

Police Outline Traffic Plan for State Fair

A major new entrance to the State Fairgrounds on Silverton Road, near Beach Street, will serve fairgoers this year, but otherwise the traffic plan is similar to that of previous years.

Thousands of cars from all over the state will be coming to the fairgrounds during the coming week.

The former Silverton Road entrance will be closed this year to serve as a one-way street for cars coming to the fairgrounds from the south.

The new entrance will be on Silverton Road, near Beach Street, and will be a one-way street for cars coming to the fairgrounds from the south.

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South bound traffic from Lancaster Avenue will be routed to fairgrounds via Beach Street gate on Silverton Road.

During peak periods Silverton Road will be utilized for west bound traffic only.

Limited parking facilities available on northwest portion of fairgrounds as some of this area has been converted to parking and parking lot.

1. Silverton 18th Street will be one-way north bound from Market Street to entrance of fairgrounds.

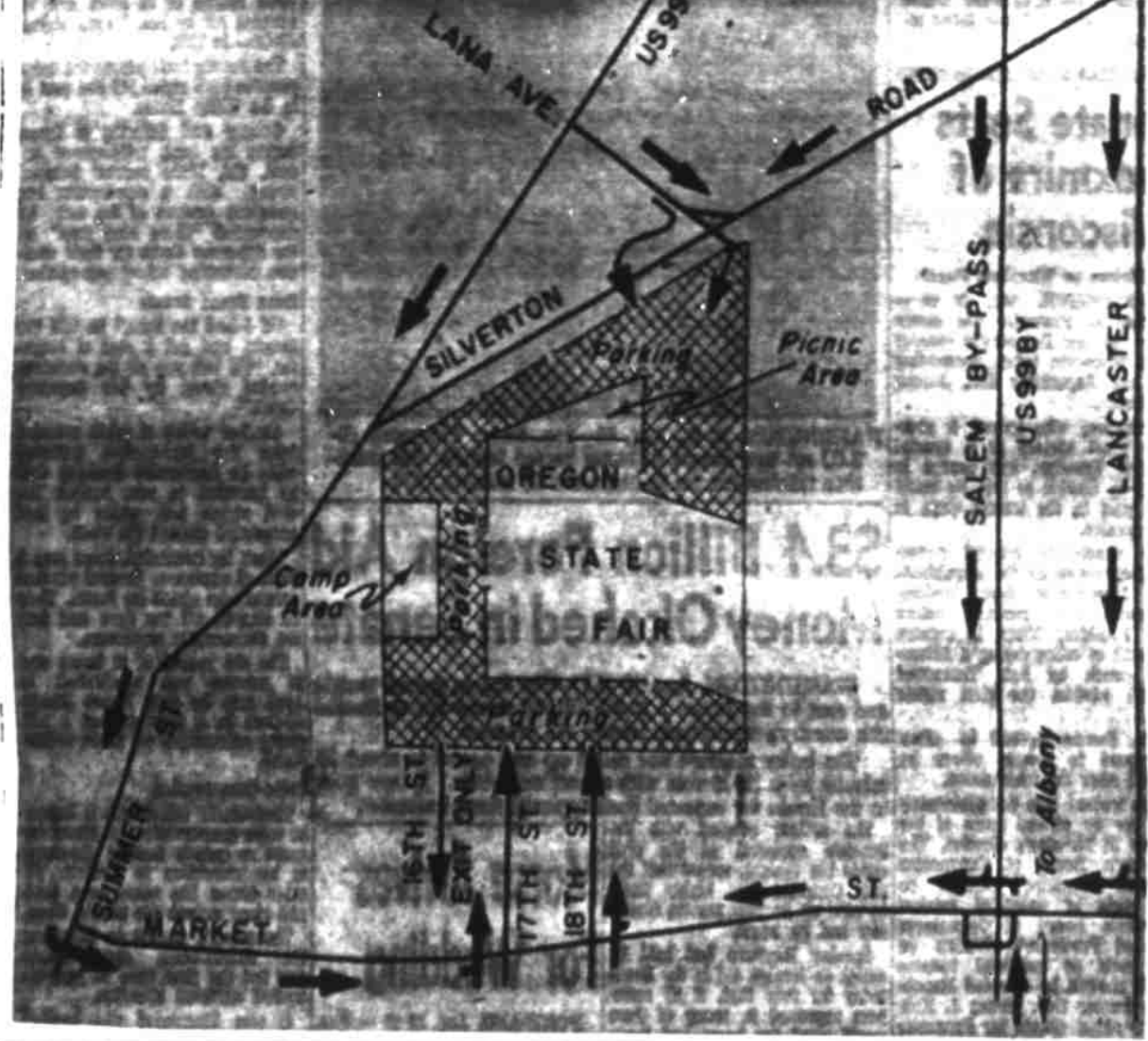
2. The Street will be one-way north bound from Market Street to entrance of fairgrounds.

