

Minnesota City Battles Mysterious Outbreak of Pneumonia; 70 Afflicted

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 5 (AP)—State and federal health officials today reported a mysterious outbreak of pneumonia in Minneapolis, Minn., of 70 cases of pneumonia that has brought two deaths.

Physicians said the disease is unusual in that it fails to respond to penicillin, as do most types of pneumonia. An incidence of 33 cases was reported between July 24 and 30 with only six deaths.

The Minnesota Health Department said at a press conference that blood and other checks have turned up no fungus, bacteria or virus as a possible cause. The disease is noncontagious and food and water supplies have been absorbed as sources.

The disease has struck mainly at men over 40. The attacks start with chills and fever and bring temperatures of from 101 to 106. In some respects, spokesmen said it resembles Q-fever, an animal borne virus pneumonia and tests along that line are now being made at Austin.

Dr. Herbert Kleinman of the State Health Department said that any relationship between the outbreak and Asiatic flu had been ruled out.

Austin, a city of about 25,000 is near the Iowa border in south eastern Minnesota.

NYC Police Act to Combat Youth Crime

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—The city moved today to combat a rash of juvenile killings and other crime and assigned all of its 400 patrolmen to night duty on the streets.

The rookies or probationary policemen are students at the Police Academy, but starting tomorrow night will work indefinitely with regular patrolmen in areas where juvenile delinquency has been at its worst.

Announcement of the new effort was made by William R. Peer, executive secretary to Mayor Robert Wagner, after an emergency meeting of top police officials with members of the State Youth Commission and the City Youth Board.

There have been three killings and a series of beatings and a boy in a serious condition in the past 10 days.

The rash of violence led Gov. Averell Harriman to send the youth commission here.

Vanport Arms Depot Not Due Prior to 1960

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The Air Force says it has no plans to construct facilities for ammunition storage at Vanport, Ore., a suburb of Portland prior to 1960.

The Air Force said it is studying the area with a view to other alternate sites for such storage. It will be happy to discuss the matter further.

The issue arose when Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., introduced a bill to authorize the construction of a new arms depot at Vanport.

In addition, the Air Force said, it is asking for funds for ammunition storage facilities at the international airport, but this will merely be used to better store the same type of ammunition now being stored there in inadequate facilities.

Mrs. Green said the governor of Oregon as well as the mayor of Portland and other officials are opposed to the proposed Vanport storage site.

Cycle Racer Hospitalized After Crash

Joseph Finley, 3875 Roger Lane, who received a leg fracture in a five-mile motorcycle race pique Sunday at Rose Fairgrounds, was reported in good condition Monday by attendants at St. Luke's Hospital in Rose.

The 34-year-old Salem motor cycle racer is expected to be released from the hospital in about 10 days according to his mother, Mrs. Gayle Finley.

This is Finley's first accident in over two years of racing, she said.

Eugene Thesen, Eugene, who won the Idaho State Tourist Trophy championship in Sunday's race, also was treated for injuries after the pique. Associated Press said three Rose racers, John Lopez, Bud Yorton and Russ Chaney, also sustained injuries.

Solon Introduces Bill to Protect Foster's Songs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Rep. Chell (D-Ky.) introduced a bill today designed to bring Stephen Foster's songs back to radio and television as they were written.

Chell and some other Southern legislators have been up in arms over what they call radio-TV censorship of Foster's songs. They say other words have been substituted for "darkies" and "mammy" in such songs as "My Old Kentucky Home" and "Swanee River."

The measure submitted by Chell would make it a crime for any song to be censored or banned on the radio-TV networks.

Noncompliance would be punishable by as much as five years in jail and a \$25,000 fine for a third offense.

Child Scalded as Deaf Mute Fails To Hear Screams

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. Aug. 5 (AP)—Allen Tomlinson, 4, who suffered severe burns from scalding bath water when a deaf mute brother could not hear his screams, today was recovering satisfactorily.

The older brother, Ray, 10, wrote out this explanation for police. He put his little brother in the tub yesterday, thought he turned on the cold water and left the bathroom.

Not until a neighbor, Mrs. Margaret Cunningham, heard the child scream, ran over and got Allen out of the tub did Ray realize he had turned on the hot water.

The child's mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Tomlinson, 37, was working at the time.

ROSEBURG, Aug. 5 (AP)—Gasoline prices tumbled again today at most service stations in the Roseburg area.

The new posted price was 30.9 cents a gallon, or six cents under the normal price. The latest reduction was three cents a gallon. A similar reduction occurred three weeks ago after a period of relative quiet. The price cutting started in May.

Portland Labor Boss Dissatisfied With Morgan

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 5 (AP)—Bill Way, president of the Portland Central Labor Council, said tonight he had told Gov. Robert Holmes he is not satisfied with Howard Morgan, appointed by Holmes as public utilities commissioner.

Way said he told Holmes in a private meeting arranged for labor leaders with the governor today that he believed Morgan did labor a "diservice" when Morgan appeared before the Senate labor relations committee last spring in Washington, D. C.

Way quoted Holmes as saying Morgan, a former state Democratic chairman, "is doing a fine job as utilities commissioner." Holmes told Way that Morgan was acting only as a private citizen when he went before the committee.

Will Franklin Succumbs at Salem Home

Will C. Franklin, 690 Tulip Place, died Monday evening apparently of a heart attack while smoking out a pipe at his home north of West Salem. He was 78.

Franklin was best known in this area for an 18-acre commercial tulip farm he operated at his Tulip Place home for many years prior to its subdivision in 1945. Since then he had been active in Salem Nutgrowers Association in devising a system of walnut inspection and grading. He also was a former member of Rotary and Salem Commercial Club.

