STAYTON, July 21.—Members of the early days in Stayton were gathered here this afternoon for the annual Stayton Old-Timers picnic. Some 20 attended.

Among those present was local resident John E. Stayton, daughter of Roger Stayton who founded the city. The most elderly person at the picnic was Edna Slinger, 86. Another Stayton who is the grand-nephew of Oregon Judge Val Slinger.

## Reds Seeking 'United Front'

NEW YORK, July 21.—The Communist party has announced its national committee has adopted a series of resolutions aimed at promoting communism in a "united front" drive.

Three resolutions stressed plans to "organize, educate and seek cooperation among Negroes, Puerto Ricans, Mexicans, Jews, Italians and other minority groups to organize an effective Communist front in the United States."

They called for a national cultural committee to work with non-Communist artists and a national farm commission to push Communist aims among poor farmers, especially members of minorities.

The resolution noted American Jews have been disturbed by the Kremlin's attitude toward Jewish educational and cultural activities, promising that Stalin errors in persecuting Jews and wiping out their cultural life will be corrected by the present regime.

The party announcement yesterday did not say when or where the committee met to adopt the resolution.

Mrs. Ruth Hungate appointed in the board by Mayor C. A. Hande Jr. a month ago was welcomed as the new board member.

Board members expressed hopes that the work on the enlargement might be done in time to accommodate the heavy autumn and winter patronage of the library.

HONG KONG, July 21.—The worst floods ever recorded along two rivers in Red China's south Shantung Province have drowned at least 557 persons and marooned thousands. Peiping radio reported tonight.
