

Preserves and Pickles bolster Winter Supply

Another SOS, this time for recipes for using cantaloupe and other melons. Good way to use up melons that aren't ripe as it should be in preserves, pickles or preserves because the melon should be slightly underripe for cooking.

Watermelon pickles, too, are excellent for use in winter and make a colorful addition to the supply of canned goods. Because only the white edge of the watermelon is used, it doesn't waste the good part.

Cantaloupe Preserves

3 pounds cantaloupe 3 1/2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Cut firm ripe cantaloupe into 1-inch slices crosswise. Remove rind and seeds. Cut slices into even pieces and weigh. Mix melon and sugar and let stand 12 to 18 hours in a cool place. Add lemon juice and boil until cantaloupe is clear. Pour boiling hot into hot jars and seal at once.

You can spice them up a little too, if you want. Add about 1 teaspoon each allspice and cloves. Watermelon pickle goes this way.

Watermelon Pickles

4 pounds watermelon rind 2 tablespoons whole allspice
2 quarts cold water 2 tablespoons whole cloves
1 tablespoon lime (calcium 10 two-inch sticks cinnamon
oxide from drug store) 1 quart vinegar
4 pounds sugar

Select thick rind from a firm watermelon. Trim off green and pink. Weigh the remaining white portion and cut into one-inch cubes. Soak for an hour in the mixture of lime and water. Drain cover with fresh water and cook for 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Add more water as needed, drain.

The spices loosely in a bag or piece of cheese cloth. Bring to a boil with the vinegar, 1 quart more water and the sugar. Add melon rind and boil gently for two hours. Remove spice bag, pack in hot jars that have been boiled 15 to 20 minutes. Fill to top of jar with the hot syrup, put on lids and seal tightly. Makes about six pints.

Cantaloupes can be frozen very nicely for winter use. Select ripe cantaloupes of good flavor (they'll improve with freezing, so be sure you put down extra good ones). Easily done too, you just cut them into convenient sized pieces and put them into polyethylene bags and freeze. Use them right after taking from the freezer as the texture breaks down quickly.

