Old Cemetery

Contributions toward improvement of the Salem Pioneer Cemetery have reached \$744.85, the Salem Pioneer Cemetery Women's Committee reported Wednesday. Chairman of the committee is Mrs. W. E. Anderson.

Nearly three-score names are on the roster of those assisting in the fund. Another \$300 has been pledged, it was declared.

The Salem Pioneer Cemetery, formerly called the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, became the property of the City of Salem and Marion County by act of the state legislature four years ago. Later, Salem passed an ordinance authorizing the city treasurer to receive "gifts, legacies and donations" for maintenance and care, although not for individual graves.

Mrs. Charlotte, secretary-treasurer of the committee, said Tuesday the committee was gratified by the response but that additional funds were needed to effect the improvements and renovation deemed essential.

The cemetery is the resting place of many persons famous in Salem's early history. The funds collected thus far are drawing interest pending the start of a major development program.

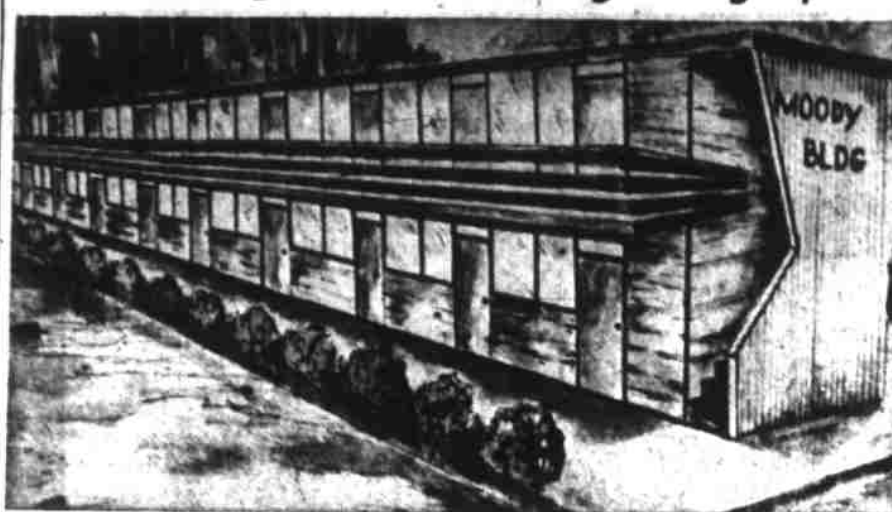

First Corn Field Day at Corvallis Will
Feature New Weed Control ChemicalBy LILLIE L. MADSEN

CORVALLIS, Sept. 12 — Plans were being completed here today for the first annual public Corn Field Day to be held Sept. 17 in the farm fields of Oregon State College.

R. E. Fore, OSC agronomist in charge of the field day, said the program would start at 3 p.m. at the OSC experimental farm, one mile east of the Van Buren Street Bridge. Corvallis, Fore is well known in the Willamette Valley where he has judged county and state corn shows for the past several years. He has judged almost all of the corn shows which Marion County has held.

New Chemical Used

Highlight of the program will be weed-control results with Simazin, a new chemical development made in Switzerland and now available commercially in this country. This will be one of the new research findings aimed at lowering costs of growing corn in Western Oregon which will go on display for field day.

Plantings of several corn varieties, rates of planting in relation to fertilization, and weed control results with other chemicals also will be shown.

Two years testing of Simazin at the college have shown near-perfect control of weeds in corn when applied just before corn emerges. Tests have dealt primarily with field corn although some sweet corn plants may be viewed.

One application of Simazin last

spring has given summer-long control of practically all broad leaf annual weeds such as lamb's quarters and pigweed, and is helping control quackgrass and watergrass. Rex Warren, formerly of Dayton, now OSC farm crops specialist, said today.

Special test plots to check tolerance of corn to Simazin have shown little or no harmful effect when the chemical was applied at nearly 20 times the recommended rate for good weed control.

An interesting sidelight of the trials, said Warren today, has been

greener and taller corn with Simazin weed control. He explained that the corn was stimulated more than could be expected from normal weed control.

Dates have not yet been set definitely for the Marion County Show, Hollis Ottaway, Marion County extension agent, said Thursday night. He did say, however, that instead of being held at Central Howell school where it has been held for many years, it will be held in the North Howell Grange hall this fall, probably in early November.

County School
Briefing Due
For Officials

County school officials will receive briefing on the latest legislative action regarding schools at the state-wide five-day workshop starting Monday in the State Library conference room.

Approximately 150 county school superintendents, supervisors and other officials are expected to attend the conference which is a yearly project of the Oregon Association of County School Superintendents.

The theme for the conference, "An Analytic Look at the School Office," will be carried out mainly through Dr. C. O. Fitzwater of the office of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington. Dr. Fitzwater has five addresses scheduled as well as a final summary at the workshop.

The conference is held yearly "to discuss problems and solutions of county school administration and receive information from the state level on new laws and legislation," said the state education office. This year's conference is longer than usual because of the large amount of materials to be covered, according to officials.

The bald eagle, the American national emblem, is decreasing in population. Today they are most numerous in Florida and Alaska.

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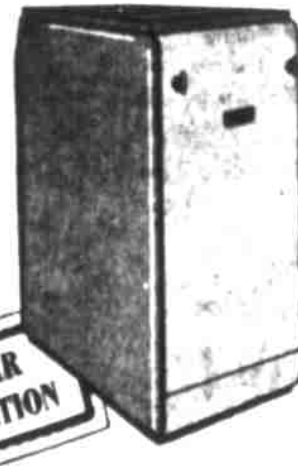
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