3. No left turn will be permitted at 17th and 18th Streets and Madison.

4. 18th Street will be one-way south bound from entrance to fairgrounds in Madison Street.

5. No parking will be permitted on 18th Street from Market Street to Madison Street.

6. 18th Street gate will be used as exit only and exit from other gates will be permitted when traffic allows.



Order Keeps Army Mum on Missile Test

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—Only the official silence imposed by the Defense Department prevented the Army today from saying flatly that its 1,500-mile Jupiter missile is a success and could be in production within 30 days.

This positive Army assurance about its entry in the longer-range ballistic missile race developed after a Jupiter was launched from Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., yesterday and traveled the planned 1,500-mile distance over the Atlantic without a single hitch.

It came as Sen. Jackson (D., Wash.) renewed his contention that U.S. production of medium- and long-range missiles has been delayed in time and cut back in numbers below previously planned schedules.

Jackson spoke out after a four-hour closed meeting of his Senate House Atomic Energy Weapons Subcommittee with Acting Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson, intelligence officials and military experts from the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Ship Faces Embargo in Deadly Crash

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 29 (AP)—Argentina imposed an embargo tonight on the Moore-McCormack Lines freighter Mormacurfi in the wake of her disastrous collision with an Argentine river steamer.

The steamer, Ciudad de Buenos Aires, sank after the crash Tuesday night and at least 94 persons aboard are missing and presumed dead.

Argentine authorities barred the departure of the Mormacurfi pending investigation of charges by the steamer's owners that the U.S. vessel was to blame.

The master of the 7,800-ton freighter, Kenneth Sommers of San Francisco, and three crew members were held incommunicado in the investigation.

As hope vanished for finding alive any of the 94 missing, there were reports the toll may even go higher.

It was feared several small children went down. The passenger list did not mention children under 4.

Of the 347 passengers and crew members listed aboard the 7,500-ton river steamer, 153 were rescued from the Mormacurfi.

The ships collided 78 miles north of Buenos Aires in the Uruguay River.

Lord Burgh's Son Weds Daughter Of Dock Worker

LONDON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The eldest son of Lord Burgh today married a dock worker's daughter.

Baroness Alexander Peter Willoughby, 22, and Anne Eldridge, 20, were married in a civil ceremony after walking a half mile to the register's office.

No relatives were present. The groom said Lord Burgh was not well and the bride's parents were not invited as it would not be fair to have one side and not the other.

The bride was a student nurse. Lenth is studying at Cambridge.

John Day Dam Delay Foreseen

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D., Ore.) said tonight a budget bureau order might impede construction of John Day Dam in Oregon and other projects throughout the nation.

Neuberger said the budget bureau has instructed federal agencies to reduce fund allotments to or below 1957 levels. This may delay the start of John Day Dam and other work in Oregon, he added.

A preliminary check with a few federal agencies which operate in his state showed that the curtailment would reduce governmental programs and perhaps personnel, Neuberger said.

He said Army Engineers told him funds for the Ordinance Army Dam in Tillamook County would be cut \$125,000 for the first quarter of the fiscal year. Such reductions he added frequently result in a requirement for the reduction in force of personnel.

Neuberger said the Bureau of Mines informed him that new projects planned under 1958 appropriations will be deferred.

Poles Leap Into Water For Freedom

NEXOE, Island of Bornholm, Denmark, Aug. 29 (AP)—Three Poles jumped into the choppy Baltic from a Polish pleasure steamer today to seek political asylum in Denmark.

Two of them leaped into the sea when the ship the Manowise was still three miles out. The third jumped overboard after the Manowise dropped anchor off the coast.

Their nautical exit followed in a week the defection of 79 Poles who stayed behind when the Polish liner Batory sailed (open pages).

