

# Hungary Executes 2 Rebels

 BUDAPEST, Aug. 15.—Communist Hungary executed two more alleged rebels today and sentenced a village priest to death in a sweeping new campaign to stamp out opposition to the Red regime.

Hungary's papers were filled with stories of mass arrests and trials of counter-revolutionaries in all parts of the country. In most cases the accusations led back to the uprising crushed last fall by Soviet tanks. Power still is known here that many more trials are taking place than are reported officially.

The doomed priest, Kamen Istvan Mindasz, 68, was sentenced to death on a charge of hiding arms and for serving on a committee during the revolt at the village of Per on the main road to Vienna about 40 miles northwest here.

The Gyozet newspaper, Kozal field reported that his housekeeper, Anna Sparnitz, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment on a charge of helping him conceal weapons.

The priest is not related to Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty, whom the Hungarian Communist regime considers to be under sentence of life imprisonment. The cardinal has been a refugee in the Budapest legation of the United States since Russian tanks rolled into his capital last Nov. 4.

The executed pair were Zoltan Szos, 22, and Jozsef Endres, 30, sentenced to death previously on a charge of killing a Hungarian Communist police officer.

They escaped from prison last 17, but were captured after the day's freedom.

# U.S. Reply to Close Norman Suicide Case

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The United States today made public a carefully vague reply to Canada's demand for assurances that the sensational Norman case would never happen again.

But for a still seeming ambiguity, the note apparently closed an incident which strained the traditionally warm ties of the two countries.

The Canadian demand was made last April 10. That was six days after Herbert Norman, Canadian ambassador to Egypt, killed himself by jumping from an apartment house in Cairo.

The Canadian note laid down an ultimatum in bristling language: 1. Canada would quit giving security information about its citizens to U.S. agencies unless 2. Canada got assurances that, without its express consent, such data would be withheld from congressional committees or any other groups over which the U.S. executive branch had no control.

At the time of Norman's suicide, Canada's Foreign Secretary, Lester B. Pearson, attributed it to nervous collapse due to overwork and the feeling of renewed persecution.

Earlier, on March 18, Canada had denounced as irresponsible a report aired by the Senate Internal Security subcommittee that Norman had been a Communist. The Canadians complained this was the resurrection of old charges and said it had had faith in Norman.

The latest note in the exchange was handed to Canadian Ambassador Norman Robertson last Tuesday by Dep. Undersecretary of State Robert Murphy.

Murphy, a veteran career diplomat, sidestepped the Canadian demand for assurances. He wrote in effect that there was nothing wrong with the protective system set up between the two governments. He seemed to imply that there simply was no way of guarding against leaks in any system, no matter how good.

The procedures which have been followed are consistent with the assurances you seek, Murphy wrote.

# Wilson Talks Of Further Military Cuts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Secretary of Defense Wilson said today the Pentagon is working on plans that might reduce the military forces to 2 1/2 million men by July 1960. That is about 300,000 below the current level.

Wilson called the 2 1/2 million level his minimum planning figure and emphasized that no decision has been reached as yet.

The retiring defense secretary recently ordered the military services to trim 100,000 men from their current 2,800,000 total by the end of this calendar year.

At a Pentagon news conference, Wilson said the outlook is for lower manpower levels every year for several years and that 2 1/2 million will be possible.

Wilson, who is to be succeeded by Neil H. McElroy, president of Procter & Gamble, said he expects to remain on the job through September and perhaps into early October.

He said the economy campaign which has brought orders to cut back manpower and some air craft and weapons production is fairly well mapped out.

He described the cutting processes as one in which "I don't take much satisfaction, particularly when it means laying off people."
