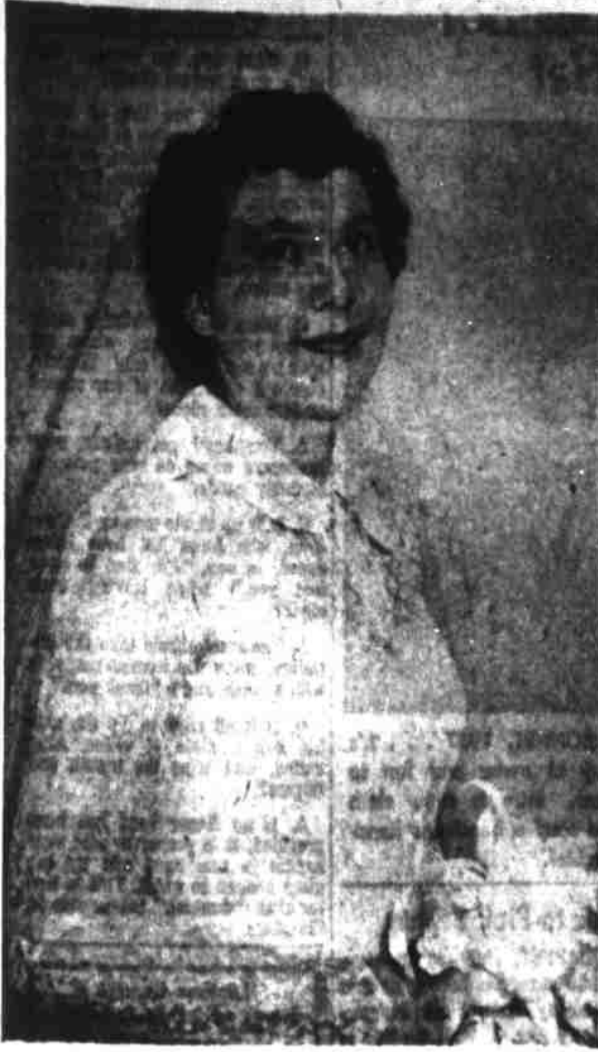


Bride From Canada
