

Planners Oppose Business Zone Near Highland School

Proposed establishment of a new business zone on Broadway near Highland School and Highland Park was opposed Tuesday night by Salem Planning Commission.

Its unfavorable recommendation now goes to the City Council which will make final decision whether to change a residential lot at the northwest corner of Broadway and Columbia Streets to a C-1 neighborhood business zone classification.

Petitioners Abe Steinbock and Robert Schwartz were represented by Atty. Robert DeArmond who maintained the northern sections of Broadway are ready for commercial development now as there are signs of stagnating as a residential center there. The proposed use of the property would be for a service building like a medical clinic.

'Garden' Overflowing for Billy Graham's Last Week

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—A crowd estimated at 21,000 persons overflowed Madison Square Garden tonight as Billy Graham began the last week of his New York crusade—longest of any in his evangelistic career.

Graham spoke briefly before the regular service to about 2,500 persons outside who had been turned away from the Garden. Guards managed to pack 19,200 persons inside the building by seating some of them on steps in the balcony aisles.

Tonight's talk on spiritual rebirth will be followed by only four more in the Garden. After Saturday's closing services in the big arena, Graham will bring his crusade to a close the following night with a rally in Times Square.

The crusade, which began May 15, will have lasted more than 15 weeks long when it ends Sunday night. That is some three weeks longer than Graham's 1953 London visit.

Real Estate Firm Formed By Salem Men

Formation of a new real estate firm with offices at 218 N. Church St. was announced Tuesday by James F. Short and Edwin Schreder, partners in the venture.

Short, for two years director of the State Agriculture Department and now chairman of the State Republican Central Committee, has been active as a real estate broker in livestock ranches since he resigned his state post in April.

Schreder, a former groceryman has been in the Salem real estate business for the past five years. Until recently he was manager of the real estate department of the Oregon Development Co. Inc.

The latter organization chartered in 1954, has discontinued its real estate division to concentrate on the auto title insurance business. It will maintain offices in the Pioneer Trust Company building having moved from its location on N. Church Street.

The new firm will take over the real estate department dropped by the Oregon Development Co. Inc., Schreder said.

Schreder will, however, remain a stockholder in the Oregon Development Co. Inc., he added.

Now curate at Christ Episcopal Church in Oswego, Father Shideler is married and has two small children. A graduate of divinity school in Berkeley, Calif. he served for a time in Brookings, Ore. before being transferred to Oswego.

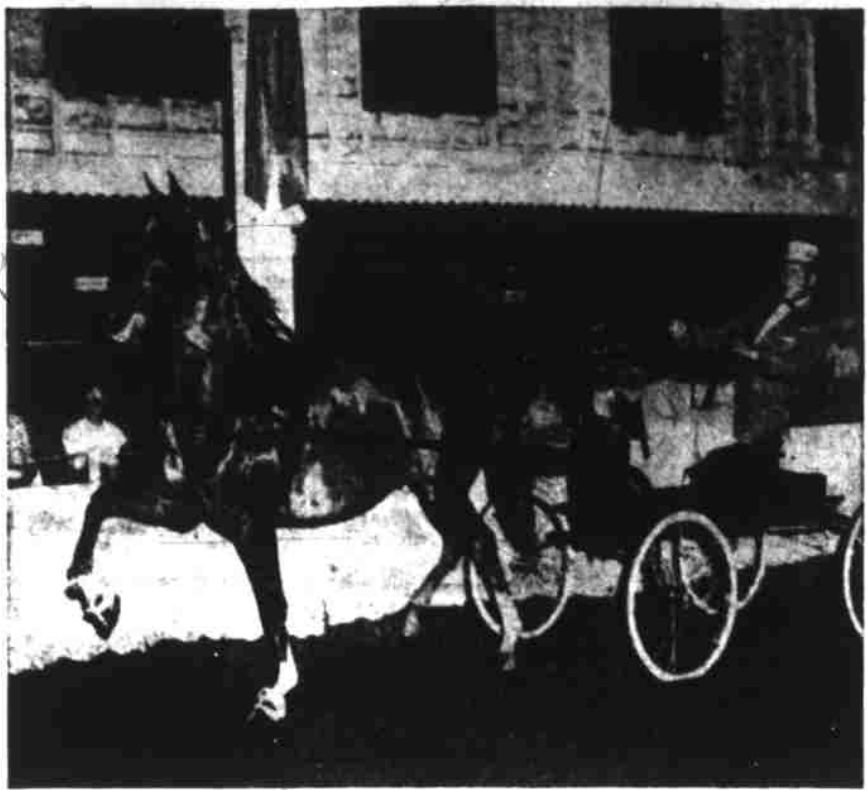

Oregon Water Resources Board Asks Delay on Snake River Dams

PORTLAND, Aug. 27 (AP)—The Oregon Water Resources Board today asked the Federal Power Commission to withhold for seven months issuance of permits for two proposed Snake River dams.

The board said it made the request shortly after approving \$50,000 for a seven-month survey of the middle fork of the Snake.

The survey was requested by Gov. Robert Holmes, who said in a letter to the board that the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams would have limited storage and a "single-purpose nature."

PORTLAND, Aug. 27 (AP)—Dist. Atty. Leo Smith today sided with the board of county commissioners that has refused to pay for two items resulting from the trial of Mayor Terry Schunk.

Smith said that the commissioners do not have to pay the bills until the state attorney general or his representative proves the need for the expenditures.

The items are \$128 for a helicopter survey in this city's north side and \$98 for photographs of a former after hours club.

Smith said the attorney general's office had requested payment, contending the costs are necessary to gain evidence for the trial.

Schunk was tried on a charge of perjury. He was acquitted.

Oregon 2,000 Teachers Short

School districts throughout the state face a teacher shortage of approximately 2,000, state superintendent of public instruction Rex Putnam said Tuesday.

Putnam said emergency certificates are being issued to teachers who have not yet fully qualified. Putnam said, however, that many of the teachers receiving the certificates are playing a satisfactory role in the teaching staff.

Over the past few years, Putnam said, the teacher shortage figure has varied a little. He said that while the state institutions were turning out more teachers than in the past, the increase in pupil attendance and luring of teachers to other states with higher salaries has kept the teacher shortage about the same from year to year.

"If we did not receive many applications from out of the state we would face a most serious problem," Putnam averred.

Youth Kills Sweetheart, Self, Asks Joint Burial

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Aug. 27 (AP)—A love-stricken youth shot his 18-year-old ex-sweetheart to death in her business office today, killed himself and left a note asking that they be buried together.

"She is my life," wrote Robert Edward Engelhardt, 21, shortly before he fired four shots into the head of pretty Betty Lou Beck.

Engelhardt was talking on a telephone when police said Engelhardt, of New Milford, left two notes indicating that he had planned to kill the girl and himself.

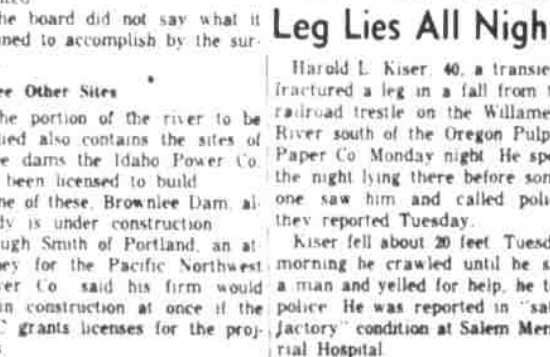
