Smart Dishes Whet Appetite in Scandia

If anyone has followed my stories about the trip to Scandinavia to the bitter end, they may be confused about a number of things and among them the difference between a smorgasbord, a smorgasbord and a Norwegian breakfast, whose name none of us knows.

The smorgasbord, which reaches its climax in Denmark, is quite unlike the smorgasbord, though the name has a resemblance. It is an open-faced sandwich made primarily for beauty, secondarily for flavor. The Danes may question this, but to please the eye and catch the imagination is, after all, more than half the battle. So beauty might be the first consideration.

The Danes go all out for arrangement, and no colorblind cook ever became a smorgasbord-concocter and no unimaginative one either. The Dane twists his meat and cheese and lemon. He neatly arranges a dozen shrimp atop a tiny circle of bread or paper mayonnaise here and there. Nothing ever lies down on a smorgasbord.

The Smorgasbord

When I used to think of Swedish cooking I thought of a smorgasbord, that beautifully arranged table staggering under a load of pickled herring, potato salad and Swedish meat balls.

Now when I think of the Swedish restaurant cuisine I recall a vast host for a smorgasbord and the vague report of Stockholm's one and only on the outskirts of the city, an hour's train ride or \$1.50 worth of taxi fare away. And besides, one has to make reservations and they only have 8 at noon.

I had a smorgasbord or two in miniature served on a large tray at my table, but it held none of the thrill of walking around the table and deciding what to take for the first or second or third time around.

I did have some lovely meals in Stockholm—one with a long-to-be-remembered slice of salmon served at a restaurant I chanced into because all the businessmen and girls seemed to be going in, and two small first turgid ones with fresh mushrooms served to soft piano music and the polite hum of Stockholm's most best family chaise, and all for \$2 including ice water.

Great Love

Then there's the Norwegian breakfast which you should get confused about because it's really an early morning smorgasbord without fanfare. My first Norwegian breakfast startled me after several Danish hard-roll cups-of-suffee breakfasts.

Even at the unglamorous old hotel the arrangement was staggering. Assorted cold and hot cereals are arranged at one end of the table, supported by pitchers of milk (which the Norwegians like to drink for breakfast) and sour cream. There may be a hot meat or fish and hot cereal and there are always several large pots of coffee. If no eggs are on the table, you no sooner sit than you're brought in a boiled one in an egg cup. You may have been disturbed about these three outstanding Scandinavian specialties, but you can't help falling in love with them.