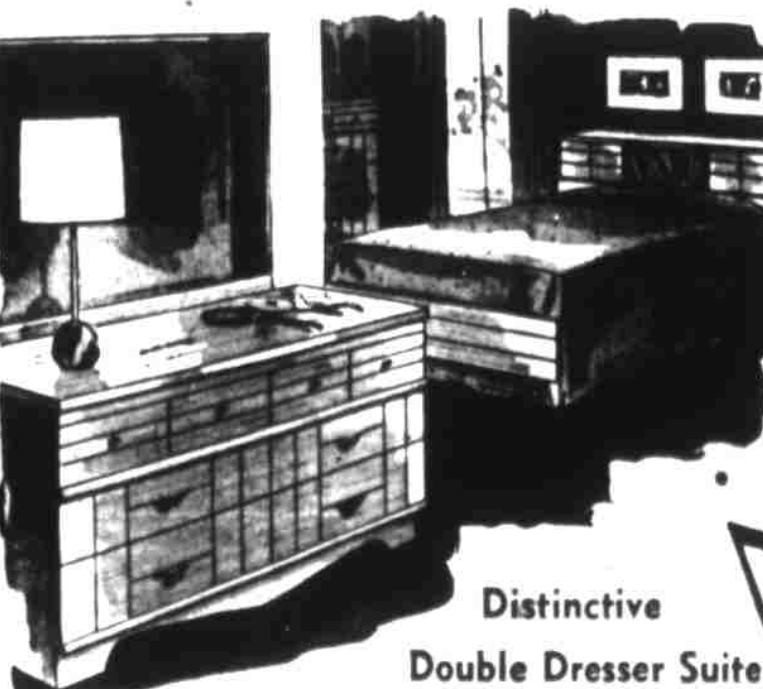

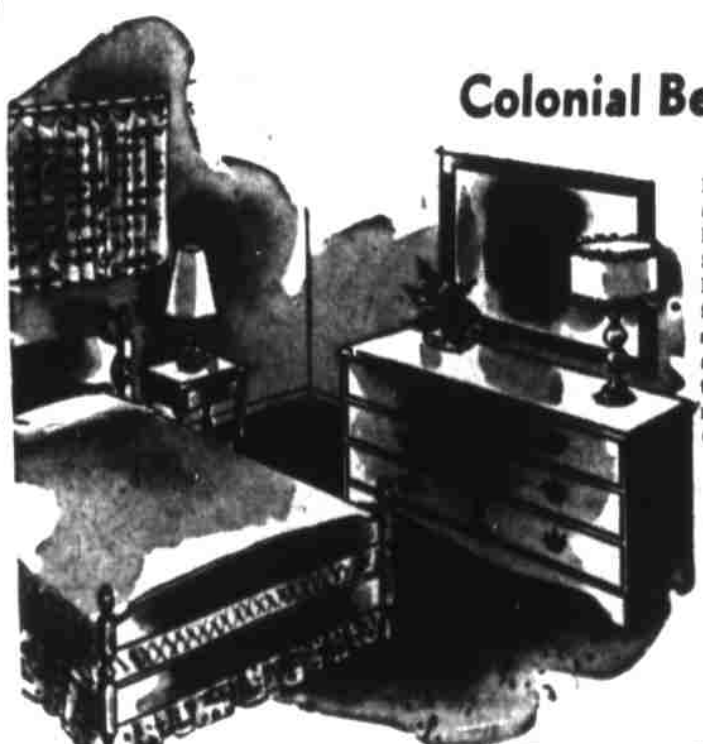

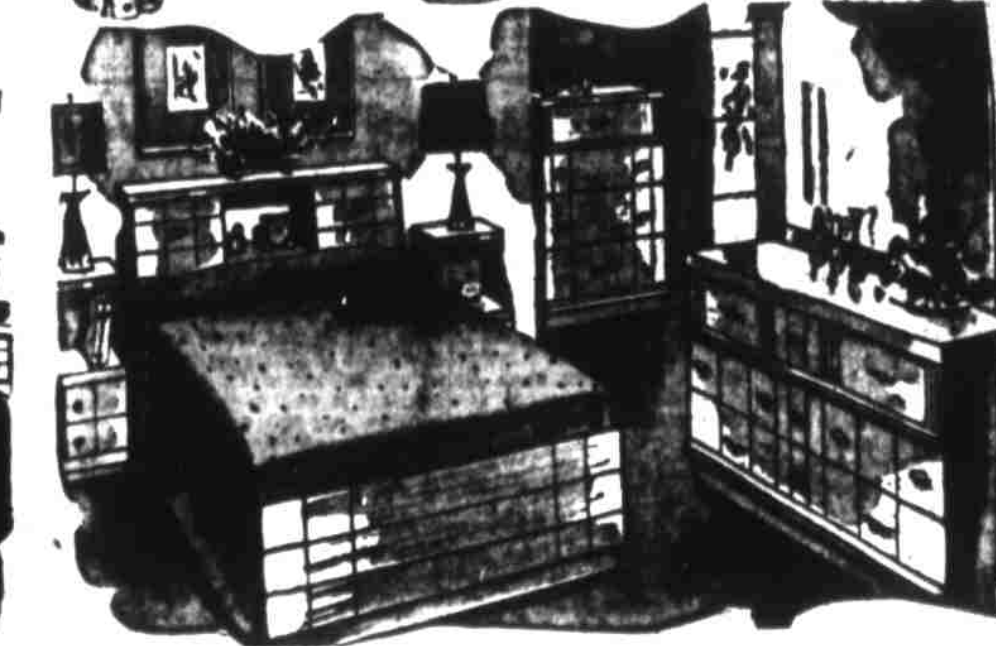