The two who went overboard were picked up by fishermen in a rowboat and brought to Nexoe, where they asked Danish authorities for asylum. The third was taken out of the sea by a fishing cutter which was hired to get the story.

The Polish ship, carrying 300 passengers, continued its voyage soon afterward.

The defectors will be sent to Copenhagen by boat for questioning. They also police before their request for asylum is considered. Authorities withheld their names.

Alps Claim Four Lives

SALZBURG, Austria, Aug. 29 (AP)—Two teenage boys and two of their teachers perished today in a snow storm in the Alps. Another boy in their party of 11 from Vienna was missing and feared dead.

The victims were trapped last night on the slopes of the 16,700-foot Wundschuhhorn peak south of Salzburg.

TRIST, Italy, Aug. 29 (AP)—A man slipped to his death today from a precipice in the Italian Alps. His companion trapped on the mountain wall was rescued by Alpine guides who heard his cries for help.

Foul Play Not Found in Scribe's Death

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29 (AP)—The county's chief autopsy surgeon said today that there was no indication of foul play in the death of Craig Rice, the mystery writer who turned out 25 books during his troubled career.

Miss Rice, 49, was found dead in her apartment last night.

The coroner's office first listed the death as "possibly homicide—possibly natural." But Dr. Frederick Newberry said after conducting an autopsy today that he found no evidence of any injury that could have caused death.

All she's got," Newberry said, "is a little bit of bluish coloration on the forehead."

He said further studies will have to be made before the cause of death is determined.

Dr. Newberry said Miss Rice had been drinking heavily just before her death.

Eight years ago she was committed to Camarillo State Hospital for treatment of chronic alcoholism.

Miss Rice, in poor health in recent months, had been confined to her bed for a week. Her weight had dropped to 80 pounds.

Her best known works include "Having Wonderful Crime," "The Lucky Stuff," "Trial by Jury" and "The Sunday Pigeon Murders." She also wrote several screen plays.

Miss Rice, a native of Chicago, was married five times.

Highway Death Toll Declines

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—The number of deaths on the nation's highways, already running slightly below last year's record toll, took another drop during July, the National Safety Council reported today.

The July death total was 1,339 as against 1,570 for the same month last year, the council said. The new figure represented a decline of seven per cent, or a saving of 230 lives.

The council said July was the eighth straight month, and the month in the last 16, that deaths were down or unchanged from the same month of last year. Figures for the year were running three per cent below 1956.

This record, encouraging under any circumstances, is especially heartening as we face the Labor Day weekend holiday, said Ned H. Dearborn, council president.

The NSC has predicted 430 Americans will die on the highways in the 7-hour holiday period beginning at 4 p.m. Friday and ending at midnight Monday.

The cost in the year's toll has been made in the face of heavier traffic, the council said. Travel was up five per cent in the first five months of this year, the latest figure available.

More than 40,000 persons died in traffic mishaps last year, according to NSC figures. The council said the present trend indicates the 1957 toll will be slightly more than 39,000.

Honduras Plane Burns; 12 Killed

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Aug. 29 (AP)—A Honduran Sabana Airlines plane blew up and burned in flight today, killing 12 persons.

The plane, en route from Tegucigalpa northward to the Caribbean port of Ceiba, crashed in the Olancho Department.

Two Honduran air force planes flew to the scene.

Sen. Morse Congratulates Thurmond

FUGENE, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) tonight congratulated Sen. Thurmond (D-SC) on his record filibuster against the civil rights bill and said the measure should be rejected by President Eisenhower.

Morse said the measure passed tonight by the Senate will set back the cause of civil rights 10 years.

When you put bad legislation on the books it takes years to get it corrected, Morse said.

Passage of the bill, Morse said, means that the "black and tan of the Negroes" will be against the democracy in the next year's election.

The Negro people, he said, probably will desert some Democrats, but not enough to give the Republicans control of either house of Congress.

Morse said of Thurmond's 24-hour 18-minute filibuster: "I salute him. It is a remarkable feat. No one who hasn't tried it can fully appreciate it. I have great admiration for his courage and his sincerity of convictions, although I don't share his point of view on the civil rights issue."

Morse's 1953 filibuster of 22 hours 26 minutes is the second longest in Senate history.
