

U.S. Treasury to Borrow \$3 Billion On Securities, Push Debt Near Limit

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—The Treasury said today it plans to borrow about three billion dollars on an assortment of long and short-term securities, all carrying a 4 per cent interest rate.

A Treasury spokesman said the borrowing would push the national debt to within half a billion dollars of the legal limit of 275 billion dollars at the end of this month. It now stands at just over 272 billion, but about two billion of this will be paid off by Oct. 1.

The new security offerings, to be opened for subscription next Monday, will consist of 500 million dollars in 13-year bonds, 1 1/2 billion dollars in a five-year note and 750 million dollars in one-year certificates.

The bonds will be dated Oct. 1 and will mature Oct. 1, 1969.

The notes will be dated Sept. 30 and will mature Aug. 15, 1962. However, the notes may be redeemed after 3 1/2 years at the option and on three months advance notice.

Mature Next Aug. 1

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The Treasury spokesman said this would be the last big financing before Dec. 1 when about two billion dollars in bills carrying 3 1/2 per cent interest come due. But smaller amounts of financing may be needed during November, he said.

The offering of long and short-term securities all at the same interest rate is not according to

the economic textbooks, but the spokesman said it is a true reflection of present market conditions where short-term money is just as "tight" as long-term money, but no tighter.

Short-term borrowings usually carry lower interest rates.

The offering of a 13-year bond marks the first such issue since a 40-year bond carrying 3 per cent interest was issued in July 1955.

Truman Says Ike Should Enforce Law in Arkansas

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 13 (AP)—Harry S. Truman said tonight when a governor cannot enforce federal laws "it is the sworn duty of the president of the United States to enforce them."

The former President, without mentioning specifically the segregation issue or any governor by name, made the statement at a news conference shortly before he boarded a plane for New York.

He is returning to New York to resume a visit with his daughter, Mrs. Margaret Truman Daniel.

Truman said "When the governor of one of the great states of this great federal Union takes his oath of office, he swears on the holy Bible to support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the constitution of his own state. Laws passed under these constitutions must be enforced by the state chief executive, just as they are enforced by the president of these United States."

Sworn Duty of President

"No governor can nullify the federal Constitution or the laws passed and approved by the Supreme Court under it. When a governor cannot enforce these laws and decisions it is the sworn duty of the president of the United States to enforce them."

Previously Truman had refused to comment on the impasse at Little Rock. Asked if he was making the statement today in response to requests, Truman said he was making it voluntarily because he thought it "should be made."

In backgrounding his statement, the former President said in the early 1830s South Carolina decided to nullify certain federal tariff laws.

Would Hang Them All

President Andrew Jackson "formed the nullifiers that if they attempted to interfere with the enforcement of the laws of the United States, he would make a trip to South Carolina and hang all of them for treason."

Truman broke off his New York visit to return to Kansas City and dedicate a suburban shopping center being built on the Truman

family farm near Grandview, a Kansas City suburb.

In a speech at the dedication ceremony today, he said the family would have preferred to keep the farm, but attention to the individual.

Site of the 50-acre shopping center, estimated to cost 25 million dollars, is at Blue Ridge Extension and U.S. Highway 71, on what has been known for many years as "Truman Corners."

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Red-Hating Hungarians Return Home

VIENNA, Austria, Sept. 12 (AP)—The Independent Vienna newspaper Neues Österreich said today three members of the Hungarian anti-Communist Exile Revolutionary Council are believed to have joined a fourth leader of the council in returning to Hungary.

The man who returned before was Miklos Szabo who elected last week to leave Vienna and return home.

Since then he has written to friends in the West, "I cannot live without my Hungarian people," the newspaper said.

Now, it added, three members of the council in Strasbourg, France, are believed to have gone back. They were identified as Sandor Nagy, not related to former Premier Imre Nagy, A. Zala, and a Dr. Sagi.

Officials said the increase in borrowings this year was due partially to the cashing in of series "F" and "G" bonds, and partially to a greater rate of attrition—that is, a greater number of holders of government securities are asking for cash when they come due rather than trading them in on new securities.

Queen's Speech 'Splendid'; Noble Critic Holds Silence

LONDON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II, smiling and composed, today made her first public speech since Lord Altrincham criticized her speaking as a school-girlish "pain in the neck."

First reaction was that she came through fine. "A splendid delivery," said the London Evening Star. "She followed her text closely, uttering every word clearly and strongly."

The Queen spoke before nearly 2,000 at the opening of the Inter-parliamentary Union Conference. Both the government and commercial TV and radio carried the ceremony to millions of Britons.

Altrincham was not available for comment. American delegates were impressed.

Rep. Hale Boggs (D-La.) said, "It's the way British schoolgirls speak, then the schoolgirls do all right."

OSC Expects Big Turnout For Classes

CORVALLIS, Sept. 12 — Third largest fall term enrollment in history is expected this month at Oregon State College when it begins its 90th year of classes Sept. 30.

Only the veteran-packed years of 1947-48 will top the anticipated 7,300-student enrollment this fall, according to registrar office figures.

And these record enrollments of 7,400 and 7,420 will be passed a year from now, forecasts indicate.

Last fall's enrollment was 6,791. Two new dormitories, a new dormitory cafeteria and a new agricultural-biological science building will be completed by the time new student week begins Sept. 22. The two new dormitories will accommodate 626 students. The new agricultural-biological science building, Cordley hall, will be used for instruction and research in horticulture, entomology, and botany and plant pathology.

Registration for both new and old students will be Sept. 27 and 28.

Jacksonville Area Fires Probed for Arson Possibility