He had been apparently in good health except for a heart condition for which he had received treatment, relatives said.

He was born March 17, 1879, in New York. He moved to Salem in 1914 from California. Today would have been the 58th wedding anniversary for him and his wife, Mrs. Emily Franklin.

Besides his widow he leaves one son, L. W. Franklin, Salem; one sister, Mrs. Esther Dearborn, Oakland, three grandsons, Hugh Franklin, Los Angeles, and Robert and Bruce Franklin both of Salem. Two great-granddaughters. Arrangements are pending at W. T. Rigdon's Mortuary.

Mrs. America Of '49 Missing

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 5 (AP)—Mrs. Frances Cloyd, 39, Mrs. America of 1949, was reported missing today. Her mother expressed fear the woman took her own life, police said.

Mrs. Jonathan Becker said Mrs. Cloyd, divorced wife of Arthur Thomas Cloyd Jr., 33, had been worried over inability to support her five children. Mrs. Becker said she had received telegrams from her daughter stating "Sorry to cause so much trouble" and "Life was not worth it."

Mrs. Becker said she talked to her daughter at 1 p.m. and that Mrs. Cloyd had seemed depressed.

158 Scale Matterhorn

ZERMATT, Switzerland, Aug. 5 (AP)—A total of 158 persons, believed to be a one-day record, climbed the Matterhorn Saturday. Forty-five guides did it for pay. The rest did it for fun. All got up and all reached the peak safely.

Police, Firemen Social Security Measure Fails

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—A bill to permit firemen and policemen to come under federal Social Security coverage failed of House passage today after opposition was reported from many state and local firemen's and policemen's associations.

The bill would have authorized the states to give firemen and police men, already under state or local retirement systems, the option of coming under federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance coverage if a referendum showed a majority wanted it.

Testimony in Confidential, Trial to Start

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5 (AP)—Prospective jurors in the confidential magazine libel trial occupied the spotlight again today keeping the star performers in the wings.

The rate of dismissal of jury candidates slowed considerably from the opening day pace, how ever speeding hope that a panel can be agreed upon and testimony begin sometime tomorrow.

Defense Atty. Arthur J. Cawley asked prospective jurors whether they had read Confidential. Of the first 25 examined only four said they had. All were women and all said they had read it at the beauty parlor.

The prosecution stressed in its questions the legal aspects of the case, which involves a charge of criminal conspiracy to commit libel and publish obscene material.

The prosecution case is being pressed jointly by the offices of the district attorney and the state attorney general. It is based on articles printed in Confidential about Maureen O'Hara, Dick Powell, Robert Mitchum, Dorothy Dandridge, Corinne (Calver), Mae West, John Carroll, and Mark Stevens.

The defense claims it has between 100 and 200 Hollywood figures under subpoena.

Truck Driver Found Dead Under Vehicle

VALE, Ore., Aug. 5 (AP)—Pablo Arispe, 38, of Eagle Pass, Texas, was found dead today underneath a truck along U. S. Highway 26 about eight miles north of Vale.

Coroner George C. Beecher said the truck apparently went out of control, swung off the highway to the left, then crossed to the right side and rolled into the borrow pit. Arispe was thrown from the truck, Beecher said, and was crushed beneath the rear wheel of the two-ton vehicle.

Beecher said Arispe was employed on the Simplot Farms near Jamison. His body was found by his brother-in-law and a friend who set out to look for him when he failed to return to the farm during the night.

Officers said Arispe apparently had been dead several hours when his body was found.

Sign Broken Again

A noon sign at Shattuck's Chateau, 3805 Silverton Rd., was broken Monday evening for the second time recently, city police said. Owner Carl J. Kuhn said he believed the sign was damaged by thrown rocks.

Agatha Christie is at her best in the mystery play, "The Mousetrap," selected by the Pentacle Players as the third of their summer series and presented last night. The cast of Pat Howard and George Nelson as inn keepers, Wayne Haverson, Laurence Marland, Bill Galloway, Barbara Ruhl, Esther Battle as guests and Dave Filler as Trotter of the police carried the suspense to the last.

A typical Christie tale of murder and anticipated homicide, "The Mousetrap" takes place in a new, open-plan guest house in rural England. The murderer is suspected to be among those who were in the room for the weekend at the Manor. Of course there is a surprise ending and the play is doubly suspenseful because the audience is so close to the action one has the feeling of being in the room.

The arena-type production lends itself especially well to mysteries because of its intimacy with the players not possible in orthodox productions.

Dr. John S. Griffith has done a wonderful job with his set design and lighting, suggesting an English manor house, lighted fireplaces, entrances and exits.

It is difficult to single out any one actor for special mention, for the entire cast was excellent and the action well balanced, but if any were outstanding they were Wayne Haverson as the eccentric Christopher Wren, a guest in the house and Esther Battle as the mysterious Madam Paraviscini.

Richard Geer remembered in many parts in past Pentacle productions was director of the excellent play.

Jordan, Syria Cease Feud

AMMAN, Jordan, Aug. 5.—Jordan and Syria, feuding Arab neighbors, seemed to have buried the hatchet today after a weekend of military threats.

A statement issued after a meeting between Foreign Minister Samir Rifa'i and Syrian Charge d'Affaires Ahmed Rabbhi said the two countries shook hands in the hope that a new page will be opened in brotherly relations for the good of Arabs.

Pro-Syrian Syria announced Saturday it had received a threat of military attack from Jordan if the Syrian press did not stop a campaign against King Hussein and his Hashemite kingdom.

The statement issued today said tensions arising from the press attacks had been removed.
