

# Cons Grab, Release Hostages In Utah Penitentiary Flareup

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah, Aug. 2 (AP)—A small group of prisoners took control of a recreation hall for one hour tonight at the Utah State Prison.

They held 14 women and 5 men hostage, but released all unharmed.

The women and two of the men were entertaining the inmates. It was a group from Price, Utah, known as the Rhythmettes.

Immediately before the recreation outbreak, one guard was accosted in the corridor, but freed himself with the help of another armed guard.

But the prison was tensed by the outbreak at the relatively modern penitentiary located some 20 miles south of Salt Lake City.

It was the scene of a 12-hour riot last February when the 300 or so prisoners held 27 hostages and control of the entire compound.

**Hostages Freed**

Those hostages were released unharmed upon the assurances of Gov. George D. Clyde that he would give consideration to their grievances.

The corridor flareup tonight occurred about 6:10 p.m. The recreation hall was taken over about 7:10. Deputy Warden John W. Turner said all prisoners were locked in their cells by 8:10 p.m.

After the corridor incident, Turner said the inmates seemed to have cooled down. They were sent to the recreation hall for a show. The prisoners grabbed hold of three prison officers and the 14 women and two men at the end of the show.

Another group headed for the recreation office and came out armed with baseball bats.

**Door Blocked Open**

The warden said the inmates tried to lock the main corridor to keep prison officers out but the officers succeeded in blocking the door open.

Turner said he and about 15 armed officers entered the corridor and sent the inmates back to their cells. They headed for the auditorium and the warden said: "To my surprise we only found about 13 inmates left there."

The armed guards ordered the inmates to open the door or they were cutting in. The door was opened and the hostages were released.

Turner said all of the prisoners were returned to their own cells, blocks and the cells were searched.

## Noted Singer Eartha Kitt Facing Suit

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (AP)—A night club today sued Eartha Kitt for \$200,000, claiming she poured champagne on patrons, shattered glassware and struck one of the owners when he tried to talk with her about a \$137 bill.

The suit was filed in Supreme Court by E. J. H. Bar and Grill, operator of the African Room at 780 Third Ave. It asks \$150,000 for the club and \$50,000 for Harold Kanter, one of the officers.

The complaint said the Negro singer and a party of guests entered the night club about 1 a.m. June 5, and ordered champagne and other drinks.

"Eartha Kitt," the complaint said, "became loud and boisterous, commenced to shatter champagne glasses, pour champagne and liquids on the table and became generally offensive to the patrons."

"Drinks Refused"

Papers in the suit said that about 1 a.m. Kanter instructed the waiter not to serve any more drinks to Miss Kitt or her party and "presented a reasonable and proper bill to the actress."

The complaint charged Miss Kitt then shouted "This is a clip joint, you are nothing but a bunch of thieves." It also charged that she poured champagne on patrons, "shattered glassware" near and about tables occupied by other patrons, disported herself upon the stage in a lewd and suggestive manner and made herself generally offensive to other patrons.

Miss Kitt, expressing "shock and amazement" at the suit, told an interviewer she thought the \$137 bill was preposterous.

"I had just done a show on 'Masquerade Party,'" she said. "I had been to the African Room before and encouraged others to patronize the place."

"After our party was seated we ordered four or five splits of champagne. I never drink, so I had nothing."

"To me the \$137 bill was preposterous. I asked for the bill so I could have it sent to my office. They would not give it to me. That's all there was to the whole story."

## Keizer Home Guttled by Fire

KEIZER, Aug. 2 (AP)—Fire of undetermined origin tonight gutted a five-room home owned by Erwin Raal, 1306 Lawless St. and caused about \$6,500 damage to the house and furnishings, Keizer (AP) said. The loss was covered by insurance.

Raal and his family were visiting friends when the fire started around 6:45 p.m. It was discovered by a neighbor, Alfred Williams, who called firemen.

Firemen said just the shell of the house was standing after the fire.

Raal, his mother who was living with him, his wife and the couple's child, Larry Earl, 2, were lodged with neighbors for the night.

## Vivien Leigh to Vacation With 1st Mate, Daughter

LONDON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Actress Vivien Leigh said today she will join her first husband and their 13-year-old daughter Suzanne next week for a three-week vacation in Europe.

Leaving Sir Laurence Olivier behind in England, Leigh married Vivien in 1940 after he was named co-respondent in a divorce suit by the first husband, Leigh Holman. Olivier said it will be their first vacation apart since their marriage. He will join her in Yugoslavia at the end of the month.

Olivier will spend his vacation with his 21-year-old son Tarquin, born to his first wife, actress Julia Emond.

Leigh Holman and I are good friends," Olivier explained. "He often comes over to visit us in the country."

Miss Leigh said there was nothing particularly startling about the separate vacation plan.

"It's something we've never done before and we thought it would be an idea to try something new."

Olivier's mother-in-law, Mrs. Gertrude Hartley, also had an angle. She told reporters the Oliviers spent their vacation on the Continent last year "but Larry didn't have much fun."

"Vivien is fluent in Italian, French and German. He doesn't speak any of them."

"Larry likes a quiet time. Vivien's idea of a rest cure is a change of scene and a bit of excitement."

## Electrical 'Ghost' Forces Family to Evacuate Home

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 2 (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Wilkinson and their 13-year-old daughter packed their belongings today and moved out of the house they claim is "haunted" by an electrical phenomenon.

"I'm about to crack up," Mrs. Wilkinson said. "I wish someone would come forward and tell us what's causing all this."

The family thought its troubles had ended yesterday when Wilkinson, an oil company employee, dug up water pipes around the house and removed a new metal fence he believed responsible for creating a magnetic field.

The family slept in the car last night after tables and chairs went on a weird dance and overturned and a sweeper went on an aimless course through the house.

The mystery has damaged their \$1,300 electric organ, caused the refrigerator motor to break down twice and knocked the clock from its shelf six times.

Wilkinson said he had lived on the property for 23 years without prior incident—until this month.

"We don't know if this is a magnetic field, uranium, an old gas pocket under the ground, or what," said Wilkinson, "but it has us completely unnerved and so upset we can't live a normal life here. We're moving."
