

School Boundary Changes To Mean District Economy

Fifteen changes in boundaries between Salem District schools approved Thursday by the School Board were proposed to ease crowded classrooms, eliminate and shorten bus runs and keep the number of teachers at a minimum, the board was told.

The changes were drawn up and presented by Arthur V. Myers, assistant district superintendent, who told the meeting in the Administration Bldg. that maps of each district will be placed in the schools affected.

He said one bus run would be eliminated and others shortened and that the salary of one teacher would be saved by the changes.

Another effect produced will be to define hazy boundaries and either authorize or change informal arrangements that had been made in the past along some of the boundary lines.

No official estimate of the total number of pupils to be affected was available but estimates placed it near 200.

Changes in the Keizer-Cummings area will do away with the necessity of moving a 30-pupil sixth grade from Cummings to Keizer School as previously planned, Myers said.

Many old boundaries placed along lot lines were moved to the nearest street to eliminate confusion that arose frequently especially in corner lot houses, as to which school the children were to attend, Myers said.

Besides creating a new district separating Cummings from Keizer School and transferring a large portion of the former Keizer-Cummings district to Highland School, the board approved changes in the following boundaries:

Garfield-Grant — Boundary moved to the middle of E Street from a line which formerly ran between D and E streets.

McKinley-Rush — Boundary moved to Hoyt Street from a former line between Hoyt and Electric streets from Raynor Street east to Southern Pacific railroad tracks.

Rush-Richmond — Area of new development south of the east end of Oxford Street transferred to Richmond School. New boundary to extend south from Mission Street along 19th Street east on McGilchrist Street to present line at 24th Street. Area south of McGilchrist Street remains in Bush district because distance would require bus service to either school.

Morningside-McKinley — New line to follow Fairview Avenue from 12th to Winter Street, then south to Vista Avenue and west to Commercial Street. East side of Winter Street and south side of Vista Avenue transferred to Morningside.

Pringle-Morningside — Line extending east from Highway 90E moved south to Hilliker Avenue, on which it will extend east for one-fourth mile and then north on a line with 12th Street to Pringle Creek, then east to Pringle Road. Pupils in the area south of Dickinson Corner who have been riding buses to Pringle or Liberty school will be required to walk to Morningside School.

Liberty-Salem Heights — Boundary moved to Browning Avenue and Gardner Road from former lines south of Browning Avenue and west of Gardner Road. Fifteen pupils will be transferred from Salem Heights to Liberty School, Myers said.

West Salem-Mountain View — Peninsula of West Salem district following the city line north of Taybia Road will be transferred to Mountain View School with moving of the line to Taybia Road.

Senate Okehs Benson Aide Appointment

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP) — Overriding Democratic protests, the Senate tonight confirmed President Eisenhower's nomination of Don Paarlberg as assistant secretary of agriculture.

It acted by a roll-call vote of 42-32.

Opponents based their protest on the charge that the Indianan's goal, as "the brains" behind Secretary of Agriculture Benson, is the elimination of the small farm as an uneconomic unit.

A former Purdue University economist, he has been an assistant to Benson since the Eisenhower administration came into power. Democrats called him "the architect of the economic policies of the department."

A leading Republican advocate of mandatory high price supports — Sen. Young of North Dakota — said he was opposed to Paarlberg, as he was to Benson, because "he doesn't believe in price supports." Young said policies Paarlberg believes in could bankrupt this nation.

But a Democrat — Sen. Holland of Florida, who supports flexible price supports — championed Paarlberg as a gentleman of high honor who is well qualified in the field of agricultural economics.

Court Delays Decision on Beer License

The Marion County Court took under advisement an application from a Brooks couple for package beer license after only one person appeared at a public hearing Thursday to protest granting the license.

The Rev. Lyman I. Meyer objected to granting the license on grounds that sale of beer would be detrimental to the community. The court earlier had received a protest resolution from members of the LaSalle Center Community Church.

License application had been made by August V. and Betty I. Harris, Rt. 1, Brooks, who requested the license for their store in that area.

In other business, the court approved adding Morningside street in South Salem to the county road system. The county will take over maintenance of the street, which has been improved with a 30-foot concrete pavement, concrete curbs and storm sewers a year from now.

Film Stars to Testify At Confidential Trial

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15 (AP) — Movie stars will make personal appearances on the witness stand in the criminal trial of Confidential and Whisper magazines, it was assured today.

They will be summoned by the defense to say whether stories about them in the scandal magazines are true.

Subpoenaed celebrities include Rory Calhoun, Tab Hunter, Gary Cooper, Walter Pidgeon, Lana Turner, Sonny Tufts, Tom Neal, Buddy Baer, Allen Nixon, Tita Pardo, Paul Gregory, Dean Martin, Corinne Calvet, John Carroll, and Charlie Barnett.

The way was cleared for the defense to carry out its plan to call celebrities when Superior Court Judge Herbert V. Walker declined to make an immediate ruling on the admissibility of their testimony.

The prosecution had argued that testimony of the stars about the stories would be immaterial. Judge Walker said he would rule on the admissibility when the witnesses take the stand.

Just who will be called remained defense attorney Arthur J. Crowley's secret. He said, "I will call some movie stars. I am also going to call some newspaper people."

City Pool Repairs Estimated

A rundown on repairs necessary for Salem's two public swimming pools was given Thursday by a contractor who said that new pools and bath-houses could be built for a total of \$160,000.

The contractor, John Medford of Cascade Pools, who built the new pool at Salem YMCA, indicated that the repairs he outlined would be substantially less than the estimate he gave for complete new facilities.

Extensive Renovation
His list included a new bath house at Olinger pool and extensive renovation of both pools and the bath house at Leslie. He would put new piping inside the present pools and cover it with new surfaces, reducing each dimension of the pools about 1 1/2 foot.

His recommendations included underwater lights and new flood lighting at each pool.

New pools would cost \$55,000 to \$60,000 each and new bath houses about \$20,000 each, he said. He declined to estimate cost of his plan for remodeling because he plans to bid on the job, he said.

Medford said he did not advise new pools. The structures are sound and the equipment is adequate, he said. Both pools could be renovated in a 90-day period during their off season, he said, but cautioned that drawing of engineering plans would take "two or three months."

MacArthur's Federal Pay Cited by Sen. Neuberger

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP) — A list of federal benefits received by Gen. Douglas MacArthur was given to the Senate today by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.).

It was the senator's answer to a speech made by MacArthur June 30 criticizing federal spending policies.

Neuberger said MacArthur's speech was "against the government policies followed by this administration under the leadership of Gen. MacArthur's former subordinate in the Army, Dwight D. Eisenhower."

Neuberger told the Senate he had been given this list of "governmental prerequisites, pay, benefits, emoluments and other allowances received by MacArthur, now chairman of the Board of Sperry-Rand Corp."

Gen. MacArthur holds the grade of General of the Army and is entitled by law to receive pay and allowances in the amount of \$15,540.36 per year. His monthly pay is broken down as follows: \$1,076.40 is basic pay, \$171 is quarters allowance, and \$47.88 is subsistence allowance making a total of \$1,295.28. In addition, the general is entitled by law to receive a personal money allowance of \$5,000 per annum.
