Father, Son Injured in Road Crash



A Salem man and his 18-month-old son were injured Saturday morning in a head-on collision, which totally demolished two trucks at the top of Cottage Farm Hill about six miles east of Salem on Highway 22, state police said.

State Patrolman Malcolm Clark said the accident occurred in about the same location where a school bus overturned with 45 Salem children last month.

Injured were Wilbur J. Wyler, Jr., of 285 E. Browning Ave., and his son, Steven J. Wyler. The father was treated as an outpatient of Salem Memorial Hospital and his son sustained a laceration under his left eye which required six stitches.

Clarkson reported the 11 a.m. accident involved a truck Wyler was driving for the Willamette Grocery Co., 305 S. Cottage St., and an empty gasoline tanker operated by Frank V. Rose, Portland, who escaped injury.

Wyler, the officer stated, was cited on a charge of failure to drive to the right side of a highway. The truck he was driving was loaded with food and beverage for a picnic. Willamette Grocery was going to hold for its employees.

Impact of the collision, Clark son stated, scattered debris over the highway which required three hours to clean up.

About 100 gallons of diesel oil also spilled on the highway from the tanker and highway crews had to dump two loads of sand to bring the road back to normal.
